At their meeting in October, the Session of Winter Park Presbyterian Church accepted a recommendation from the Stephen Ministers that the Stephen Ministry program at WPPC enter into a time of "sabbatical." As of December 31, 2017, the Stephen Ministry program will pause their ministry until a future date when we choose to restart this ministry program.

The Stephen ministry program has been a wonderful ministry here at WPPC for many years. In recognition of this fact, the Session adopted the following resolution: "Whereas the Stephen Ministry program of Winter Park Presbyterian Church has faithfully ministered to the members and friends of this church, and whereas the Stephen Ministers have joyfully and tirelessly committed themselves to helping people in times of need, and whereas the Stephen Ministry program is entering a time of sabbath and will pause their ministry efforts, let it be resolved that the Session of Winter Park Presbyterian Church, on behalf of the entire congregation, expresses its deepest and sincerest appreciation for those who have committed themselves to this important ministry, and expresses its deepest and sincerest appreciation to God for the ministry that has been accomplished through these Stephen Ministers."

All ministry programs in a church have a natural life cycle. Some years a ministry will flourish and have a lot of energy, while other years there may be struggles and challenges. Over the last 12-18 months we have been unable to find new leaders to step in and take a leadership role in this ministry. In light of this, the decision was made to pause the ministry until new leadership emerges.

Until that time, the pastoral care work of the Stephen Ministers will be assumed by others, namely the pastoral staff and the deacons. The pastors and deacons have a wide range of resources to be able to help those facing pastoral care needs, including connections to professional resources in the community. As always, if you or someone you know needs help, please reach out to a deacon or a pastor, and we can help.

I am grateful for the ministry of all in this church, for together we are the body of Christ in the world.

January 7

Global Warming Facts for Faith-based Decisions

For all the talk about climate change, there's still a great deal of debate about what it all means, especially among Christians. This lesson, led by Gene Pickler, will focus on the book, *A Climate for Change*, authored by a climate scientist and a pastor. Through an examination of the complex science and long-held misconceptions about global warming, this session will explore the role our Christian faith can play in guiding our opinions on this important global issue.

January 21

The Making of the New Testament Canon: The Authority of the Early Church

The need to have written authorities for what to believe and how to live drove Christians to construct a *canon* of Scripture. Having already accepted the Jewish Scriptures (The Christian Old Testament) as an authoritative account of God's word, the need for additional, distinctively Christian authorities standing on equal footing with the Old Testament writings arose. This session will focus on how early Christian leaders debated which books of the apostles to include in the "New" Testament. Discussion will be led by Gene Pickler.

January 28

Ministry with the Homeless: Homeward Bound

Meeting the needs of the homeless in our communities is an issue many individuals and congregations are trying to find ways to address. The function of Homeward Bound, a ministry of Orlando Presbyterian Church is twofold - part financial and part relational. It provides specific financial assistance to partner churches for meeting the needs of our homeless neighbors through (a) reunification with supportive family and friends or (b) providing emergency housing in a critical situation. It also provides resources and training as needed to encourage and equip individuals who feel called to a face-to-face ministry with our homeless neighbors in crisis. Presented by Dawn Neff.

Mary Van Hook and Melanie & Peter Rice plan to visit Cuban Presbyterian churches at the end of February under the auspices of the Central Florida Presbytery. The trip's purpose is to explore establishing a relationship between the Winter Park Presbyterian Church and one or more churches in Cuba. Several other churches in the Central Florida Presbytery have already done so to the great benefit of both their churches and the respective Cuban churches.

Some might be surprised to hear that Presbyterian churches exist in Cuba. They do, and they have been around for some time, albeit under trying conditions in some cases. In fact, Cuba comprises three Presbyteries with their own seminary, which is shared with other Protestant denominations. Some of the Presbyterian churches do quite well, while others struggle a bit.

This trip is a continuation of past efforts Winter Park Presbyterian Church has made to establish relationships with Presbyterians in Cuba. Some may remember that Larry Cuthill, a previous pastor at our church, organized several trips to Cuba to do just that. However, the focus now is to help one or more individual Cuban churches develop their own missions. Mary's, Melanie's, and Peter's charge is to explore how the Winter Park Presbyterian Church might connect with one or more of these churches.

The Cuba Mission folks at the Central Florida Presbytery told us it is customary to take our Cuban church hosts small, practical gifts of items often lacking in their environment. Among the items on the list are included the following over-the-counter medications:

These items will be gratefully received and carefully shared among the Cuban congregants. And yes, while Cuba does have a well-developed public health system, it apparently does not do so well in distributing over-the-counter medications. So, any donations of these items from members of the Winter Park Presbyterian Church would be much appreciated.

Finally, the Presbyterian pastors in Cuba are still few and over-worked, with many of them serving more than one Church. Consequently, they have asked each participating Central Florida church to contribute \$300 for a pastoral retreat to give these hard-working shepherds a well-deserved educational break in the form of a retreat. Any help in amassing that sum also would be appreciated.

We are excited and a little nervous about our upcoming trip. We would love to hear your thoughts about it, as well as any suggestions you might offer to make us more effective.


