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### Vacation Bible School Thank You!

What does thankfulness mean to me? I'm sure at least everyone has heard this question at least once in their lives. Probably in grade school, just around November, before dismissing for the Thanksgiving holidays. Or perhaps a parent or aunt or uncle, maybe even a grandparent asked you the question, "What are you thankful for?" as you sat around the table passing mashed



potatoes and green bean casserole. I always had a hard time with the idea of thankfulness. I always knew what I was supposed to say at those times. "I'm thankful for family, I'm thankful for friends, and I'm thankful for this time we have to spend with one another." But if I'm entirely honest, after a week of sleeping on a couch, two five hour drives in the backseat with a younger brother, and meal after meal of dressing up...thankfulness was something I struggled with during Thanksgiving. There are many cogs and gears that must work in time together to keep day to day operations running smoothly. And 70 kids, while a truly joyful thing, can be a lot to handle and take care of. And yet, this year, concerns were very rarely in my sights.

Dozens of volunteers gave their time, energy, talents, and even money, to make sure that this masterpiece ran smoothly. Adults escorted children around the church all week and they got to know each of them in a way I could not do alone. Other adults worked out lessons, planning each of their days with fun activities that suited each age group, giving them education and fun, all things necessary to promote Christian growth. And a select few adults, were wonderfully "just there." They did not have a designated place, but merely filled in as necessary, going where they were needed and allowing themselves to be used as I deemed necessary.

Every year I look upon the undertaking that is Vacation Bible School, and it is always a good practice in humility to confront the fact that I cannot do it alone. I cannot fully express the thankfulness that I feel for all the volunteers, youth and adults alike, that made last week possible. Each child that graced our church felt special and wanted. The time given to them was an experience not soon forgotten.



Thank you. Thank you for your support. Thank you for your endurance. Thank you for your time and your talents. Thank you for being willing to try something new, get up early in June, and greet each day with a smile. Thank you for decorating, for feeding children, for singing songs, playing games, sharing heroics, discovering science, and sharing Bible Stories with them. Thank you for taking pictures, for donating to the cause, for making slideshows, putting band-aids on boo-boos, making sure the group stays together, and above all showing the love of Christ in everything you said and did! Well done. Now be sure to take a nice long nap! You've earned it!

### **Montreat Youth Conference**

The Montreat Youth Conference, in Montreat, North Carolina, is often viewed as something of a right of passage for many Presbyterian Youth. It is something looked forward to and counted down to, even among those who have never been there.

This year I had the opportunity to take three remarkable young women who had all just finished their Junior year of High School. Usually I try to plan these big summer trips for closer to the end of the summer, late July or early August, but certain circumstances meant that this year we would be attending week one of the conference. It was a busy and hectic time in the church, VBS was on the horizon, but in the end there were no regrets that any of us had gone.

The theme of the week was *The Missing Peace*. Peace...an ever illusive endangered emotion in the society we live in. Together, with five hundred other youth, we met every day for Keynote, small group, recreation, and worship, to focus and find this missing peace and along the way we discovered friendship, fun, and serenity (at least as much serenity as you can get among 500 youth).

As always, it felt like the week ended all too soon, and just as it always does, the road back home seemed a lot longer than it did when we were on our way. Through the heavy sleeping and the peace we felt as we searched out license plates, the girls took up the notebook and pen and wrote down their reflections for future generations who might be unsure about whether this is an experience worth having. Read for yourself, but in my opinion, these thoughts share with us that Montreat is a blessing, no matter what month you arrive.

"Montreat, in my opinion, was one of the best experiences I have ever experienced. The feel of God was everywhere in the faces, trees, and waters. I have learned a lot from the worships every night and every morning. Montreat is a place of belonging and finding a way to help the world. I would have loved to be able to have attended again but I was grateful to have had the opportunity to have attended at least once. I learned things about myself from being at Montreat. I have learned and enjoyed learning about others views of the world. I have never been to the mountains but having Montreat in the mountains helped the attendees to experience the presence of God more intensely. I believe with my whole heart that every youth should have the opportunity to experience the wonders of Montreat. I wish I had the opportunity to have gone sooner and more times, but as I said, I don't regret this decision. I had the best time." -Garsha Thomas, 17.

"Summertime and the living is easy ..." or so go the song lyrics. We love summer because it is a time to relax and do less, or at least something different from what we do the other nine or ten months of the year. If you have children, you have the satisfaction of knowing that they completed another school year, and the question of what to do with them for the next three months. A vacation and/or summer camp (and Vacation Bible School) will keep them busy for a while, and

when they are old enough they can get a summer job. This pattern might continue through high school and college, and then they are adults and make plans on their own.

As we get older, the pattern changes because the focus of our life changes. When the children are grown and out of the house, our lives no longer rotate around their activities.
