I first heard that phrase from one of my professors who was, shall we say, "overly fond" of it. Before tests and papers, during difficult times in our lives, and especially anytime one said the phrase "we'll get through this...somehow..." someone was always quick to step in and comment, "not somehow...but triumphantly!" I think it was meant to be a rallying cry, a phrase that was reminiscent of Philippians 4:13 "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." It was a reminder, that when times are tough or we have to put our nose to the grindstone, the petal to the metal, or [insert your favorite idiom here] we are strong in Christ and can tackle any problem confronted us. How could I not when I'm hearing the word "somehow" used at nearly the end of so many sentences. "The Pastor is gone, but we'll get through it...somehow." "Money is tight but we'll get through it...somehow." "Change is in the air, but we'll work through it...somehow."

Not somehow...but triumphantly!

It's true, change is in the air for Winter Park Presbyterian Church, money is tight, and Jason has departed. To think things can ever go back to the way they were is an impossible dream. But that doesn't mean it's a bad thing. In the months, and even the years ahead, we will have many challenges to face, many crossroads to walk, many paths to choose from, but we will do it! We will overcome each obstacle as it comes. We may get tired and worn down, and some weeks we will grope for a hand to hold, but when we remember why we do the mission that has been handed down to us by God, how can we say we will just do it "somehow"? We can do all things through Christ who has always been our rock and our light, who strengthens us for the journey ahead and gives us brothers and sisters to support us on our way.

We can do all things, not somehow, but triumphantly!

July 29

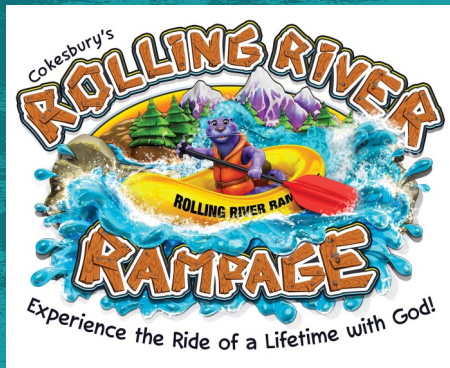

DEACON'S DEN

Did you know that the Church office has durable medical equipment that you can borrow? Anyone who has need of a wheelchair, walker, cane, or crutches can call the office and check out the item for as long as necessary. There are also shower chairs, potty chairs, IV stands, leg and foot braces, and even a baby gate.

All you have to do is put your name, date, and contact information on the sign-out sheet, which is kept on Barbara Hordern's reception desk. When you bring back the item, the date returned is entered on the log.

Most of the equipment is kept in a locked location and the church sexton, Kenny Lovelace, can get it for you and load it in your car. Storage is well-organized thanks to the carpentry skills of Curtis Koon. A few items, such as a wheelchair and walker, are kept in the Healthy Living Room for quick access.

If you have looked up the prices of wheelchairs recently, you know that they can cost anywhere from \$100 to \$1,000. Power wheelchairs are even more expensive, but WPPC has not been gifted with any of those. Many of these items may be covered by your insurance, but sometimes they are not. If you or someone you know, whether friend, neighbor, or relative, needs this type of equipment for a short or a long time, such as while recovering from surgery or an injury, the Church may have what will fit the bill.

Also, if you have some durable medical equipment that you no longer need, the Church willingly accepts your donation. It will be put to good use.

Winter Park and Santa Clara Presbyterian Churches Partnership

Winter Park Presbyterian Church and Santa Clara Presbyterian Church (Cuba) have created a partnership. This partnership is set within the broad partnership between the Central Florida and Central Cuba Presbyteries. This partnership will provide opportunities for both churches to gain a broader understanding of how God is working in many different ways and to connect with others as the body of Christ. Melanie and Peter Rice and Mary VanHook visited the Santa Clara church in February as part of the Central Florida Presbytery trip and an account of this visit was published in the April *Covenant*.

Santa Clara Presbyterian Church was established in 1965. It has survived many challenges and has gained new strength under its new pastor Reile Marrero Ruiz, his wife, and dedicated session members. Along with older adults, there is now a growing number of young people who play an active role in the church.

With this partnership the two churches agree to:

- *Keep each other in our thoughts and prayer knowing that God hears and answers our prayers*
- *Listen to, learn from, and work with one another.*
- *Celebrate our unity in Christ by sharing our worship services including sermons, Bible studies, and music, as well materials for Christian education and Sunday school for children.*
- *Share congregational news through such means as e mails, bulletins, and picture.*
- *Encourage participation partnership activities of children and youth.*
- *Visit one another whenever possible.*

We will do all of this while recognizing and respecting each other's unique church and cultural contexts. It is important we practice mutuality in planning and implementing projects and activities.

This partnership will open new doors and possibilities for our church. Fortunately, email is an effective tool for exchanging information and pictures as well to help develop this relationship. Please let us know if you would like to be involved in this effort.

Rev. Gordon and Dorothy Gartrell



Gordon and Dorothy Gartrell, missionaries supported by WPPC, were featured in the Summer edition of *Presbyterian Mission Crossroads*. The Gartrells have been missionaries in Brazil since 1990. Gordon grew up in Brazil where his parents were missionaries for more than 30 years. Brazil faces a challenge of more churches than pastors. The Gartrells are serving the churches by helping lay leaders develop their spiritual knowledge and skills so that they can direct worship when there is no available pastor. Lay leaders are also helped to create and implement educational programs.

Dorothy also teaches English classes and works with students from 6 to 76 years. Gordon and Dorothy met with members of WPPC during their recent visit in February

Cuba Visitors

WPPC had the privilege to host Pastor Marlon Irrarragorri, pastor at Caibaguan Presbyterian Church and Jaqueline, director of music of Santa Spiritus Presbyterian Church in Cuba in June. Marlon had played a major role in hosting the recent Central Florida Presbyterian Church trip to Cuba in February. They were delegates of the Central Cuba Presbytery to visit churches in Florida, Illinois, and Maryland. Marlon and Jacqueline contributed to the Vacation Bible School by conducting the mission part of the program on Tuesday. They described Cuba and its churches and led the children in a Cuban song.

Marlon and Jacqueline joined church members for a lunch/learn sponsored by the Compassion Committee on Wednesday. Marlon described the very difficult times experienced by the churches originally during the early years following the Cuban revolution. Many people left the church while a small and courageous group of individuals maintained the churches. Churches are now permitted to carry out their important community ministries. Marlon also described the hardships experienced by ordinary Cubans as a result of the US embargo. Although salaries are very low (for example, \$20.00 a month for a teacher) imported goods are very expensive and tend to be inferior in quality. Automobiles are extremely expensive (equivalent of a \$500 used car in the US costs over \$10,000 in Cuba). The churches in Central Florida Presbytery have partnered to help Cuban churches in terms of transportation—purchased a bus a few years ago. Despite these challenges, Cuban churches continue to be strong and help give people hope. A shortage of pastors is a problem. Marlon also stressed that the Cuban people are joyous and find reasons to be joyful. Those of us who have visited Cuba experienced this. We also felt very welcomed by our hospitable brothers and sisters in Cuba.

When asked how we can further our partnership with the Santa Clara Church, Marlon stressed the importance of finding ways to communicate with them so that we can develop relationships—SUCH AS personal visits and email. As we get to know one other we can learn how we can help each other. A side note here—Reile, pastor of the Santa Clara Church (our new partner) just emailed asking what needs we have that they could be praying for.

2 CENTS A MEAL

Sunday, July 22, 2018, is the next collection day for 2 Cents A Meal. Please continue your support for P.A.T.H. (Presbyterian Answer To Hunger). Dan trains seminary students in the planting and cultivation of fruit trees, and helps Elizabeth implement a community health program, teach AIDS awareness and advise the family planning program. Nancy Appich has read every Thursday morning to the three and four year olds in the preschool all school year and will again next year. They enjoy hearing both new tales and the same stories repeated over and over. So do come take out some children's books and read to your little ones. 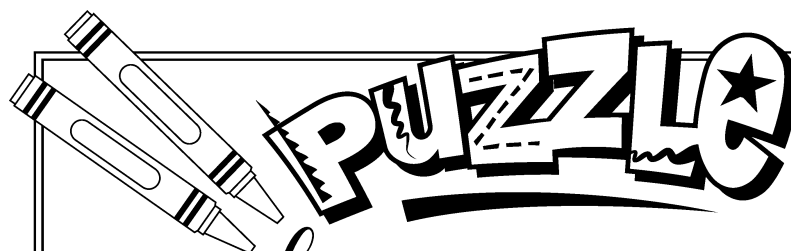
