I pray that you might not waste time and energy on resolutions that will be gone in a few weeks, or choose to focus on all the ways you can be better. Rather, I pray that you might look at yourself and see the wonder that God has created in you, observe the path that God has taken you down over the last year of your life, and take in all the ways you have been made stronger and better by it. You are beautiful; a wondrous creation in Christ. And I hope you will join me in this next year as we see just where the Spirit will call us!

CHECK OUT WHAT'S NEW IN YOUR WPPC LIDRARY



Your church library, established in 1958, has about 6,000 books. Many of which are religious ones, but also interesting biographies and lots of fiction. Many people in our congregation have donated books recently, too. Some examples are:

• "The Boys in the Boat" - A riveting tale of beating the odds and the Germans at the 1936 Olympics; a portrait of nine American boys in their quest for gold.

• "The Shack" by William Paul Young - A kind invitation to journey to the very heart of God; spiritually profound, theologically enlightening, and life impacting.

• "Burning Bushes Everywhere" by Guinevere Grier - The God who was, is and will be; a book about understanding stories in the Bible. *Where is the Kingdom of God?* is the question this book tries to answer.

• "The Great Republic" by Sir Winston Churchill and edited by his grandson, Winston S. Churchill - Churchill's personal vision of American history. This book retells some of the best short histories of the Revolutionary War and the Civil War ever written. Sir Winston Churchill's mother was American so he had a deep warmth of feeling for this country and a sense of its special destiny. Sir Winston Churchill was the author of 42 books, including a 6-volume history.

• Max Lucado is an author of many personal religious books. A great number are in our library in section 248. Now a children's book he wrote, "You Are Special" has been added to our collection. It tells the story of small wooden people called wemmicks. It is a message of how the world evaluates them, God cherishes each of them, just as they are. This book is beautifully illustrated.
