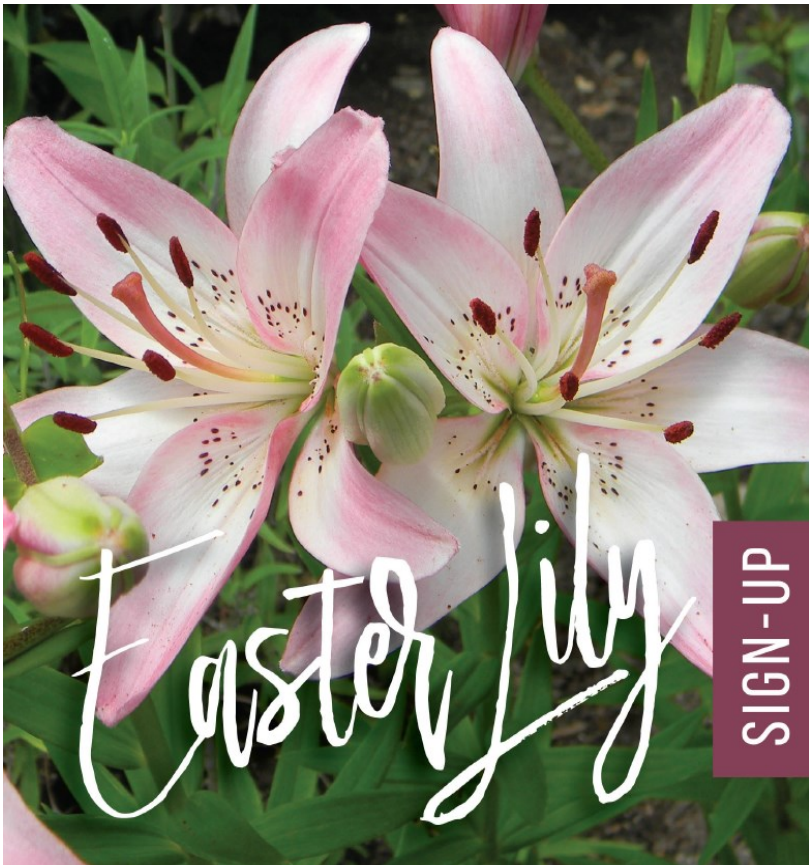

For 70 years, Presbyterians have joined together in this ecumenical effort to share God's love with others less fortunate than we. *OGHS* is the single, largest way that Presbyterians come together every year to work for a better world and sharing God's love with all of our neighbors-in-need.

Sunday, April 28, is our 2nd quarterly collection for **2 Cents A Meal**. Please continue your support for P.A.T.H. (Presbyterian Answer To Hunger). Your contributions support the Second Harvest Food Bank, which distributes meals to partner feeding programs across our six-county area; Society of St. Andrew (SoSA), which coordinates gleaning events with volunteers to provide fresh, nutritious produce to local food banks; Alliance for International Reforestation (AIR) in Guatemala which plants trees to provide fruit and prevent mudslides, as well as built and installed fuel-efficient brick stoves in remote, poverty-stricken villages; and Madagascar Project [Dan and Elizabeth Turk, PC (USA) Missionaries]. Dan trains seminary students in the planting and cultivation of fruit trees, and helps Elizabeth implement a community health program, teach AIDS awareness and advise the family planning program.

WPPC generously supported the hunger programs of Society of St. Andrew with donations through your Global Market totaling \$725 in 2018. Your support through these gifts was far-reaching, and helped enable SoSA to save and distribute over 3.3 million pounds (about 10 million servings) of produce in Florida through our two hunger relief programs, The Potato/Produce Project and The Gleaning Network to people in need of food assistance in Florida.

We thank you once again for your investment, not just in our programs, but also in the people who are given hope and a hand-up when their basic needs of food, clean water and shelter are met.

Session is pleased to announce the engagement of R. Miller Architecture, Inc. of Maitland, Florida to assist our congregation in assessing WPPC's property and facilities. Conducting an assessment was among the goals adopted by Session as part of the Vision 2020 Plan. RMA is an established firm with extensive experience serving churches. In addition to its in house architects, RMA has assembled a team of consultants to inspect WPPC's facilities and property, understand the needs of our ministries, and suggest options for improvements and renovations. The assessment will also consider alternatives for underutilized portions of WPPC's property, which could potentially provide a source of revenue to maintain our facilities, through lease or sale. Session welcomes RMA's involvement, as WPPC seeks to enhance its ability to fulfill its mission to our congregation and the Winter Park community.

The process is just beginning and is expected to take several months. RMA, working with the Sustainment Committee, will gather a broad range of input regarding WPPC and its ministries. Session, the Diaconate and WPPC's Pastors, Committees, and Staff will be surveyed regarding their use of the existing facilities and potential improvements. As the assessment progresses, Session will be updating the Congregation regarding this exciting and important undertaking.



Colum Cille means “Dove of the Church” in Gaelic and was the name given to young Crimthann by his friends because as a boy he was often found praying in the town church. Thereafter he was known as Colm, or its Latin form, Columba. He was the grandson of an Irish king, but even that did not prevent him from suffering the consequences of his strong personality. He illegally copied the Gospels, intending it for his own use, and when the king demanded that he hand it over, a battle followed and was won by Columba’s warrior family. The result was a self-imposed exile to the first place where he could no longer see Ireland: the tiny remote island of Iona off the coast of Scotland.

Columba had traveled across northern Ireland for ten years prior to that fateful journey. He established thirty monasteries in that time and became one of the twelve Apostles of Ireland. When he arrived at Iona with twelve companions in 563 AD, they built the original abbey from clay and wood. This structure did not survive the raids of the Vikings beginning in 806; but the centuries between those times were full of the activities of the monks of Iona, whose products included elaborate carvings, Celtic crosses, and manuscripts, the best known of which is the *Book of Kells*, which dates from 800 AD and is currently on display in Trinity College, Dublin. The monks also traveled across Scotland, preaching and teaching about God and Christianity.

Columba did return to Ireland in 575 to mediate a dispute between the high king and the league of poets. Because Columba insisted on keeping the terms of his exile, he traveled blindfolded. He was respected by everyone, and even though he sided with the poets, he spoke to the nobles and clergy with such conviction and compassion that the king decided to reverse his original decision and the hostility between the parties was appeased.

The latter years of his life on Iona were spent praying, fasting, and teaching his monks to read and copy the Scriptures. He inspired their efforts to continue taking the Gospel to the people of Scotland and was for a time also influential in the politics of the country. He died in 597 and was buried at the Abbey, which today is marked by a small roofed chamber on the left side entrance.

Missionaries such as Columba have been a vital part of taking the word of God to the peoples of the Earth. Later Scottish missionaries took the Bible to the Germanic countries. The Roman Church took over the Celtic Church, and was followed by the Reformation. The mighty Roman empire could never subdue Ireland or Scotland and the Visigoth hoards ended its thousand-year rule over the better part of Europe. Christianity, however, has prevailed. This story about one man proves that God works through each of us to continue to spread his Good News to everyone in whatever way we can.



Ash Wednesday is the beginning of Lent. It started March 6th and will end with Easter, April 21st. Lent is a season of 40 days representing the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, enduring the temptation of Satan, and preparing to begin his ministry. In the early church, Lent was a time to prepare new converts for baptism. Today, Christians focus on their relationship with God. They often choose to give up something during Lent or volunteer and give of themselves to others.

Sundays in Lent represent a “mini-Easter” tempered with joyful anticipation of the resurrection. Therefore, Sundays are not counted in the 40 days. Lent is a time of repentance, fasting, and preparation for the coming of Easter. At Easter, Christ’s death shows us all creation are continually made new by God’s love and saving grace.

Who made you? God. What else did God make? God made all things. Why did God make all things? For His own glory. How many Gods are there? There is only one God. Can you see God? No, but He can see you.

For the past two years, the Winter Park Health Foundation has been building a new community center where the old YMCA Crosby Center was on Crosby Way, across from Advent Health Hospital (formerly Winter Park Hospital). Also housed in the building will be the new Crosby Wellness Center. This initiative is designed to provide a holistic approach to health and wellbeing. The Center's function and focus has been designed using 7 Dimensions of Wellbeing, one of which is Spiritual wellbeing—a set of spiritual beliefs of values that direct our lives. Session has established an ad hoc committee, chaired by Sara Van Arsdel to help the church welcome our new neighbor in a variety of ways.

We at the church have been watching with great excitement and have coordinated a number of activities with the Winter Park Health Foundation and the new Crosby Wellness Center. And we are working on ways we can work together in programming and events in the future! "THIS CHILD HERE"

Below is an update from Robert Gamble, Executive Director of *This Child Here*, as it relates to families in Donetsk and Lugansk and other cities now occupied by the Russians and Separatist Ukrainians.

"Every summer we fund, plan and direct a Peace Camp called *White Sail*. Attendees are families who have been displaced by the war with Russia. It is a week of planned activities, discussions, and time at the sea for families. We usually have about 50 people attend. Names are given to us from contacts that Alla Soroka (our program manager) has in cities in the east. They are all families with children who have lost homes and jobs in Donetsk and Lugansk and other cities now occupied by the Russians and Separatist Ukrainians. Now they live in one room apartments in a city called Zaporosia in the east, and they try to get jobs. Three of the families who came are people who have been given jobs by the Caritas Relief organization. These include a former University faculty member and a lawyer. They live at a fraction of their former income."



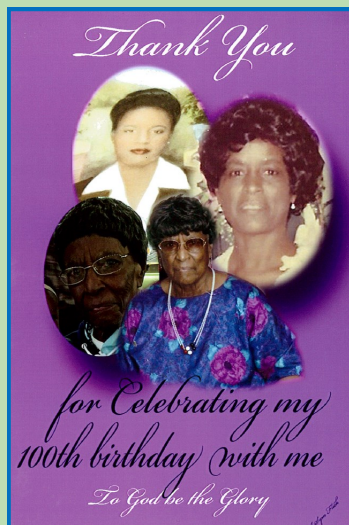

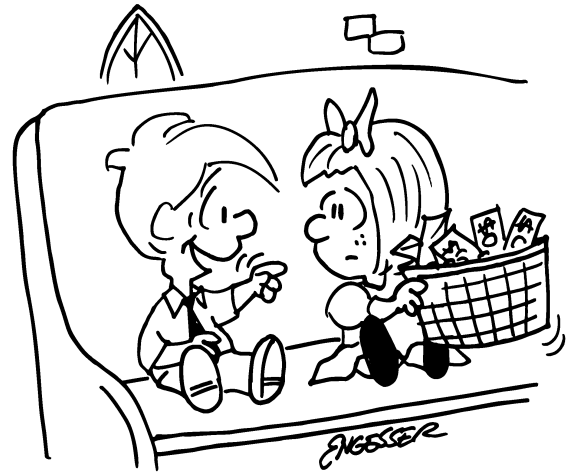

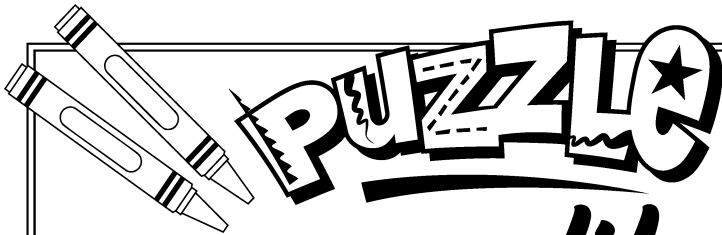
