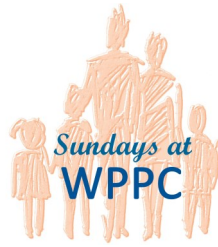

##### **Seekers (315)**

The Seekers is a discussion based Sunday school class that studies a wide variety of topics ranging from Books of the Bible to Theology to Current Events. They are a support group that spends time on fellowship as well as discussion and they are able to disagree, yet move in a positive direction during their discussions.

## THE MUSIC MINISTRY AT WPPC



You, the people sitting in the pews, are the largest part of the Music Ministry at WPPC—The Congregational Choir. Every week you participate in singing the hymns and responses that are part of our worship service. We do, also, have smaller musical ensembles that are open to anyone who would like to join and can attend the rehearsals. See if one of these choirs fits in with your plans, and join other friends who enjoy preparing special music for worship to the glory of God throughout the year.

### The Chancel Choir

The Chancel Choir, directed by Justin Chase, rehearses each Wednesday evening from 7:15-8:45 and sings for worship almost every week from mid-August through May or early June. A variety of styles is used to present the message through music. A love of singing is all that is needed to be part of the choir, which is open to high school students, those beyond high school, and those way beyond high school. First rehearsal: August 29th

### The Children's Choir and Youth Ensemble

The Children's Choir and Youth Ensemble, directed by Susan Davis, is for students from kindergarten through middle school. Rehearsals are every Tuesday evening from 6:30-7:30. Training includes the basics of singing. This ensemble sings monthly through the school year, and often presents a musical play in April. First rehearsal: September 4th

### Westminster Ringers

Westminster Ringers, directed by Susan Davis, is an intermediate level handbell choir. Ability to read music is necessary, and previous experience with handbells is helpful, but not a requirement. Rehearsals are every Wednesday evening from 6:00-7:00, and the group plays for worship about once a month. First rehearsal: August 29th

### WPPC Ringers

WPPC Ringers, directed by Dana Irwin, is an inter-generational handbell ensemble which rehearses from 11:35-12:15 each Sunday. No musical or handbell experience is needed to join this beginning level choir, and ages 7 to 107 are welcome. This group plays for worship when they have a piece ready to play. First rehearsal: September 9th

Instrumentalists are welcome to present special music and play special parts written in the choir anthems. Please don't hide your talent. Let us know if you play ANY instrument. If there are enough folks who play band/orchestra instruments, we might be able to form a new ensemble!

### August 12—The Making of the New Testament Canon: The Importance of Interpretation.

## DEACON'S DEN



Do you sometimes have questions that you wish could be answered without asking another person? There are questions that many people have about God, faith, and circumstances of life, that are addressed in small pamphlets called **Care Notes**. They are published by Abbey Press and can provide insight into situations of everyday life for kids, teens, and adults.

**Care Notes** for Kids include **“Bye-Bye, Bully!”** A Kid’s Guide for Dealing With Bullies, which is illustrated with elfin characters and is meant to be read by an adult and child together. It delves into the who, what, and why’s of bullying, as well as how to stop bullies. The object is to offer kids nonviolent ways to assert and protect themselves, and when to ask an adult for help. Another booklet is titled **“What Happens When Someone Dies?”** A Child’s

Guide to Death and Funerals. Adults have a hard enough time dealing with death, so imagine the child’s point of view. We might be surprised to learn that the child and the adult can teach each other how to deal with this inevitable question.

**Care Notes** for Teens cover many topics for this sensitive age. **“Being Happy Even When Life’s Not Perfect”** helps teens deal with life’s problems – the perceived kind or the real kind – by offering tips for finding your own road to happiness. Other resources for further help are also offered. **“Keeping God as a Friend Even When It Doesn’t Seem Cool”** looks through several scenarios about relationships, being yourself, and staying in contact with God. Quoting from Rico, a teen, “Who’s going to give me more support and better advice than God?”



**Care Notes** for everyone covers the topics of keeping our faith when bad things happen, finding God in pain or illness, facing holidays when a family member is ill, and caring for yourself while caring for someone ill. At the bottom of each pamphlet are these words: Take One – and take heart. Give One – and give hope. These pamphlets offer strength and support when we need it most.

In addition to the **Care Notes**, there are the daily devotional booklet **These Days**, along with many reference guides, such as **Donate Life** for organ, eye, and tissue donation; **Alzheimer’s & Dementia Resource Center**; **Support Group Listing**; **The Florida Brain Bank**; and a prescription discount card from Florida Hospital. **The Stress Busters** list is exactly that: a page-long list of things you can do to relieve stress.

This is just a short list of the many booklets and pamphlets available for you to take and share. They are located in the **Healthy Living Room** across from the receptionist’s desk in the office wing of the church. The Deacons will turn on the light and open the blinds so you can see the rack full of resources. Come in and take a look!



## LET'S THINK ABOUT THE LIBRARY

Winter Park Presbyterian Church established the Library in 1958. It has served the congregation in many ways during these years. It has changed in many ways but the message never changes. The purpose never changes.



We need the help of the people in the congregation to make this vast collection of books (about 6,000) serve its purpose. Many church members have asked, "Where is the Library?" When you come out of the sanctuary into the Narthex, turn left going east and you'll see an overhead sign directing you to the Library which is open Sunday, Monday, and Thursday mornings. Also, for your convenience, a table of books is on display in the Narthex. These books are changed every month and instructions to assist you in checking them out is also on the table.

I am reading an autobiography right now that I recommend highly—"Barbara Bush: A Memoir." Her style of writing is just like a conversation with her. She tells about growing up, the world of politics, campaigning, life as our Presidents' wife and makes it all sound like fun. It's a thick book but worth checking out the many pictures that are also included.

"Mount Vernon Love Story" by Mary Higgins Clark is a novel about George and Martha Washington. The author tells the story of a rare marriage and brings to life the human side of the man who became the "father of our country." Events, dates, scenes and characters are based on Mary Higgins Clark's historical research. George Washington was a giant of a man starting with his physical height, best dancer in Virginia, master horseman, and respected by even the Indians, etc.



Charles Kuralt's "A Life on the Road" takes us with him traveling over America introducing us to Americans with humor and warmth over a period of years. He describes the oddities of traveling backroads in a motor home meeting the people. Again, the pictures tell an interesting story.

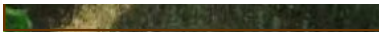

## Ukraine Orphan Transition Assistance Foundation—Notes from Audrey



Existing Homes



**House project:** Three of the homes are currently being lived in by young families. Two of the families are doing a wonderful job paying their rent and utilities, maintaining their properties, and turning their houses into homes. Unfortunately the third family, despite help, has not been able to show themselves as being capable of home ownership. There is a

waiting list to occupy this house. Currently three more homes are under construction with a waiting list. **This project requires additional funding to complete it.**

**New Hope Transitional Home:** This is a home for youth who have aged out of the orphanage and need a place to live with a family experience. Without this home, the young people are left to struggle on their own without any family support. While living in the home the boys attend trade schools. Currently six boys are living there and another three will join them. Igor and Ira, the home parents, provide mentoring and a family experience to prepare them for adulthood.

**Pishana** is an orphanage for children with various developmental disabilities. It is located many hours away from Kiev. The Foundation has created a learning center at the orphanage where children can experience developmentally appropriate games and activities to help develop important skills.

**Trinity Church** in Odessa is a small church (on the top of an old factory building) that provides spiritual support to its members and reaches out to the community. It is Audrey's place of worship in Odessa.

Winter Park Presbyterian Church contributes to the support of the *Ukraine Orphan Transition Assistance Foundation* through the *Compassion Committee* and the *Global Market*. Audrey volunteers her time. You can send additional funds to the Foundation through WPPC by indicating *Ukraine Orphan Transition Foundation* on your check. ~Compassion Committee

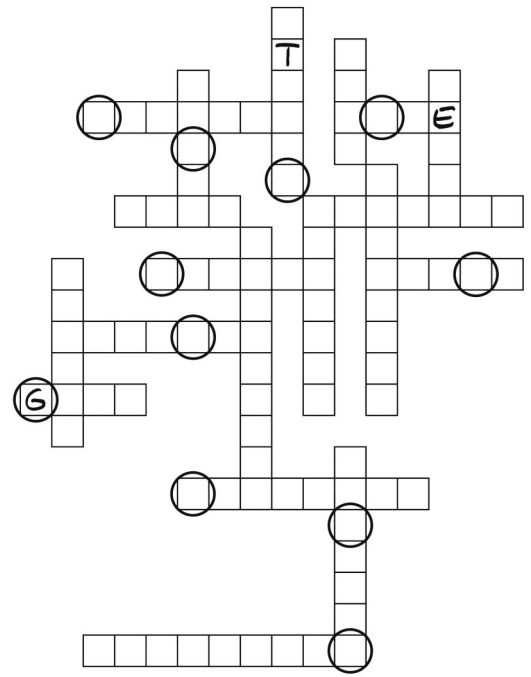

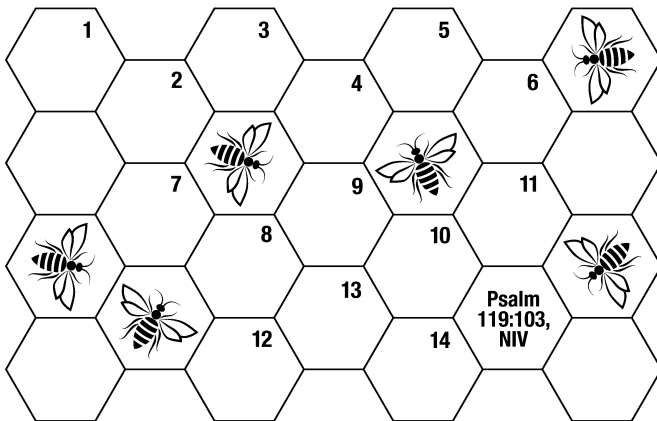

Our playground has a new addition! Our Noah's Ark ship has arrived and the company is doing some finishing touches to it so it is perfect for the new school year! This piece of equipment is possible because of the generous donation from the *Sarah Galloway Foundation* in Winter Park who matched the money we received from our Spring Fling fundraiser back in April. Our summer campers, families and the community have already enjoyed many hours exploring and discovering this new addition.

Summer Camp 2018, a six week program, has been a wonderful experience for the children and staff of WPPP. Each week we planned a new theme for the children to enjoy. Space is the Place, Tropical Paradise, Animal Planet, Prehistoric Times, Inventors Workshop/Mad Science and Nature Camp. The children also experienced water days twice a week for these hot summer days.

Our school year begins Monday, August 13. The teachers will be busy the week of August 6<sup>th</sup> cleaning and preparing their rooms for "Meet Your Teacher" on Friday, August 10 from 10:00am-2:00pm.
