In becoming preoccupied with the why, I was missing the Who."

It's no secret that trees change. It's no secret that the roots of a tree grow deeper into the ground during winter. When it's cold, lifeless and blustery above ground, the change in the tree is taking place out of sight. However, there is an order to such growth. One might say, a presence that guides the process from season to season, and at all times.

Spring brings beauty, renewal, resurrection-life, but real growth and development happens below the surface, beyond where we can see - deeper within us, where its dark, cold and seemingly lifeless. There, in that place, are the tiny tubules of our souls that can draw the nutrients of God's life upwards into larger roots, into bigger structures like the trunk and limbs and leaves and flowers. But it is within, in the work beneath the surface, in the darkness - there are the miracles taking place that we can't see. Phillip Larkin from his final volume, *High Windows* writes the following:

The trees are coming into leaf Like something almost being said; The recent buds relax and spread, Their greenness is a kind of grief. Is it that they are born again And we grow old? No, they die too, Their yearly trick of looking new Is written down in rings of grain. Yet still the unresting castles thresh In full-grown thickness every May. Last year is dead, they seem to say, Begin afresh, afresh, afresh.



The first window at the rear of the west side of the nave portrays a group of children gathered around Jesus. He loved little ones, as he often called them, and they were of special concern to Him. Our Lord always welcomed children to His side.

Notice the child sitting on our Lord's lap, His hand upon the head of an adoring child, the girl holding flowers she picked for Him, mothers each holding a baby for Him to bless, and a boy kneeling at His feet. Jesus loves all the children in the world.

There existed in the time of Jesus a highly developed belief in angelology. It was believed that every nation and every child had an angel. Our Lord is referring to this when He stresses the importance of children and warns: Never despise one of these little ones—they have their guardian angels in heaven who look in the face of my heavenly Father. This is an imagery taken from the ceremonies of oriental courts of the day where those who were most intimate with the King also had constant access to him. So do the guardian angels with God.

In the emblem at the bottom of this panel is an angel standing behind a small child. This is the symbol for this comforting spiritual picture. Suffer the little children to come unto Me.




HOMELESS COALITION TEAM NEEDS VOLUNTEERS



Have you ever wondered what play-based learning – also known as purposeful play – is all about? How can children acquire knowledge and skills by simply playing?

Purposeful play consists of formal and informal experiences designed to lead to the building of specific strengths in children at certain developmental levels. The brains of young children grow and learn best (making mental connections and neural pathways) through the active movement of their bodies, the exploration of the environment, the manipulation of objects, the acts of designing and building, and the creation of personal expressions of language, art, music and role play – NOT by rote memorization, sitting still at desks, working expressly with paper, pencil or keyboard, or listening to adult lectures.

At WPPP we understand that "play" is child's work. It is connected to self-worth and social ability. It is a context for learning. We implement a developmentally

appropriate program that follows an organized, predictable routine and provides activities in literacy, math, science, cognitive skills, large and small motor development, social/emotional development, creative expression opportunities and more. We adhere to a child initiated, developmentally appropriate learning environment that will best prepare the child for the emotional demands of further schooling and life.

Registration for the 2022-2023 school year opens to the public on February 1st.
