Hope and Expectations

The hope of the righteous is joy, but the expectations of the wicked will perish. - Proverbs 10:28

I remember how boyish expectations began to build at the beginning of Advent. We children began to speculate about presents we might receive on Christmas Day. We dropped hints about coveted toys and games and feared getting socks and underwear instead.

Some years I got what I expected, but surprises came as well. Some gifts that eventually became favorites were completely unanticipated. At other times, desired toys turned out to be duds. I gradually learned to let the day arrive and deliver what it would deliver. The deepest joy of Christmas grew out of the feeling of family closeness. When I think of the holiday now, I remember happy, intimate conversations at the dinner table more than the presents I received.

The verse from the Book of Proverbs makes a distinction between hope and expectation. Living in communion with God brings joy. Hope and faith are the steadfast companions of someone who feels God's presence in his or her life. On the other hand, expecting to get or achieve ultimately harmful things brings disillusionment and despair. Truman Capote's unfinished book, "Answered Prayers", suggested that suffering comes when selfish dreams come true. If his theory is correct, then we should tread carefully when we petition for frivolous things.

The Lord's Prayer gives us direct guidelines for dealing with hope and expectation. The prayer calls us first to consider our relationship with God and our place in the world as God's children. Then we're directed to ask for necessities, to recall our duty to others, and to pray that we remain in good relationship with God. Petitions for status, power, and possessions fail to make the list.

The prayer teaches us to ask for the things that encourage joyful hope, that draw us closer to God. Nothing else matters.





One of the most powerful things that Christians claim is that God saw the great needs of the world and offered a perfect gift in response, a gift that brought God and humanity closer together. God's perfect gift, Jesus Christ -- a gift Who opens a door. Jesus is the perfect gift, not only opening a door but coming through it. In Jesus, God joined with humanity, and in His life, death and resurrection, so our story of God goes, Jesus is the door, now standing open. The giving continues because God is with us, still -- and always.

Even though many of us haven't been able to be together in person, we have been together in spirit and in faith. We missed seeing faces we love -- up close and personal, but the physical distance also revealed, for us, the importance of those things which bring us together, even when we are physically far apart.

We offer our gifts during this Advent Season to the Christmas Joy Offering because God shows us the power and importance of being together, of "being with." We might not be able to meet face to face with those who need the support that our gifts provide, but we are very much still together. We see the potential of students of color who will

become our leaders and we seek to come alongside them, to encourage them, to be together with them. And we see church workers who have critical financial needs and we come alongside them, to assist them -- we are with them. And we see the witness of the whole Church, either gathered in buildings or connected home to home, member to member, sharing what we have, together. We thank God for being "with us" through the gift of Jesus, for opening doors that may not have been accessible to us, and for joining us together as the Church and, through our gifts, with those who have need.

Fifty percent of your gifts provide assistance for current and retired church workers and their families with critical financial needs (Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions). Fifty percent of your gifts make it possible for students to learn and grow in faith at Presbyterian-related schools and colleges equipping communities of color (Racial Equity Office of the Presbyterian Mission Agency). Thank you for your participation in the Christmas Joy Offering, which will be taken on Sunday, December. If we all do a little, it adds up to a lot!

NEWS FROM OUR MISSION PARTNERS

Christian Service Center seeks to reduce poverty and improve the lives of people in our community. The Center is an interdenominational organization and a long time mission partner of WPPC. It serves the community through several programs:

Daily Bread

A noon meal served at the central Orlando center. Currently all meals are being served outside due to COVID.

Love Pantry

Food for community members at the Orlando center, Redeemer Lutheran Church (Winter Park) and through 42 schools.

Emergency help for food, rent, etc. For residents of Orange County.

Housing

Rehousing counselors to work with homeless families and individuals to help find housing (38 adults helped exit homelessness in 2021).

Compassion Corner

A drop in center for those needing a place that is dry, warm, or cool as needed (at First Presbyterian Church Orlando).

Blue Bag Food Drive

Designed to help homeless individuals with life essentials. December 6th-December 20th.

Wish list includes: pop top cans of fruit, pop-top cans of canned soup or chili, jars of peanut butter, gently used tennis shoes, gently used jeans, Tee shirts in good condition, belts, new underwear, new socks.

We have highlighted the Blue Bag Food Drive because you can contribute to this program by bringing items that you have to church where they will be brought to the Christian Service Center by December 20th. These items can be placed in the RED Barrels by the offices and the fellowship hall from December 6th to December 20th.

MISSIION UPDATES

5 CENTS A MEAL

Our fourth quarterly offering for 5 Cents a Meal was taken on October 24, 2021 and we received \$618.62. These donations will help support two local missions: SoSA (Society of St. Andrew, a gleaning organization) and Second Harvest Food Bank. They also support our two international missions: AIR (Agency for International Reforestation in Guatemala) and Madagascar Project (helps our missionaries, Dan and Elizabeth Turk). On behalf of the above recipients, thank you for your generous support of these projects. The beneficiaries of these gifts will learn that through Christ's love all things are possible.

PEACEMAKING OFFERING

The Peacemaking Offering was taken on World Communion Sunday, October 3, 2021. We received donations totalling \$120.00. However, in June 2021 we realized an additional \$438.00 had been received in late 2020 for the Peacemaking Offering held on October 4, 2020. We sent those monies in June to Presbytery and IDignity crediting them to the Peacemaking Offering for 2021. Our partners in the Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly will use 75% of these offerings for various peacemaking projects throughout the world. The Compassion Committee has chosen IDignity (<u>https://idignity.org</u>) to be the local recipient of 25% of our collection to support their work to help others in our community navigate the complexities of obtaining their personal identification. Thank you, again for your Christian charity to help those in our community who are less fortunate than we are.

Our annual <u>Audubon Birds of Prey</u> Event was very exciting! We were visited by Laura VonMutius, Education Manager, and Sabrina Sachlis, Docent Volunteer, who talked to the children in our three-year-old and VPK classes about an eastern screech-owl and a bald eagle that they brought from the center. They sang a song about birds together and learned many facts about each type of bird, but the best part was seeing them up close. The children were also amazed by the talons and beaks that were presented. We have always believed in connecting children to nature, and the birds of prey presentation is an excellent example of incorporating an outdoor learning experience into the school day.
