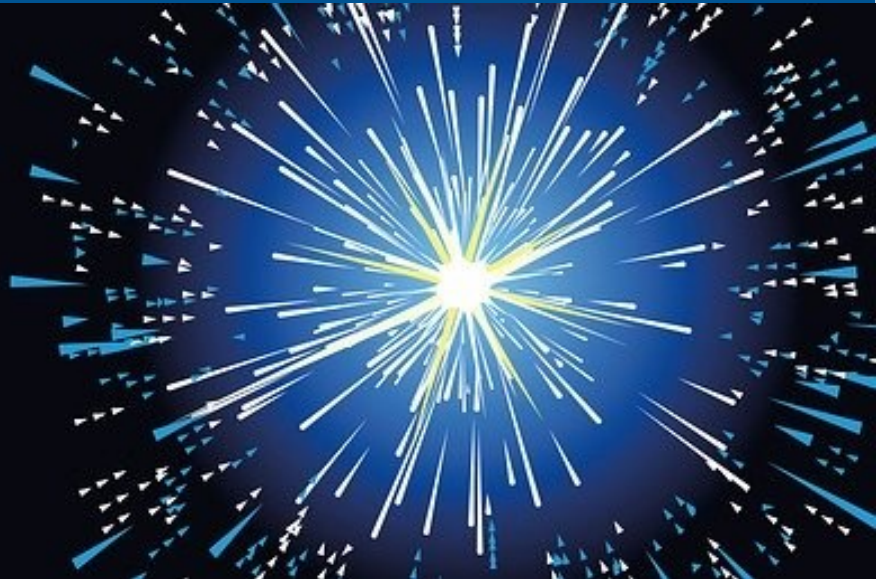

January 5th—Update on Scripture Union Missionaries

Deep in the Andes Mountains, the once ugly life of abandoned boys is transformed to a life of hope and peace in the beautiful setting of snow-capped mountains and breathtaking sunsets. The community they call Girasoles Kusi was a dream and vision of Missionaries Paul and Marty Clark, and many WPPC members have helped that dream come true. Barbara Sayles (official Friend of Kusi) took a team of 20 to Yungay, Peru in July, and will share excerpts of her trip with us. Come see the impact many of you have had on the work of the Clarks & Scripture Union, and the homes in both Yungay and Ica, and most importantly the role you have played in giving hope to little boys who once had no hope of a normal life.

January 12th—Gordon and Dorothy Gartrell-Missionaries to Brazil

The Gartrell's are working to equip and empower lay leaders in the United Presbyterian Church of Brazil because there is a major shortage of trained pastors in the country. Both Gordon and Dorothy have a life background in Brazil and training in education and the ministry.

January 19th—Spiritual Conversation Series

Continuing with the *Spiritual Conversation Series* of the Relationships in Action Sunday School Class, our friend from the Towers, Paul Hutsko, will give a *chair yoga class*. He asks that participants either wear sneakers or bring sweat socks and wear slacks and loose fitting shirts/blouses during this class. Paul says, "One aspect of Christian practice is meditation, but Christian meditation does not use the body movements that I find so helpful with yoga." Observers and participants are all welcomed. If possible participants are hesitant about Sunday going-to-church clothes, we note that WPPC has traditionally welcomed all regardless of apparel. The *Spiritual Conversation Series* invites people to share formative ideas and practices which have helped shape their beliefs and fortify their faith. Matt Straub will serve as moderator.

January 26th—The Holy Land Revealed, Lesson 7: Fortifications and Cult Practices

Apart from the political histories of the kingdoms of Israel and Judah, there are fascinating stories to be told as they relate to the everyday lives of the people. This session focuses on the fortifications and religious practices of their populations. Examples in which archaeological evidence corresponds with accounts in the Hebrew Bible will be explored. Gene Pickler will lead the discussion.

Relationships in Action (301)

Relationships in Action is a Sunday School class that studies issues “with the Bible in one hand and the newspaper in the other.” Each week features a different theme and a different speaker to present each topic. They are interested in social issues that affect their lives and the lives of others and how we as followers of Christ can be a factor in positive change.

Seekers (315)

The Seekers is a discussion based Sunday school class that studies a wide variety of topics ranging from Books of the Bible to Theology to Current Events. They are a support group that spends time on fellowship as well as discussion and they are able to disagree, yet move in a positive direction during their discussions.

One of the most important aspects of growing faith in Youth is the ability to form relationships with other Christians as we learn to carry out our faith. This year, Youth Group will be doing just that! Every Sunday night, from 5:00-7:00 PM, the Youth Disciples of WPPC come together for dinner and fellowship that includes mission projects, discussions, worship, and some fun offsite events along the way. This year our discussions will revolve around relationships; those we have with each other, Christ, enemies, family, teachers, even technology! All you need to bring is yourself and an open mind!



Deacon's Den

A new year has begun and those who make resolutions have joined the fitness center because, after all, what do most people want? Here is a better idea: for 2020, resolve to be a peacemaker. Does this mean that you should work for world peace? No, it means that you should strive for self-peace.

A recent article entitled "10 Notes to Self We Need to Read 10 Times a Day Until They Sink In" contains words of wisdom and self-awareness. The article is from a secular point of view; however, biblical principles apply to this "note":

Peace does not mean to be in a place where there is no chaos, trouble, or hard realities to deal with. Peace means to be in the midst of all those things and still remain mentally, emotionally, and physically centered.

This is what Jesus teaches us throughout his sermons. He understood that there would always be conflict in the world, but that we as individuals could have personal peace through our belief and faith in God. His benediction to his disciples after the last supper says, "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give to you."

Paul also wrote about the peace of Christ and reminded believers to pass it on to others. This outward demonstration of the inward faith is a continual theme in his letters. Galatians 5:22 says, "the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control." These are summation of how to live a faithful life.

The Old Testament book of Numbers contains one of the best known verses about peace and is painted on the wall of Advent Health in Orlando: "The Lord bless you and keep you; the Lord make his face to shine upon you, and be gracious to you; the Lord lift up his countenance upon you, and give you peace." This blessing from the Lord to the Israelites through Moses and Aaron has been passed down through generations and is summed up by C. S. Lewis in *Mere Christianity*: "God cannot give us a happiness and peace apart from Himself, because it is not there. There is no such thing."

If each of us lives by these principles, there will be peace in our corner of the earth.

Sunday, January 26, is the first quarterly collection date for 2 Cents A Meal this year. Please continue your support for P.A.T.H. (Presbyterian Answer to Hunger). Your contributions support the Second Harvest Food Bank, which distributes meals to partner feeding programs across our six-county area; Society of St. Andrew (SOSA), which coordinates gleaning events with volunteers to provide fresh, nutritious produce to local food banks; Alliance for International Reforestation (AIR) in Guatemala, which plants trees to provide fruit and prevent mudslides, as well as building and installing fuel-efficient brick stoves in remote poverty-stricken villages, and Madagascar Project (Dan and Elizabeth Turk, PC [USA] missionaries), which allows Dan to train seminary students in the planting and cultivation of fruit trees, and helps Elizabeth implement a community health program, teach AIDS awareness and advise the family planning program.

Your contributions in the past have helped our partners combat hunger in many ways and in many places. Thank you for your continued support.



Again we have an additional number of books donated to the library.

An excellent book to read is *The Simple Faith of Mister Rogers*. This is written by a minister's wife who was friends with Mr. Rogers from 1994 until he died of cancer in 2003. Each day he taught God's message without preaching a word. For over 30 years he visited children using puppets to teach. People didn't realize he was a Presbyterian minister.

Joe Biden—Promise Me, Dad is a book about a year in his life dealing with many things. Important in his life is his family, and in 2013 his older son, Beau, was diagnosed with a malignant brain tumor and his survival was based on chemo and a series of operations. Beau did lose his life. This book covers a year (2014-15) when Joe Biden traveled more than 100,000 miles across the world dealing with crisis in Ukraine, Central America and Iraq, and this family crisis.

Bobby Kennedy—A Raging Spirit by Chris Matthews. He follows the life of Bobby Kennedy from altar boy to his years fighting for the rights of African Americans, Latinos, and Native Americans. He covers many events of Bobby's start in politics, his fight for civil rights as Attorney General and his tragic run for president.

Churchill & Orwell—The Fight for Freedom by Thomas Ricks. Here is a formidable pairing. Winston Churchill and George Orwell, two of the most famous figures of the 20th century. Ricks has fresh things to say about these two. They both faced crisis with moral courage and demonstrated that an individual can make a difference. Pictures in this book add a lot.

Born Standing Up by Steve Martin. This book was named one of the ten best nonfiction books of 2007 by *Time Magazine*. Martin spent 15 years in standup comedy before he became an "overnight" success. Steve Martin wrote novels, plays, and nonfiction. This book is about a comic's life. Jerry Seinfeld said *Born Standing Up* is absolutely magnificent; one of the best books ever written about comedy and being a comedian.

There are many more interesting biographies in our church library. Start the year off right by reading one!





NOT IN OUR CLASSROOM? WE'RE OUTDOORS!

The weather has been *amazing* so we're using our outdoor spaces to their fullest.

Classes are often seen playing games on the newly fenced front lawn. Having a campus surrounded by nature allows us to take frequent walks to observe what is happening in our environment.

Our Nature Center and large outdoor garden boxes are the sites of a lot of digging, planting and watering. Children love to see what their seeds become, and enjoy picking the fruits and vegetables and tasting them. Art and science experiences are frequently moved outdoors into the shady Nature Center where the children are surrounded by flowering plants that attract butterflies.

The playground is also treated as an active learning center in which teachers interact with the children pulling language, science, math and social studies skills out of running, skipping, climbing, swinging and sliding.



The Kittens class is learning how fruit and vegetables grow by observing the orange tree, tomatoes and other plants growing in the garden boxes.

REGISTRATION FOR 2020/2021 SCHOOL YEAR
