

Christmas is coming! That, of course, is no secret. Everyone knows it, at least here in our culture. Many, particularly the children among us, are counting down the days to December 25th. They are waiting, and waiting for the wonderful day of Christmas to finally arrive.


I was thinking about this familiar activity of waiting and it got me to wondering how much of our lives we actually spend waiting for things. We wait in line. We wait in traffic. We wait on the phone. Since you can now find the answer to anything you want to know on the internet (along with much that you don't want to know) I decided to take a look. Here is some of what I found. The average commuter living in an urban area spends about 59 hours (two and a half days!) each year waiting at red lights. The average wait at a doctor's office is 32 minutes (though I spent nearly two hours just last week). And someone claims that the average wait for a significant other to get ready to go out is 21 minutes. This latter number, however, is no doubt wildly disputed depending on whether you are the one who is waiting or the one who is getting ready.

Waiting for things to happen is inevitably a part of our lives. But, that is not what the season of Advent is for. Advent is not a time for waiting, it is a time for preparing. Now, certainly, most people spend this time of the year preparing for many things. There are gifts to buy, meals to plan, schedules to coordinate, parties to host or attend, and dozens of other activities that often overwhelm our days. Our faith, however, reminds us that the One we are expecting is the Lord of life. His coming is a call for us to prepare our hearts and our lives.

How might we do that? Perhaps there is someone we need to forgive, or someone we have hurt who needs an apology. It may be that there is something we have been putting off that we believe God wants us to do and we realize now is the time. Perhaps someone is in need and could use our helping hand. Or maybe emotions like anger, bitterness, resentment, impatience, intolerance, or whatever have gotten too much of a foothold in our spirits and need to be cleared away. The time for waiting is over, this is the time to act. The Lord is at hand!

Let us all during this holy season take a moment to pause, reflect, and prepare, so that when the King comes He can be born once more within our hearts.



Trunk or Treat 2019 Report from the Community Life Committee

As Saturday afternoon heated up and rain clouds threatened, Emily and a dedicated group of volunteers cordoned off the parking lot for WPPC Trunk or Treat. The cars arrived slowly and church members emerged donning big hats or complete costumes and opened their trunks revealing fanciful decorations: cute stuffed animals, games like corn hole and bowling, and large Bible story boards to name a few examples. Candy donated by church members was distributed to each trunk. Our committee set up a much-needed water station with apple juice and freshly grilled, warm hot dogs with chips.

Then, like an invasion, fireman, superheroes, princesses, cats, dinosaurs and unknown creatures walked up with parents, grandparents or older siblings. At first just a few came, then too many to count. By estimates some 100 children came, about half of them pre-school, and the rest elementary age. Some had their faces painted, and others visited the clown who made them balloon rings and animals. Most people were surprised that the hot dogs were free. In total, 108 hot dogs were given away.

The afternoon was a success, a true community event enjoyed by all. The CLC wants to thank everyone who gave candy, shared their talents, presented trunks, and volunteered with setting-up, preparing and serving the food and drinks, and cleaning up. We look forward to next year and hope to see you there.

Does it seem like Black Friday started really early this year? The advertisements began appearing in print, on television, and online before Halloween, urging us to take advantage of these deals because the actual shopping season is less than four weeks long this year. Analysts can tell you when to buy clothing, electronics, toys, and other items based on past seasons when the retailers marked down the price of certain items. You need an algorithm to determine what day you should shop for which gift and whether you should buy it online or in a store.

December 25th comes at the same time every year. The liturgical season of Advent precedes it by four Sundays. What can change from year to year is Thanksgiving, which is scheduled for the fourth Thursday of November. We know that retailers count on shoppers spending a lot of money during that short time to make their annual profit. Hence, there is a flurry of activity to meet the deadline.

Whew! I am exhausted already!

Did you notice that the reason for the frenzy has not yet been mentioned? That is because it is so easy to get caught up in the rush that we can easily forget. That is also why it is so important to take time to breathe deeply and ask ourselves "Why do we do it?" Christmas is the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ, who is God's gift to mankind. He is so great a gift that we can never hope to match it. We can only show our love for our family and friends and those less fortunate by giving physical items or experiences or our time. God gave us a Savior, a person who taught us the good news of God's love, and who took man's sin into Himself. Wow! How humbling to think that "God so loved the world that he gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not die, but have eternal life."

Think on this verse during Advent, the waiting time before Christmas. As you make your list of people for whom you will buy gifts, remember to let the recipient know that you are giving this gift to show that you love them and that God loves them so much that He gave us all an even greater gift. Hope, peace, joy, and love of God are marked when we light the Advent candles and should be the guiding words for the season. The best gift you can give is yourself, your time, your talents, your love. Don't let the Black Friday ads overwhelm you.

Since first opening its doors Casa la Paz has hosted over 2,300 immigrants from thirty countries.

This Child Here NEWS

Robert Gamble, previously an Associate Pastor of WPPC. spoke at the R in A Sunday School Class and gave a Moment for Mission to describe current programs for This *Child Here* located in Odessa, Ukraine to address the many tensions experienced by youth and families in Ukraine. The program currently has several different aspects. First, the program is training a network of foster parents to provide care for children who were previously living on the streets or in orphanages and need care. Second, it has organized a series of workshops for

at risk children in the school systems to address the difficulties facing these youth. Third, it has created a Peace Camp that provides an opportunity for families that have been displaced by the conflict with Russia to experience a respite and to address their tensions. Fourth, it has established a peace training program for outstanding youth who have the ability to become the leaders of the future to become peacemakers. Read to your family this Christmas. Children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren enjoy being read to and it helps you form a special relationship between you and the child. You can point out characters in the story, make a voice like the animal or persons. Show them that when people do kind acts, they show God's love.

The most popular of all Christmas festivals is the season of Christmas. The season lasts for a period of 12 days from December 25 through January 6. The message of Christmas is basically Incarnation, which is from the Latin "cara" (flesh) and "Immanuel" (God with us). Another Latin word, "advenio" (to come) gives us the term Advent. In the Christian Year it refers to the coming of Jesus Christ. Advent

looks forward and backward. It recalls the coming of Christ as a child of Bethlehem and His coming again to judge in power and victory.

There are many symbols that can be used representing Christ or part of His ministry.

The Lion—symbol for Jesus—the Lion of Judah.

The Heart—symbol of love—reminds Christians that God is love.

The Cup or Chalice—symbol of Communion. Also represents God's forgiveness.

The Angel—symbol of the angels who told the shepherds about the birth of Jesus. Also represents the 2nd coming of Jesus which the Bible says will start with an angel blowing a trumpet.

The Butterfly—symbol for transformation and the immortal soul.

The Ship—symbol of the Church sailing to Heaven.




