Drink up the bitter water, breathe the chilly death;
Soon enough comes the riot of our blood and breath. -CS Lewis

FOR WE KNOW...

Buried deep in the New Testament is a single verse that, to my understanding, is everything a Christian needs to know about life on earth! It is Romans 8:28. This is the verse: "FOR WE KNOW THAT ALL THINGS WORK TOGETHER FOR GOOD TO THOSE WHO LOVE THE LORD AND ARE THE CALLED ACCORDING TO THIS PURPOSE". It is a wonderful statement, but deceptive in its simplicity. If we take a closer look at these words, there is much to learn:

FOR WE KNOW: If I asked you if you believe the sun will rise tomorrow morning, you would answer "of course"! But if I changed the question and asked you if you KNOW the sun will rise tomorrow morning you would have to answer "no". We don't KNOW it. We believe it will because it always has and probably will, but we cannot KNOW this. If the Apostle tells us what we KNOW, then it is important that we learn what we KNOW!

THAT ALL THINGS WORK TOGETHER FOR GOOD: That sounds very comforting, doesn't it? A warm-fuzzy hug in a troubled world...but wait! *All* things? The good things *and* the bad things? The really bad, terrible, awful things? Yes! That's a hard one, isn't it? It has been hard for me. It hurts that there have always been terrible things in my world, and I struggle to understand how God works all that out for good...but I KNOW that He does!

TO THOSE WHO LOVE THE LORD: Do you love the Lord? Do I? Before we answer that question remember that Jesus had to ask Peter three times before he got the right answer. Jesus asked Peter, "Simon, Son of John, do you love me?" The word Jesus used the word for "love" that means "Selfless, total adoration". Simons answers, "Yes, I love you", but he used the word for love that means "Best friend/soul brother". Jesus asked him a second time, using Simon's word for love, "Simon, Son of John, do you love me?" Poor Peter...he must have been crushed that Jesus wouldn't accept his answer. Hadn't he left his business, family, and friends and walked away to follow Jesus taking nothing with him but his littler, brother Andre (probably because he couldn't get rid of him)? Hadn't he preached and healed in Jesus' name? Hadn't he sat at Jesus' side for almost three years? In his anguish and broken heart he answered, "Lord, You KNOW all things, You KNOW my heart, You KNOW I Love you!" BINGO! Right answer! Can we bow our heads right now and pray that same declaration? Read it again! Can we? If we can do that, we truly love the Lord. Pastor Bess recently preached an excellent sermon on this subject; it touched my heart...and I hope it touched yours.

AND ARE THE CALLED: Rest easy on this one. You have been "called". Jesus calls all to Him and you have answered (or you wouldn't be reading this!).

ACCORDING TO HIS PURPOSE: There's a big "Bible" word for this: "Holy". Simply defined, it means "called out and set apart for God's purposes". Here we slam head-long into one of the most-asked questions of our fellow Christians: "What is God's purpose (His plan) for me...personally...me? I will answer the question in this way: Martin Luther, the great teacher and reformer, admonished us to rise each morning and make the sign of the cross before we do anything else. This is to remind us of to whom we belong and that everything we do that day we will do for Him! It matters not what your day will bring of your vocation or activities. He is to be the center of your world. That, my friend, is God's will for you. Service Him in all that you do and rejoice...and you will KNOW!

There you have it. ROMANS 8:28

Dear Lord, You KNOW all things; You KNOW our hearts; You KNOW we love You. Create in us an unshakeable certainty of Your gift of salvation through our Saviour, Jesus Christ. Grant us peace in difficulty, love for all, and strength to live every day in the marvelous light of Your radiated glory. Amen.

UKRAINE UPDATE FROM ROBERT GAMBLE, DIRECTOR OF THIS CHILD HERE

On Saturday, I got the text from Mariam. A rocket hit the big box store called Fozzy market. Fozzy is where we buy food, pampers, oatmeal, cookies, bread, and other products for families in need in rural areas around ODESSA. Mariam directs our Refugee Services and runs our Hostel in Odessa.



Olga Balaban, who directs our Refugee Services in Izmail, writes:


"Anxiety and uncertainty. Fear and inevitability. This is how you can describe the state of Ukrainians when a cruise missile fired from a ship, which stands off the coast miles from Odessa, crashes into a nearby building. Several times a day, the shrill sound of a siren sounds the departure of missiles. People anxiously wait for the direction of the flight to be known. In places like Odessa, Chernigov, Nikolaev or Krivoy Rog the missile arrives. Then relatives and friends in that city are frantically dialed; the questions are asked. How are you? Is everyone alive?

Yesterday, a rocket hit the Odessa warehouse of a large supermarket. The same one where we buy groceries for the families. It is very close to the house of our employee, Mariam, who helps displaced people every day. And, listening to her alarmed voice on the phone, you again feel fear, hopelessness and incomprehension. Why are rockets that bring death flying toward us. We cannot protect ourselves and our loved ones, our home and our world. We can only pray and help those who find it harder, who come from a destroyed city, who cannot get out of a stressful state, who are in dire need of our help. And still, we look forward to victory and peace.."


