

CHRISTMAS JOY OFFERING THE SEASON OF ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS SUNDAY, DECEMBER 17TH

In a season when we are considering the perfect gift, the gift that says how much we know and love our family and friends—we are reminded of God's perfect gift to us. Jesus came to live among us, bringing light into darkness, and reconciliation to God and to one another. Jesus Christ was God's perfect gift.

During Advent we celebrate the gift of leaders—past, present and future through the Christmas Joy Offering. Leaders greatly impact our faith, serving as models for our own journey of faith. We need well-equipped leaders for the church and world, like those educated at our Presbyterianrelated schools and colleges to reflect the wideness of God's intended diversity. We want church leaders and their families who find themselves dealing with dire financial needs to receive assistance. For those leaders the Christmas Joy Offering is truly a gift from above. For those who give, your gift will be reminder of the One whose birth we celebrate, the one truly perfect gift.

Fifty percent of the offering received is sent to the Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions, offering critical financial assistance for current and retired Presbyterian church workers in their time of need.

Fifty percent provides opportunities for education through Presbyterianrelated schools and colleges, equipping communities of color and leadership development efforts of the Racial Equity Office of the Presbyterian Mission Agency.

Thank you for your participation in the Christmas Joy Offering, which will be taken on Sunday, December 17th. If we all do a little, it adds up to a lot!

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PEACEMAKING OFFERING

The Peacemaking Offering was taken on World Communion Sunday, October 1, 2023. We received donations totaling \$348. Our partners in the Presbytery, Synod, and General Assembly will use 75% of our offering (\$261) for various peacemaking projects around the world. The Compassion Committee has chosen **IDignity** (<u>https://idignity.org</u>) to be the local recipient of the remaining 25% of our offering (\$87). These monies support others in our community to navigate the complexities of obtaining their personal identification.

On behalf of those in our local community and others around the world, the Compassion Committee thanks you for your Christian charity to help those who are less fortunate than we are.

5 CENTS A MEAL

On October 22, 2023 we received \$227.23 for this offering. These monies were sent to the Central Florida Presbytery PATH program (Presbyterian Answer To Hunger). Presbytery disburses these monies among the Second Harvest Food Bank (25%), Society of St. Andrew (SOSA) (21%), Alliance for International Reforestation (AIR) in Guatemala (21%), and Dan and Elizabeth Turk, PC (USA) mission workers in Madagascar (21%). The balance covers administrative costs.

The four quarterly offerings for 5 Cents A Meal this year totalled \$1,884.22. Thank you to all who supported these offerings and the agencies that are served.



News From Wendy Stafford, WPPC Health Care Coordinator

Hello, Everyone! Beginning now, I will be posting information monthly in the Covenanter. I will be providing the congregation with wellness information, starting with this issue. We're entering the Christmas Season and I wanted to present some information that may prove to be helpful to all of us, who are tempted to overindulge during the holidays.

SNACK ON FIBER

Fiber is well known for making us feel fuller—and experiments show this might be attributable to the way it feeds the micro-organisms in our guts, stimulating the release of hormones that curb hunger. Also, an interesting new line of study showed that a type of fiber called a prebiotic ended up reducing activity in brain regions associated with reward processing—in essence, reducing the appeal of high-calorie foods. Both serve as good arguments for munching on a handful of nuts or a few carrot sticks before arriving at an event.

DILUTE YOUR ALCOHOL

High alcohol consumption is linked to increased intestinal permeability, which may result in gut microbial community shifts and possible liver dysfunction. If you're going to have multiple drinks at a party, dilute flavorful spirits with soda water or a natural juice.

INGEST LIVE BACTERIA

Probiotics (live micro-organisms that confer a health benefit) are known to affect the immune system and also relieve digestive symptoms. They come in food form, including yogurt and kefir; live cultures can also be found in traditional fermented sauerkraut or kimchi, and in kombucha, a tart fermented beverage. Supplements are also a good option in some cases, as they provide a higher dose of beneficial bacteria.

HELP THE BENEFICIAL BACTERIA GROW

Certain high-fiber foods containing prebiotics can act like fertilizer to foster the growth of beneficial bacteria in your gut. Foods containing the prebiotic inulin, such as bananas, asparagus, and garlic, are especially beneficial; however, any fruit or vegetable will boost your fiber consumption and help nurture the diversity of micro-organisms in your digestive tract.

GET ACTIVE

Physical exercise and fitness are associated with greater gut microbial diversity. A brisk walk or brief round of stress-relieving exercises can serve as a fun way to help you feel more energized, and it might also change your gut bacteria for the better.Putting all of this into practice will help keep you on friendly terms with your gut micro-organisms during the holiday season. After all, December is not the time to let digestive issues hold us back: tomorrow brings another party and more holiday overindulgence.

CATCH UP ON SLEEP

Preliminary research shows sleep deprivation can affect gut microbes in a way that might influence food cravings, increasing our drive to consume higher-fat foods and put on weight. If you're well rested before a treat-filled event, you might enable yourself to avoid holiday overindulgence.

PUT YOUR GUILT BEHIND YOU

When we're worried or stressed, the brain notifies the gut to divert from its normal routine and stimulates excessive production of cortisol, so forget the post-party wallowing. Focus on being thankful you're surrounded by beautiful food and people at this time of year.

Dear Friends,

Wedged between Halloween and Christmas, Thanksgiving seems to draw the www.transitionsoaf.org short straw every year and is often overshadowed by the other two holidays. Yet, Thanksgiving is a significant holiday; indeed, every day should be Thanksgiving Day. And I'm not talking about stuffing ourselves with turkey and dressing and other assorted culinary delights every day, I'm talking about remembering how much we have and how fortunate we are to have what we have.

Our friends in Odesa, Ukraine, are among the most gracious and grateful folks I know despite living with frequent air raid sirens, missiles and drones flying overhead, explosions, bombings, and now, with the advent of winter, the prospect of again dealing with the lack of water, heat, and power. I receive news of their daily hardships, shared not with complaint, but just to keep me up-to-date on what life is like in my other home.

The most recent news was that the Odesa City Art Museum was severely damaged in a bombing. Some of you may not know that the historic center of Odesa is now a registered UNESCO sight, and that's exactly where this museum is located. In my opinion, this was an unconscionable act, but there have already been so many other unconscionable acts committed, perhaps this is seen as just one more. But what made this incident stand out more than the others to me is that the apartment I lived in, in Odesa, was only a block away from this museum. They bombed my neighborhood! It is a residential area. I shudder to think of the impact this had and will have on the many families that live in that neighborhood. Yet, even this news was delivered to me with thanks – thanks that our folks were not harmed and that they remain safe and whole.

In keeping with the spirit of Thanksgiving, I want to again express my ongoing gratitude for all of your loving kindness towards these people who have become like extended family to us. Many of you ask often about our folks, and you ask what is needed and what help can be given. In answer to those questions, I am happy to announce to you the details of our Christmas Project: Spreading Love and Warmth in Ukraine. It is similar to last year's project, but this year, we will be focusing our efforts on our most vulnerable group— the families of the children from the orphanage in Pishana.

Our transition home families already have blankets and warm clothes. Each house now has a generator and a supply of firewood to use as an alternate source of heat. They are as ready as they can be to deal with whatever winter challenges may come their way. Our pensioners and widows will continue to be cared for. To the contrary, the families of the Pishana orphans, who are scattered in the villages surrounding Pishana, have little or no means of acquiring necessities.



We have been caring for the orphans of Pishana for many years, but here are some facts you may not know or may have forgotten. Pishana Orphanage is for children with varying disabilities. They either have no parents or their parents are unwilling or unable to take care of them. When war broke out, the children with no parents were taken to Poland where they remain living in a group home. The others were sent back to the villages to live with the very people who are unable to provide a stable environment for them. Most of them live in poverty or neglect or both. All together, there are 40 families which include 100 children that we want to wrap in warmth and love this Christmas. Please take a look at the photos here of just a few of the families of Pishana who will be the recipients of our gifts, and then take a peek at our flyer on the next page of this letter for the details of our project to see how you can help.









