It is first in a series of three lessons on the people who resided in the community at Qumran. This is the group that is credited with having deposited the Dead Sea Scrolls in nearby caves. Fragments of over 900 different scrolls have been discovered in 11 caves.

THE EASTER PEOPLE



My long-time friend Rev Dr. Richard Hardel, is a man of surpassing wisdom and great humor. He often refers to his fellow believers as THE EASTER PEOPLE. Christmas is the day set aside for us to celebrate Christ's birth. It is certainly a joyous time that we share with the world, but the world has had its way with Christmas. It has become a commercialized celebration filled with Frosty the Snowman, the Grinch, cute little elves, Rudolph (of the Nose) and Grandma getting run over by a you-know-what!

We are not "The Christmas People." We are THE EASTER PEOPLE. In truth our faith, at its core, is a "stumbling block" to the unbelieving world. Easter is the day we acknowledge and celebrate His resurrection; the day Jesus walked out of that tomb as proof that He is indeed the Messiah, the Risen Lord! Our eternal salvation is guaranteed. It is a fact! It is the truth! Hallelujah! Easter belong to us! The day (and the celebration) is unique to our faith. Thank God for that! Greet each other on that day with the phrase "He is risen!" and respond with "He is risen indeed!" This salutation is called the "Paschal" greeting; it is a centuries-old custom still widely used today. It is based upon Luke 24:34 (KJV(ESV) and is a joyous and uplifting Easter greeting.

As Easter Sunday approaches may each of us look to that empty tomb and rejoice. Our salvation is complete. Our Lord's work on earth is finished. Nothing more need be added. We are saved, and the world has been changed forever. We are THE EASTER PEOPLE. He is risen! He is risen indeed!

The Crucifixion Window

The Crucifixion speaks for itself. In this presentation our Lord is surrounded by two who loved Him most dearly: His mother and John, the disciple into whose care He commends His mother. Jesus looks heavenward. The sun and moon are used in Christian art to show the sorrow of creation at His dying. It is shown here in the partial eclipse of the sun.

The lower panel states, "There they crucified." The emblem of the three nails symbolizes the Crucifixion-one nail for each hand and one nail which pierced both feet as seen in most crucifixes.

Some made the Temple a house of merchandise-a marketplace, but Jesus quoted from the prophet Isaiah that "mine house shall be called a house of prayer for all people." He spoke these words during the Feast of Passover, our Holy Week. Matthew, Mark, and Luke associated the cleansing of the Temple as the main act which brought our Lord to the Cross. Matthew said they tried to arrest Him. Mark writes that the chief priests and scribes sought a way to destroy Him. Luke added that priests, scribes, and principal men of the people tried to destroy Him. It started in the house of worship and ended with the event shown here.

Each of the four Gospels agree that a number of women were present at Calvary. Among them were Mary, our Lord's mother, Mary the Mother of James, and Mary Magdalene. John's gospel tells us that John the disciple was also there.

Cognitive scientists say that seeing faces in trees correlates to creativity. This class showed off their creative minds not only by making faces on the trees, but also unicorns and a dragon! Using slippery smooth clay to make the face and body, the children then



searched for gifts of nature to use as eyes, noses, hair and horns for their creations. And if you get the feeling you're being watched at car circle, be sure to look out for the "faces on the trees!"



Afterwards, the class planted snapdragons (Antirhinnum majus) in the terracotta pots they painted. These beautiful pots and plants were then taken home to care for, observe and enjoy.
