

Prepare yourselves, for what I'm about to say is very un-Presbyterian.

I love a good change.

Yup, you heard that right - I love a good change. I love the kind of change that summer presents us with: a simple, lovely, change of pace. Don't get me wrong, I love the predictability that comes with the other seasons, with school being in session and meetings that are consistent week after week. But I love the change of pace that summer affords. It's not slower, though I could see how someone from the outside might perceive that. Instead, the change of pace that summer brings is intense bursts of activity that demand hard work, sweat, and devotion that I don't get to see over the school year.

No, youth group is not "in session" at the moment, but our summer "Mission Mornings" are in full swing. Instead of meeting for two hours every week to share a meal and discussion, the youth and I meet, roughly every other week on a Wednesday for several long hours to fulfill various mission needs throughout the Central Florida area. These needs include packing lunches for school children who struggle with hunger when school is not in session, organizing the Winter Park Presbyterian Church library, and volunteering in a cafeteria at *Give Kids the World*, bussing tables, serving breakfast, and providing drinks to families who have never had the opportunity to have a "normal vacation". The hours are long. At the end of the day feet are usually very sore, and sometimes bodies feel very weary. But as we sit down to our fellowship meal at the end (let's not forget that we are Presbyterian and food is a necessity for gatherings), there is a feeling of satisfaction that we don't usually get to feel after a Sunday night discussion. We speak of the jobs that we've done and the experiences we've had, and the impact it's had on our thinking. It never ceases to amaze me that in one morning or afternoon session it feels as though we have accomplished more than we do in a month of Youth Group meetings. Difficult as the work may sometimes be, these trips are what the Youth will count down to all year long. That kind of excitement is contagious. It's life giving. It drains the energy but renews the Spirit in wonderful and unimaginable ways.

Last week, I had the honor and privilege to once again direct Vacation Bible School at Winter Park Presbyterian Church. If you want to know what the Youth feel on their Mission Mornings then Vacation Bible School is, in my opinion, the closest you can come as an adult. VBS is a roller coaster. From start to finish. It's an exhilarating ride that I get to experience every year with well over 35 volunteers; a wild experience that we participate in with roughly 70 children. It's tiring. It drains the energy. By the end of the week there are more than a few jokes going around about needing naps, snacks, and baths. But it's worth it. When all is said and done, after the naps are taken and the snacks are consumed and volunteers feel like they can walk again, year after year I am astonished to find just how many people look forward to working this event. I'm encouraged by the ways that you let it shape and guide your lives for years to come.

I may still need a nap or two before I'm recovered, but to the Youth who give so much of themselves during Summer Mission Mornings and the Adults who work fervently with me for Vacation Bible School, you have my many, many thanks! Thank you, not only for your work, but for inspiring me throughout our summer, and for astounding me by what can be accomplished when many minds act as one and all hearts are turned toward Christ in service.

"Jesus loves me, this I know/For the Bible tells me so ..."

We learned this song in Sunday School when we were children, and it was our introduction to God, Jesus, love, the Bible, and more lessons about life than can be described here. When we read and hear a Bible verse, then discuss it, we learn its meaning. When the same verse is set to music, we learn its impact on our sense of awareness of the tone, the highs and lows, loud and soft, fast and slow. Music affects our mood and enhances our understanding of the words. Here are a few examples of Bible verses set to music. Feel free to sing along.

The Psalms – The most well-known of the 150 Psalms is number twenty-three. It has been set to music more times that any other and is familiar to us because it is often read or sung at funerals and memorial services. "The King of love my shepherd is/ His goodness faileth never./ I nothing lack for I am His/ and He is mine forever." What comforting words set to a soothing tune. There is a project to set all of the Psalms to music because they are, in essence, songs. We only wish we knew how they were sung in King David's time.

Christmas – "Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming" (from Isaiah 11:1) is sweetly melodic and speaks of the rose that comes from the stump of Jesse, from which we learn of the ancestor of Jesus. Then there is the soaring "Angels We Have Heard on High" (from Luke 2:8-14) with the refrain of "Gloria in excelsis deo" echoed from the different parts of the choir. It brings to mind a picture of the heavenly hosts announcing the Holy birth by singing "Glory to God in the Highest".

Easter – "Jesus Christ Is Risen Today" (from I Corinthians 15:3-4) is often used as the processional on Easter Sunday; and, of course, the "Hallelujah" chorus from Handel's "Messiah", which we use as the benediction response. Both are very triumphant songs to celebrate the resurrection of Christ, so we want to stand up and cheer. We remember that the cross was for death, but the empty tomb denotes victory over death.

We are moved emotionally by music but should also look deeper to understand how the music interprets the words. Writing about music and listening to music are two different aspects of learning more about it. Just remember this from Psalm 66 when you hear any worship music: "Make a joyful noise to God, all the earth;/ sing the glory of his name;/ give to him glorious praise."




Friendship Club: The Friendship Club is taking a break and will meet again on 10/4.
