Although many of us struggle with an empty chair this year or relive the loss of loved ones from decades passed – ultimately, because “the time came for the baby to be born,” there is reason for great joy. Madeline L'Engle, before her death wrote the following:

***He did not wait till the world was ready, till men and nations were at peace.
He came when the Heavens were unsteady, and prisoners cried out for release.
He did not wait for the perfect time. He came when the need was deep and great.
He dined with sinners in all their grime, turned water into wine.
He did not wait till hearts were pure. In joy He came to a tarnished world of sin and doubt.
To a world like ours, of anguished shame He came, and His Light would not go out.
He came to a world which did not mesh, to heal its tangles, shield its scorn.
In the mystery of the Word made Flesh the Maker of the stars was born.
We cannot wait till the world is sane to raise our songs with joyful voice,
for to share our grief, to touch our pain, He came with Love: Rejoice! Rejoice!***



Not unlike the inn, our hearts over time can become crowded, full, even to the point where there is no room for God's presence. I pray the Spirit will open up a space within us where the clutter has accumulated – clutter like sadness and loneliness, anger, fear and that dark night of the soul that seeks to consume so many once happy and joyful hearts. I pray that Christ will enter this space, dwell, rest and reside there, as we prepare for His next entrance into the world. I pray for those who struggle to find joy during this time of year and I pray for God's intrusion in all circumstances - Praying, come Lord, Jesus.

Deacon's Den Advent

*A voice cries out: In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord,
make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be lifted up,
and every mountain and hill made low; the uneven ground shall become level,
and the rough places a plain. ~Isaiah 40:3-4*

The image of a voice crying out, though used to describe John the Baptist, originally came from Isaiah. The Old Testament verses celebrated the return of exiled Jews from Babylon to Jerusalem. Isaiah bade the faithful remnant to ready the path leading to reconciliation. Matthew reinterpreted the passage as a prophecy of John's precursor ministry to Jesus' ministry. And that latter ministry calls upon us to end our exile and reunite with God in a loving, transformative relationship.

As we anticipate Christmas this year, we also look forward to a reconciliation after a long season of separation, worry, grief, and strife. This year's journey has often felt like an exile from normalcy, like a long trudge from one unexpected difficulty to another and another. It's easy to get lost when the path twists and turns nearly every day.

Perhaps this season of Advent provides an opportunity to look beyond current misfortunes and confusion, to realign our relationship with God. How can we make "the uneven ground...level, and the rough places a plain"? I, for one, have to work on nurturing trust in God. Potholes of doubt mar my highway.

One thought helps to lift my spirits: God seeks reconciliation too. As I work on straightening my desert highway, a Loving Presence moves toward me along any open stretch. As I approach Jerusalem, Jerusalem comes to me.

Darkness and confusion may still appear to reign especially after reading my daily newsfeed, but better times are coming. The days shorten and nightfall comes early, but a newborn light approaches.

May our hearts be open to God. May the highway in the desert run straight and smooth.

Two Cents A Meal Now Becomes 5 Cents A Meal

The original Two Cents A Meal program was begun by Presbyterian Women to involve individuals and families in a corporate response to world hunger. The Presbyterian Women's Birthday Offering funded a hunger program that started the Hunger Action Enabler network in 1973. Central Florida PATH (Presbyterians Answer To Hunger) was formed in 1982 under the leadership of Rev. John Jackson, who was the first Hunger Action Enabler.

At the June 4th meeting of Central Florida Presbytery, the motion sent to Council by the Mission Development Committee to increase the PATH 2 Cents Per Meal offering to 5 Cents Per Meal was approved unanimously. Much thought, prayer and research went into making this request. Much of the decision to request an increase was based on the realistic cost for a serving of food today compared to 38 years ago when the offering was established.



Forty-six percent of the 5 Cents A Meal offering is awarded through grants to local organizations and agencies; 42% is awarded to regional, national and international organizations and agencies. All grant recipients must address hunger through one or more of the following five Presbyterian Hunger Program areas of emphasis: direct food relief, development assistance, public policy advocacy, hunger education and/or lifestyle integrity. The remaining 12% is used for administrative costs.

The organizations that currently benefit from the Central Florida PATH offering are Second Harvest Food Bank (25%), Society of St. Andrew (gleaning local fields - 21%), Alliance for International Reforestation (AIR in Guatemala - 21%), Dan and Elizabeth Turk PC(USA) Mission Workers in Madagascar (21%).

Our 5 Cents A Meal offering is taken quarterly on the fourth Sunday (January, April, July and October). We will receive our next offering on Sunday, January 24, 2021.

We have some bittersweet news to share!

We are moving to Spokane, WA on November 12th. A job came across my path at the end of the summer and it was too good an opportunity to not apply. Sean also began applying and we both ended up being selected for positions at the Spokane VA. I'll be working as a Primary Care Mental Health Program Manager and facility clinician lead communications trainer. Sean will be working as a critical care nurse in the Acute Care unit.

The girls are excited about buying a house with stairs and playing in the snow! And since we showed them that Spokane is close to Canada, they think we will be moving to a large ranch like on their favorite (Canadian) show "Heartland." They are already pestering us to get horses.

My parents, who some of you have met and who moved here 2 years ago, will also be moving to Spokane. We will hunker down in a rental house together until we figure out the "lay of the land" and decide where to plant.

We've been meaning to reach out to let you know the news and it seems now that the house is sold, inspected, and appraised that we can relax our precarious hold on all things housekeeping, homeschooling, and working and get to the *real* hard part - saying goodbye!

It feels like doors are being opened and we are trying to have faith that walking through them will allow us to fulfill some kind of calling we don't currently understand. We never thought about leaving Winter Park before this summer, but something happened in the last few months and...here we are.

Please do stay in touch and know that we will think of you all fondly and, most likely, with some tears of both joy and sadness. We mark our seasons here by church events - Easter Egg hunt, sunrise Easter service, children's choir musical & party, TNT, trunk or treat, living nativity, Christmas caroling, and Christmas Eve services. We will quickly look for another church and hope to serve the community through homeless outreach.

Thank you for loving us, especially our girls. They are too young to have much insight on the impact this church family has had on their upbringing, but they treasure your hugs, cards, smiles, and encouragement. Your imprint on their hearts, and ours, will be everlasting.

Preschool teachers, toddlers and two-year-old students are thrilled with the new playground! It was well worth the wait.

The playground project started when large trees were removed over Christmas break. During the summer work began on the drainage system to alleviate flooding problems that would occur after heavy rains, causing water to spill into our hallways. During this time roofs on surrounding buildings were replaced. Walls were pressure washed and painted.

Four large square holes were dug, filled with concrete, and poles that support the sun shade were set. The canvas canopy was lifted over the buildings by a crane and fixed in place.

Finally, grading and installation of a cushioned artificial turf surface were completed, and new enclosures were built around the air conditioners.

The most important last step: Our Bunnies Twos class burst through crepe paper stretched across the gated entrance to the playground on the first official play day! The children ran, laughed, and shouted for joy.

David Miller, our tireless project manager from R. Miller Architecture We are forever grateful to David Miller for his hands-on presence during the preschool and church projects. David brought thoughtful design, attention to detail, good cheer and professionalism to the job site and was a pleasure to have on campus. He was often seen working in the hot sun next to his crews who were always courteous and tidied up at the end of each day.

Bob White, Church Property Committee Chairperson Thank you, Bob, for being here day after day making sure work was on schedule and according to plan, for keeping everyone up-to-date with the unforeseen changes, challenges and solutions to problems that are found in any project of this scope. We truly appreciate all you have done to make our preschool facility rise to the level of our highest competitors, and for doing your best to schedule work when the preschool was closed.

Pastor Darren, the Preschool Board, Budget & Finance Committee, Property Committee and other Church Committee Members Thank you all for your support throughout this entire process, and for choosing to use quality, long-lasting materials that were not only attractive, they help keep our children safe. The artificial turf has a cushioned layer underneath that protects children who fall. The huge sun shade replaces the shade once provided by trees, helps us stay cool and avoid sunburn.

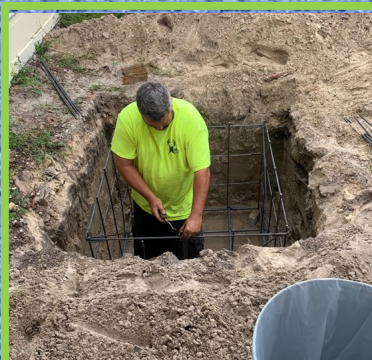

The trees and mulch were removed at the beginning of the project. Equipment was moved to the Nature Center so that the children had a place to play outdoors while their playground wasn't available.



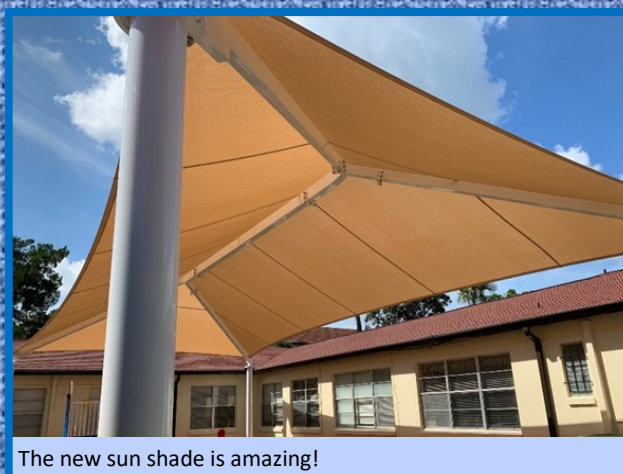
Large holes were dug for the poles that support the sun shade.
