## From the Pastor . . .

With all that is going on in the world, it is good we arrive at February or what we have come to know as the "love month." I thought it would be good to write to you concerning matters of love and not merely romantic love, but the all-encompassing Love of God - Agape. However, as I began to type, no words would come. For a moment, I was frustrated as I stared at the blank page. Then it occurred to me, one of the greatest things written about God's Love is recorded in 1st Corinthians chapter 13, often referred to as the "love chapter" in the Bible. As you read, take a minute and observe what love is and then also, what love is not.

"If I speak in the tongues of men or of angels, but do not have love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal. If I have the gift of prophecy and can fathom all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have a faith that can move mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give all I possess to the poor and give over my body to hardship that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.

Love never fails. But where there are prophecies, they will cease; where there are tongues, they will be stilled; where there is knowledge it will pass away. For we know in part and we prophesy in part, but when completeness comes, what is in part disappears. When I was a child, I talked like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became a man, I put the ways of childhood behind me. For now, we see only a reflection as in a mirror; then we shall see face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I am fully known.

And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these Is love."

When we read in John 3:16, "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only Son..." or in 1st John 4: "God is love." This is the love that is detailed above and it's a stark contrast to what masquerades as love in our world today. I hope we will indeed celebrate the "love month." However, I hope we will do this not just in February, but each day of the year, as we strive to share the greatest gift - God's Agape for the world.

Our Presbytery tells us OTC medicines are "non-existent" in Central Cuba and "desperately needed".

### How to Deal with a Close Talker



With flu, COVID, RSV and Noro Virus going around now, we all need to be conscious of getting too close when speaking to someone.

Viruses are easily spread by airborne droplets, so it is imperative that we keep our distance when speaking to someone. Close talkers violate your personal bubble and get too close for comfort. A situation with a close talker can be particularly awkward because you must maintain goodwill and sometimes friendships when dealing with them. You don't want to be impolite to your friend or co-worker, but you *really* need some more personal space.

A close talker violates others' personal space by getting uncomfortably close during a conversation. In Western cultures, this is usually someone who gets within 18" of your face while talking. Some people may be close talkers because of a hearing difficulty, or they may simply lack awareness of personal boundaries.

Author Robert Frost famously wrote, "Good fences make good neighbors." If people do not know where your fence lies, they may accidentally cross it. Some simple ways to communicate your personal boundaries without being rude are to hold something out in front of you, use broader hand gestures or take a step back.

Personal space or a personal bubble is the invisible space around a person where they feel most comfortable. Psychologically, this area belongs to them. When you violate someone's personal space, they may feel uncomfortable, awkward, unsafe, anxious, or even angry.

Social scientists call this concept of personal space *proxemics* or the study of how people unconsciously structure the space around them. There are typically 4 socially acceptable zones of personal space:

Intimate: 0 to 18 inches

Personal: 18 inches to 4 feet

• Social: 4 to 12 feet

• Public: more than 12 feet

All these nuances aside, the best rules of thumb to find someone's personal bubble is:

Rule of Thumb: If you take a step forward and they step back—you are too close!

Rule of Thumb: If they keep taking steps toward you, you are too far!

Close talkers can make conversations unbearably awkward. When you can smell what someone had for lunch or feel their hot breath on your cheek, it's probably time to say something. Thankfully, you don't have to be rude or unprofessional about it. Some people just may not have the social skills or body language awareness to understand your cues. These are skills that take time and observation to develop. Using and reading non-verbal cues can give you a major advantage in the workplace and beyond.

Dear Friends,

Christmas may be but a memory for most of us, but Christmas cheer continued through January as our Odesa team took Christmas camps to the orphanage in Pishana and to our families in the villages

throughout the month. Packages filled with food and necessities, warm clothes, and rechargeable flashlights had already been delivered via mail to all the families prior to Christmas so they could be enjoyed throughout the holidays. Our Christmas camps provided the opportunity for fellowship and extending our love and care to the families up close and personal. Children and families alike enjoyed stories, songs, games, crafts, and small gifts for all. Since pictures seem to tell it best, please enjoy a peek at the Christmas camps and the blessings that your gifts made possible for our folks.





Although Christmas is a magical time, none of this happened by magic. The Christmas Project could not have been such a great success without you who support us with thoughts, prayers and gifts. Please know that you are an essential part of this mission. Thank you for all you do! Special thanks are also in order for two of our teammates. Oksana, master planner, and Maxim, driver extraordinaire, are largely responsible for the success of the trips to the orphanage and the villages through their leadership. I'm not sure how we would manage without these two special folks. We are so very grateful for them and their selfless service.



As the Christmas Camps were being conducted in the villages, several of the husbands/fathers from the families who are caring for our orphans were called to the war, leaving the women to care for families alone. On a more personal note, three of our young men have now been drafted into the army—Pasha, who has been serving for over a year now, and Maxim and Radik, who have just recently been drafted. All three are former residents of our Boys' Home and each is currently renting to own one of our cottages. Radik joined our staff in the past year, and he and his wife welcomed a baby girl in July. We will miss his presence on our team while he serves.

As Ukraine moves ahead into a new year, war continues to sow uncertainty and trauma. From frequent drone and missile activity and interruptions in utilities, to saying goodbye to loved ones who have been called to serve, everyone is affected all of the time. Those who are serving and those who wait at home for them to return would much appreciate your prayers and positive thoughts. As always, we will continue to love, care for, and support our folks through it all.




