



Christmas time, can be a busy time. There are many things to occupy our days. We can go to special Christmas concerts, light displays, parties, spend time with friends, or buy a few gifts. Perhaps other things are scheduled—a vacation, a planned trip, a time of respite, or maybe it's an itinerary so full, one might need a vacation from the vacation.

For others, especially the poorest among us, the next month ahead will be the same as the one before. It will be a month spent gathering a few dollars, maybe trying to hold on to a car that is also a house at the moment. For so many, it will be time spent *waiting, wondering, and watching.* It will be time spent *waiting* for some needed help. It will be time spent *wondering* if help will ever arrive. It will be time spent *watching* the hands on the clock move, as minutes turn into hours and hours bleed into days and circumstances seemingly remain unchanged.

The parties alongside the poverty, the family gathered at home alongside others sitting alone, the travels alongside the seemingly stagnant life that never changes, is enough to make one wonder. Especially during this time of year, these disparities of life bring to mind an important question and causes one to ask, "What's Christmas all about?" No matter the stage of life, well dressed or living in tattered rags, happy amid life or sad with a broken heart, Linus Van Pelt's response to that question is for everyone:

"Uhummm, lights please... And there were shepherds living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks at night. An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were so afraid. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the city of David a Savior has been born to you; He is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger." Suddenly a great company of the heavenly host appeared with the angel, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace and goodwill to everyone."" (Luke 2: 8-14)

That's what Christmas is all about.

There are a number of concerns around us at all times. We are fragile beings that exist here on earth for a mere moment in time. So, God does. God does the unthinkable and becomes vulnerable – a baby wrapped in cloths - divinity wrapped in injury.

I know there are problems. In fact, there are problems with the problems. It can be overwhelming. God knows this by the way, and in response writes His story upon ours. I don't think problems are going away, in many ways - creating problems - has become its own industry. From this perspective there is not much that is Merry amid life, but Linus reminds us, that alongside the problems, the ugliness and the injury, there runs a thread of grace. "A Savior has been born to you; He is the Messiah, the Lord."

That's worth celebrating, even as we are also *waiting, wondering and watching – waiting* on the Lord's next Advent, *wondering,* How Long O' God? And *watching* not the hands on the clock, but the hands of God bringing forth light out of darkness, hope even during tragedy and life in response to death.

SPECIAL OFFERING UPDATES

5 CENTS A MEAL

On October 23rd, we received \$787.43 for this offering. These monies were sent to the Central Florida Presbytery PATH program (Presbyterian Answer To Hunger). Presbytery disburses these monies among the Second Harvest Food Bank (25%), Society of St. Andrew (SOSA) (21%), Alliance for International Reforestation (AIR) in Guatemala (21%), and Dan and Elizabeth Turk, PC (USA) mission workers in Madagascar (21%). The balance covers administrative costs.

The four quarterly offerings for 5 Cents A Meal this year totaled \$2,723.03. Thank you to all who supported these offerings and the agencies that are served.

PEACEMAKING OFFERING

The Peacemaking Offering was taken on World Communion Sunday, October 2nd. We received donations totaling \$65.00. Our partners in the Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly will use 75% of our offering for various peacemaking projects around the world. The Compassion Committee has chosen IDignity (<u>https://idignity.org</u>) to be the local recipient of the remaining 25% of our offering. These monies support others in our community to navigate the complexities of obtaining their personal identification.

On behalf of those in our local community and others around the world, the Compassion Committee thanks you for your Christian charity to help those who are less fortunate than we are.



Merry Christmas! Keep Christ in Christmas!

The stories of the upper 12 windows in the sanctuary are interesting. We told about Peter and James. This month we learn about John, one of the most intriguing of the disciples. John, his older brother James, and their father Zebedee were partners in the family fishing business in Capernaum



on the Sea of Galilee. They were so prosperous they hired servants and maintained a business branch or a home in Jerusalem. John often stayed in this home and was well known there, especially by Caiaphas, the high priest of Jerusalem.


One of the first to be called by Jesus, John was the youngest of the Twelve disciples. He lived the longest and did not die a martyr. His mother Salome was believed to be a sister of Jesus' mother, Mary. There are four lists of disciples and John is one of the three closest to our Lord, but his name never appears in the Gospel attributed to him. John was ambitious for place, made a

shameful petition for prominence, stormy, intolerant, violent in temperament, he was called a son of thunder by Jesus.

It was not what John was but for what he became that the Christian Church honors and remembers him. John believed God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world but that the world through Him might be saved.

John was among the leaders of the early church in Jerusalem who opened its doors to gentiles. We have a gospel with his name, three epistles and the Revelation. He was active in the spread of the Christian faith in Asia Minor. He was the pastor of the church in Ephesus where he lived and died of old age—the only one of the twelve to escape a violent death.

In our window the symbol for John is a chalice—out of which a serpent crawls. One of many legends is that he was forced to drink from a poisoned cup, symbolized by the serpent. John made the sign of the Cross and did not die from the drink. This legend showed the many dangers that he had as a witness to his Lord. He was a man of deep spiritual insight and saw what the words of this window say. The word became flesh and dwelt among us.
