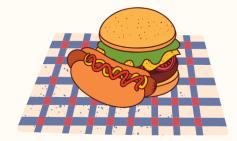
### HAMBURGERS, HOT DOGS, & MORE!

The annual Easter Egg Hunt has been a tradition for decades as Lent and Holy Week draw to a close and we pause to present the Easter Story tailored for young minds as a meaningful time apart from the colorful springtime fancy that awaits them in the Fellowship Hall. This year, the Worship and Music Committee members arrived more than a few hours early to unpack and arrange the lilies which added a stunning focus to the chancel. Holly Small expanded upon the experience by playing selections on the piano which caused a hush by young and not so young as they entered the sanctuary. As families settled into the pews, parents would point out the morning light filtering through the stained-glass windows to the little ones in hushed tones personalizing the spiritual atmosphere as all recognized that this was a special time set apart. ### Food Pantry News

### **Cash Not Cans**

Food items donated for delivery to the local Food Pantry are no longer being collected. Instead, the Deacons ask that our congregation support the church's food related humanitarian projects throughout the year, as well as the PC (USA) Special Collections. These include:

- P.A.T.H. (Presbyterian Answer To Hunger) "5 Cents a Meal" collections, 4x / year. Remaining 2025 collections are on July 27 & October 26. Second Harvest Food Bank of Central Florida and Society of St. Andrew's (fresh produce) are both beneficiaries.
- Soup-er Bowl of Caring Sunday (donate canned & boxed food for delivery to a food pantry): Sunday,
   Feb 8, 2026
- One Great Hour of Sharing (Easter Sunday offering): PC(USA) distributes 36% of donations to the Presbyterian Hunger Program and the rest to other human service efforts.

### **CHANGE AND THE CHURCH**

It is our very nature to hate change. We all tend to like a pattern of events that are reliable and consistent from week to week and anything that causes upheaval can be quite disturbing. I read once that in the New Testament, no synagogue, temple, chapel, tabernacle, building or any other meeting place was ever called a "church." The term always referred to the Christian assembly.

Matthew 18:20, "For where two or three gather together in My name, there am I with them."

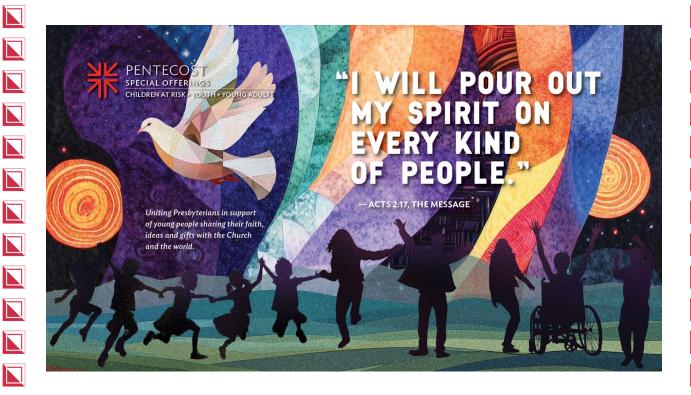

# An Opportunity to Give and Make a Difference Sunday, June 8th

Each year on Pentecost Sunday we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit, descending as tongues of fire over the heads of the Apostles, giving them the gift to speak to all nations in their own tongues and spread the Good News. The Spirit also brings us a new life on this day. With the Spirit's coming, we no longer need to settle for business as usual but can know the transforming, redeeming love of God that makes the impossible "possible". # Diana Ross's Secrets for Staying Youthful

81-year-old singer celebrity Diana Ross wore a magnificent gown with an 18-foot train embroidered with the names of her five children and eight grandchildren at the recent Met Gala. But it wasn't just the "forever family gown" that grabbed attention, Ross's youthful appearance proved that age can be just a number.

According to *TODAY*, here are Ross's four simple healthy lifestyle tips:

- Never retire. Last March, Ross told a sold-out audience in New York City that she's "never going to retire." The benefits of working later in life include a longer life expectancy and better health, say medical experts. People who are still working after the age of 65 are about three times more likely to report being in good health and about half as likely to suffer from serious health problems such as cancer or heart disease. Other studies have shown an association between reduced risk of dementia and heart attack with working in later life.
- Value family. Ross has often said that her children and grandchildren are her priority in life. Research shows that social connections are important to well-being. Dr. Amit Shah, a geriatrician at the Mayo Clinic says that social interaction yields "enormous health benefits." Shah explains that socializing with others is exercise for your brain. "It's one of the best ways to improve cognitive flexibility," he says. "It's likely more beneficial than doing crossword puzzles or other brain games."
- **Keep a routine.** Even though Ross still tours in her 80s, she makes sure that she eats regular meals and gets enough sleep, notes her daughter Rhonda Ross, whose father was the legendary record producer, Berry Gordy. In an interview with Forbes, Rhonda said, "The environment that my mother has established on tour is a real professionalism, a real civility, good mental health," she says, adding that there is no drinking or drugs on tours and most of the performers go to the gym and workout.
- Intermittent fasting. Ross practices intermittent fasting as part of her routine. Intermittent fasting involves alternating periods of eating and fasting, which can help to improve metabolism and promote overall health. Many studies suggest that intermittent fasting can reduce inflammation, improve blood sugar levels, and enhance brain function. Ross credits this eating pattern for her sustained energy and vitality, allowing her to continue performing and living life to the fullest while maintaining her youthful appearance.

April 29, 2025

Dear Friends,

In my last letter, I sent you specific prayer requests for our folks in Odesa. The concerns and prayers that you all sent out were well received and made a huge difference to all. Perhaps the biggest difference was for Ira who had been house mom to our boys until the war began.

Ira watched while her younger foster sons were relocated to Romania in the first months of the war. She waited with bated breath as, one by one, the older sons were taken into the army. The final straw was when Alosha was taken, just at the time that I penned my last newsletter to you. Since that last letter, we have learned that Alosha has been given local duty, in Odesa. This means that he must report for duty each morning, but he is permitted to return home in the evening and sleep at home. This has been a huge comfort to Ira, to him, and to us. Thank you so much for all of your prayers!

I also have another happy story to share with you concerning another of Ira's foster sons, Slavik, who was 17 years old when the war began. He was among those taken to Romania. After a few months in Romania, and when he turned 18, Slavik made the big decision to make his own way to Ireland where he obtained refugee status. He remains there to this day. He is attending school, lives in a dorm, and receives a small stipend from Ireland for his support. This all sounds very positive, and it is, but I want you to consider for a moment how very lonely a life Slavik has been living for the last two and a half years. Before the war, he lived as part of a family in a comfortable home (our boys transitional home) along with several more of our older orphan boys, with Ira as his mom and mentor. He was surrounded by family and had a built in support system. Now, he has not seen any of his Odesa family in over three years, and he is essentially on his own.

We've been in touch with him, and in recent months, it came to our attention that Slavik needed some dental work that is not provided for in his Ireland stipend. We had already learned that dental work is much more affordable in Moldova. Our immediate questions were: how to get funding, how to arrange his transport to Moldova, and how to get funds to him? All three questions were answered fairly quickly. One of our wonderful donors funded the procedures. Michelle arranged for flights for Slavik, and my husband and I decided that a quick trip to Ireland was in order to deliver the funds to him in person.

What a reunion it was! Slavik was so very happy and appreciative that we went to Ireland to spend time with him and to attend to his health needs. The hours spent with him were priceless! I got to know Slavik on a new level, and I am so proud of him. He has remained positive and he is focused on a good future. He plans to continue school and perhaps pursue a job in the culinary field. Slavik clearly took with him all of the lessons he learned under Ira's loving tutelage, and I saw first- hand just how valuable an experience it is when we offer our older orphans the opportunity to be part of a family at a time in their lives when they are so vulnerable.

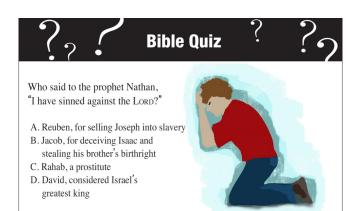
