# Note from our Postor

What happened to Lent? Is it me or did those forty days feel more like fourteen? Anyway, that's probably another subject for another day. Nonetheless, April is here and so with it comes the celebration of Easter. For many, Easter is simply another holiday—time off from work or school, time to spend having fun, enjoying family and friends. Of course, these are wonderful things to do and we should probably find more reasons to spend with those we love.

However, that's not really Easter. And to be sure, many have tried to articulate what Easter is and in many cases what it's not—literally nothing in the minds of billions. However, others have a differing view.

Matthew wrote of the resurrection, "Suddenly, Jesus met them, "Greetings," He said, they came to Him, clasped His feet and worshiped Him. Then Jesus said, "Do not be afraid. Go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee: there they will see me.""

Mark wrote, "As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man dressed in a white robe sitting on the right side, and they were alarmed. "Don't be alarmed," he said. "You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here. See the place where they laid Him. But go, tell His disciples and Peter, 'He is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see Him, just as He told you.'" Trembling and bewildered, the women went out and fled from the tomb. They said nothing to anyone, because they were afraid."

Luke wrote, "In their fright the women bowed down with their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; He has risen! Remember how He told you, while He was still with you in Galilee: 'the Son of Man must be delivered over to the hands of sinners, be crucified and on the third day be raised again." Then they remembered His words."

John wrote, "So Peter and the other disciple started for the tomb. Both were running, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent over and looked in at the strips of linen lying there but did not go in. Then Simon Peter came along behind him and went straight into the tomb. He saw the strips of linen lying there, as well as the cloth that had been wrapped around Jesus' head. The cloth was still lying in its place,


separate from the linen. Finally, the other disciple, who had reached the tomb first, also went inside. He saw and believed."

CL Lewis wrote, "The first fact in the history of Christendom is a number of people who say they have seen the resurrection."

Ellwood Haines Stokes wrote, He is risen! Christ the holy, He the Christ who once was slain; He the earth-born, Ione and Iowly, bursts the tomb and lives again. Grace divine to people abounded. Grave, sin, hell, are all confounded. He is risen! Humanity despising, Truths of God revealed in time; Risen! To His foes surprising, to His friends a joy sublime; Risen? Yes, alive forever, Christ, of endless life the giver. Risen! Risen! Every nation join the universal joy; Let the song fill all creation. People and angels' tongues employ, sadden'd hell and gladden'd heaven. Death is conquered, Christ is risen! Risen! Risen! Joy forever, Christ is victor, death in chains. Grave shall gain dominion never. Jesus lives, Messiah reigns! Thrill the earth with the glad story. We shall reign with Him in glory!





#### PLEA FOR HELP IN "FEEDING THE HOMELESS"

Our "Feeding the Homeless" team, which is part of the Compassion Committee, is responsible for preparing and serving the meal on the 1st Friday of each month at the Central Florida Coalition for the Homeless. We serve 275-300 appreciative guests.



WPPC has been involved in a feeding ministry even before the Coalition was created in 1987. In the early 1990s, we formed a partnership with the Coalition and began preparing and serving meals one evening per month. We partner this meal with another church—one month we do an entrée and they do a seven-layer salad and the next month we switch. Therefore, we cook the meat/pasta dish on the odd-numbered months (January, March, May, July, September, and November); we prepare the salad on the even-numbered months (February, April, June, August, October, and December).

Our food preparation team consists of 8 regular volunteers, 6 of which are at least 80 years of age. We have no problem preparing the salad, but have a huge problem when we cook the meat/pasta dish. The meat is browned in the oven on large (24" x 36") trays; the pasta is cooked in boiling water in large pots; both of these must be lifted and moved numerous times. It is not safe for our

wonderful volunteers to continue; the work is too hard for these folks and we need several sets of stronger arms to assist.

Therefore, our "Feeding the Homeless" team is putting out a heartfelt plea for help. We need 2 volunteers to help out on the Thursday before the 1st Friday in the WPPC kitchen from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. For the rest of this year that would be May 4th, July 6th, August 31st and November 2nd.

Please give our request careful consideration. It would be a shame if WPPC could no longer continue our 40-year commitment to "Feed the Homeless" at the Central Florida Coalition for the Homeless.

This month tells of another disciple who has the window telling his story in the upper church windows. Thomas whose name is in each of the four lists of the Twelve, but only lists his name. John's gospel tells us more about Thomas. Thomas is Hebrew for twin. Three occasions where Thomas is prominent, the King James version adds the Greek word for twin: Didymus. Apparently he must have had a brother or sister but we know nothing about either. Perhaps that twin died at birth, in early childhood or later. Thomas' occupation is not mentioned but since he was a Galilean as were most of the fishermen disciples, we can assume that he was one, too, for he was with the other six fishing in the Sea of Tiberius when Jesus appeared to them after His resurrection.

Much has been said about doubting Thomas as an anatomy of melancholy. Pessimistic, slow of mind to understand (Lord, we know not wither thou goest, and how can we know the way?) Pragmatic and



slow of heart to believe (Except I shall see in His hands the print of the nails and put my finger into the print of the nails, I will not believe.) These spiritual limitations Thomas had, however he had a courageous heart and a loving loyalty that never stumbled.

Some have questioned why Thomas was absent that Resurrection evening when the ten disciples experienced the Presence of the risen Lord. Why was he not with them? No doubt weeping out his heart because he could not believe the report concerning the empty tomb. Souls deeply wounded suffer their wounds in silence and alone; doubting may also be the soul's sincere desire, the hidden motion of a trembling heart longing to be filled; that haunting hunger to believe. John tells us that on the second appearance when Jesus' Presence came again with all

eleven present, it was to Thomas that He addressed Himself. And from doubting Thomas there came the lofty confession inscribed in this window: *My Lord and My God*. To those who know religious depression, it is Thomas who would understand.

There is an ancient tradition that Thomas carried the Gospel to India (where he also suffered martyrdom). A legend says that he went there as a skilled craftsman and builder. In the window the carpenter's square imposed on the spear is symbolic of the legend and his martyrdom. Also the words found in John 20:28 *My Lord and my God*.

#### 4/30: Spiritual Conversations with Marilyn Bryant


Marilyn will talk about her life journey from Canada to Florida and how her faith has grown through the decades and impacted her life at each stage.




Puzzlei


