

Strangers in our Midst

When I retired a few years ago Carol and I were spending almost half the year in Montreat, North Carolina. We owned a vacation home there which we had built in 2000 and were enjoying being able to spend more time in the mountains. One of the things we decided to do was to become more involved in the life of the church which we had visited many times over the years while on vacation. They had an excellent pastor and we especially enjoyed their early worship service. We attended regularly for a couple of months, casually met a few people, and were ready to become members. Before doing so we thought we ought to attend, at least once, another small church in town, the Montreat Presbyterian Church.

It was a cold day when we first went there to worship and the heat was not working. They did not have a permanent pastor and were being served by a Stated Supply. There was every reason for this to be a one Sunday visit for us. But the warmth of the congregation was absolutely amazing. We were welcomed immediately as people introduced themselves to us and gave us name tags. At the end of the service others

engaged us in conversation and we easily spent half an hour talking with people. I might add that there were other visitors that day who were welcomed in the same way. We decided to go back the next week and when we arrived we found that they already had our name tags filled out and waiting for us. Now, it wasn't because they had a clever system for welcoming visitors. But what a person could not help but realize was that they were genuinely interested in everyone who came through their church door, whether that was someone new in the community, a college student, or a person on vacation that they would likely never see again. In all the churches I have served or been a part of in my ministry I have never witnessed one that was as welcoming as Montreat Presbyterian. As you can imagine that became our North Carolina church, and it still is.



All churches need to continually reflect on how welcoming they are to those who come into their midst. We do this not because we are hoping those people will come back and eventually become members of the church, but because they are children of God. All of us need the loving support of other Christians. For those who decide to try to find a church it is often a very profound or urgent need. I strongly encourage all of us to be vigilant in noticing those who are new. Let's then make it a point to speak to them, engage them in conversation, perhaps, introduce them to someone else. If we can't find someone who is new we can, of course, find someone whom we don't know very well and do the same thing. Remember the words of our Lord, "I was hungry and you gave me food, thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a *stranger* and you welcomed me......as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." (Matt 25:35, 40)

Summer movie: Chariots Of Fire depicts the incredible true story of two runners whose paths cross in the 1924 Olympics. Eric Liddell is a devout Scottish Christian who runs for the glory of God. Harold Abrahams is an English Jew who runs to overcome prejudice. These runners learn from each other as they represent different countries and different hardships. Major themes presented in this film include the determination to succeed, ability to not give up, and a notion that athletes are participating in something bigger than themselves.

June 2—Chariots of Fire: Part 1 of 4

Harold Abrahams is the son of a Lithuanian, born and raised in England but "semi-deprived" as a Jew in a nominally Christian land. In 1919, just after the Great War, Eric Liddell is the son of a Presbyterian missionary, born and raised in China but of Scottish heritage. He is in Edinburgh preparing to join the mission work in China, but God has given him great skill and notoriety as a runner. Nancy Galyean will lead the discussion.

June 9-Chariots of Fire: Part 2 of 4

Abrahams and Liddell train to compete for Britain in the 1924 Summer Olympiad in Paris. Both run for kind and country, but for each there is a greater cause. Abrahams wishes to prove himself as a *bona fide* Englishman, to break down the barriers of prejudice and class that hinder him. Liddell believes he ought to use his God-given ability to run in God's name and bring him glory. Discussion will be led by Nancy Galyean.

June 16- Chariots of Fire: Part 3 of 4

Obstacles stand in the way of each man. The masters of Trinity and Caius Colleges are chagrined that Abrahams has forsaken the way of the amateur and hired a foreign coach. They chide Abrahams for behavior unbefitting a Cambridge man. Meanwhile, Liddell is shocked to learn that the heats for the 100-meter race, in which he is to run, are scheduled for Sunday. His refusal to run on the Sabbath creates a stir within the British Olympic Committee, which questions his patriotism. In the end, Abrahams and Liddell each need to vindicate their actions the only way they can—by winning. Nancy Galyean will lead the discussion.

June 23—Chariots of Fire: Part 4 of 4

Both Abrahams and Liddell have the opportunity to run in the 1924 Olympics although their preparations vary greatly. They both dig deep in give every bit of themselves. In the end, Abrahams' reaction to the result is far different from Liddel's. Discussion will be led by Nancy Galyean.

June 30—The Holy Land Revealed: Samaria and the Northern Kingdom of Israel

After the 10 northern tribes broke away from Judah and formed their own kingdom, eventually Samaria became its capital, only 35 miles from Jerusalem. Tremendous tension and rivalry developed between them. Join us as Professor Jodi Magness describes this period from the Hebrew Bible in Lesson 6 from the series. Mike Galyean will lead this discussion.

Robert Brault said, "A vacation trip is one-third pleasure, fondly remembered, and two-thirds aggravation, entirely forgotten."

Much of the hassle involved with getting away comes from packing. What do we need? How can we save space? Where are the items we haven't used since the last time we went on vacation?

Inevitably, we forget something - sunscreen, umbrella, diapers. Vacationers miss these items almost immediately and quickly replace them. Do we also often "Forget" the Bible at home? Do we leave our prayer and worship routines behind? Do we take a vacation from our faith?

We may not notice those missing "items" as quickly but they're crucial nonetheless. God never schedules a getaway from us. This summer, take a vacation with God, not from God.





WHY DO WE SERVE?

The answer to this question may not be as simple as you think. There are some who believe that in order to get into Heaven, they must do good works, that is, they must earn their way into Heaven. If, however, we listen closely to Jesus, we serve others just as God first served us.

God created the Earth, the plants, the animals, and then man. He gave man "dominion over every living creature". That means man is responsible.

God sent His son to Earth to show His love for man. Jesus said that He came "not to be served, but to serve", and He showed His willingness to serve in many ways: healing the sick, washing the disciples' feet, and many more examples.

Jesus commanded his followers, in addition to preaching the Gospel to all nations, to feed the hungry, minister to the weak, clothe the naked. They did not understand immediately until He told them that when they did these things to anyone else, it was like they were doing it to Him. This is the best answer, in my humble opinion, of why we serve.

This article is written between several memorial services for our church members. The services and receptions take a lot of planning and physical work. Afterward, everyone involved is very tired. But the one theme that flows through it all is this: our love for God is expressed by welcoming the mourners to a place of worship to celebrate the life of a loved one. We offer a little food and drink along with a kind word and a soft smile to let them know we care.

Charles Spurgeon, an English minister during the 19th century, said, "I would go to the deeps a hundred times to cheer a downcast spirit. It is good for me to have been afflicted, that I might know how to speak a word in season to one that is weary." During my first year as a Deacon, I was fearful because I did not know what to say on my first visit to a lady whom I had never met. But within a few minutes I realized that we had a mutual love for the church, and from then on, visiting became a joyful time. The English minister had his life experience, and I have mine, and that is what we share.

Why do we serve? We serve because we love God.

- ◆ *Christmas in My heart* is a timeless treasury of heart-warming stories written by various authors.
- Due South offers a collection of short essays about family, relationships, and southern culture & languages. Southerners respect tradition and know the value of a good story.
- The Inner Voice of Love by Henri J. M. Nouwen, one of the worlds great spiritual writers. For countless numbers of men and women who have to live through the pain of broken relationships or who suffer from the loss of a loved one, this book offers new courage, new hope, and new life.
- Between Friends by Lynne Gerard. Friends help us know ourselves a little better and like ourselves a little more. Friendship is something that happens naturally when the time is right, like a rainbow in the sky.
- ♦ The Purpose of Christmas by Rick Warren. Regardless of your background, religion, problems, or circumstances, Christmas really is the best news you could get. 

"Yes," he affirmed. "God made you not too many years ago."


She then placed one of her hands on her own face, noticed how smooth it was and said, "God's getting better at it now, isn't he?"

This humorous illustration of how not to get along at college also demonstrates Jesus' teaching in Matthew 7:3-5.



"How do you stand it?" his mother asked in amazement.


"Oh, I ignore them," her son replied. "I just sit here quietly, playing my bagpipes."
