*Lord, even as we enjoy the Souper Bowl Football game,
help us to be mindful of those without a bowl of soup to eat.*

This is the prayer that began a nationwide movement in 1990 that would one day be called the *Souper Bowl of Caring*. Said by a Pastor of a Presbyterian Church in South Carolina, that first year twenty-two churches raised \$5700 worth of soup, money, and other donations that went back into their local community to support the homeless and food insecure. In the years that followed, *The Souper Bowl of Caring* would become a staple of church ministry around the nation. Youth would take on the burden of raising awareness, collecting goods, and counting cans.

Every year the youth at Winter Park Presbyterian participate in this wonderful (and relatively simple) nationwide event. It is something that I was a part of in my youth and have been happy to continue in churches that I have worked in since then. During my service in Texas, I was lucky enough to speak with a director of a Food Pantry who told me that they struggle year round for donations, but what was gathered up among all the churches on *Souper Bowl of Caring* would last until about June. That was a small town. Winter Park is much bigger, with more homeless, but when I stand in awe at the end of the day and look at all that was collected I am often overwhelmed with the generosity of those who donate. To us a can of soup is simple—it's ninety-nine cents of deliciousness that goes well with salad, grilled cheese, diets, and cold nights. But for someone who is struggling to feed their family, a can of soup is dinner. It is perhaps the only thing a child may have until school lunch the next day.

941 cans!




I won't lie to you. When the children set that goal of 800 this year, I was a bit skeptical. So were others. I know I told more that a couple of people the week before the collection that if we didn't get the goal that meant we had a built in one next year. To hear the grand total, to listen to those who counted do recounts, to watch that number grow higher and higher, was amazing! 941 cans! It's absolutely outstanding. And no, 941 cans may not seem like a lot for battling hunger for months on end...soup kitchens serve hundreds of meals in one day alone, but consider this...


As of the day I am writing this (February 21, 2019), the *Souper Bowl of Caring* website lists 4059 churches that participated this year and over 8 million dollars worth of donations were collected! 8 million dollars! All going to 2855 charities in local communities to help fight hunger and provide for our brothers and sisters in need! 941 of those cans came from you. There are people who ate the soup you donated last night for dinner, some who are receiving a can right now and breathing a sigh of relief, and somewhere there is a director saying a prayer of thanksgiving for this wonderful event stocking their shelves for months to come! A can of soup might not seem like much to you, but to someone else it is life.

So, next year...do I hear 1000?

LUNCH/LEARN WITH AIR MARCH 24TH

DEACON'S DEN



St. Patrick's history of solidifying Christianity in Ireland in the 5th century BCE(AD) is very similar to the journeys of Paul four hundred years earlier. Both men were anti-Christian in their early years, then had a traumatic experience, followed by years of study and preparation before setting out on their missions.

Patrick was kidnapped from his home in Britain as a boy of 16 by Irish pirates and sold into slavery. He spent six years herding sheep and pigs - and praying - in the north of Ireland before he stowed away on a boat back to Britain. After he reached his home, he had a dream that he should go back to Ireland and tell the people about God. He prepared for that task by studying in a French monastery for more than twelve years, becoming a bishop, and earning the blessing of the Pope.

Like Paul, Patrick traveled the land and preached the Gospel, converting many; but not everyone agreed with what he was saying, so he frequently found himself imprisoned. Patrick continued his mission throughout Ireland for twenty years, where he baptized people, and established monasteries, schools, and churches. He died on March 17 in the late 400's (the exact date is not certain). His legacy continues to have an impact, because although he was not the first Christian missionary to Ireland, his tenacity and willingness to incorporate native Irish ritual into his lessons about God made those lessons endure. For example, he placed the sun, a potent Irish symbol, over the cross, creating what we know as the Celtic cross.

The celebration of St. Patrick's Day on March 17 each year originally started as a commemoration of the patron saint of Ireland. Today it is more a reason to eat corned beef and cabbage and wear green everything; it is a bigger holiday in America than it is in Ireland. We should remember, however, the person who tirelessly gave of himself to bring the good news of Jesus Christ to a country where he had once been enslaved. His ministry inspired others to become missionaries who traveled to other lands, which is a story for another day...

CHECK OUT WHAT'S NEW IN YOUR WPPC LIBRARY



What is worship? To regard with respect, honor or devotion is the definition of worship given in the dictionary. Christian worship is a dialogue between God and His people. There are six elements of worship: prayer, scripture (read & proclaimed), baptism, the Lord's Supper, self-offering, and also relating to each other and the world.

- ◆ Prayer: the heart of worship—communication with God through written or spoken words, thoughts, or song.
- ◆ Scripture: the reading, hearing, preaching and confession the word are central for Christian worship. The proclaiming of the word is expressed in music.
- ◆ Baptism: God's grace and faithfulness so that baptism is needed only once. Children are baptized as infants and make professions of faith when they reach the age of understanding.
- ◆ Lord's Supper: Communion of the faithful, thanksgiving, remembering, invocation of the Holy Spirit.
- ◆ Self-Offering: response to the call of discipleship, commitment of life to Jesus Christ and His mission.
- ◆ Common Worship: what we say and what we do when we stand together before God, realizing in high degree who He is and who we are.

In section 263 in the library you will find the books listed below and a number more about worship.

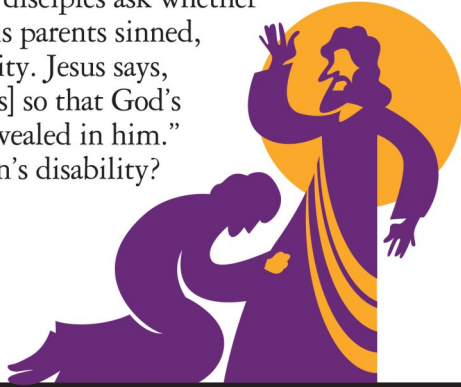
- "How to Worship as a Presbyterian" by Dean Chapman is a highly practical book teaching how to go about experiencing God in worship. Pastors, congregational study groups, and worship committees will find this book a valuable resource.
- "Real Worship by Warren Wiersbe will transform your life. His chapter on preaching as a sacrament is alone worth reading the book. Dr. Wiersbe says, "In worship we declare what is really valuable to us."
- "Introduction to Christian Worship" by James White is a balanced and comprehensive survey of worship in the various Christian churches. Worship is the most important thing the church does.

Also in the library are three books of a series written by Herbert Lockyer. "All the Miracles of the Bible" deals with more than 100 miracles which appear in the Old Testament and 60 or more in the New Testament. "All the Promises of the Bible" is a unique compilation and exposition of divine promises in scripture. It shows years of gathering material, meditation, analysis and experience. "All the Apostles of the Bible" includes studies in the character of the apostles, men Jesus chose and the message they proclaimed. No body of men has ever exercised so vast an influence on the world as the small circle of ordinary men Jesus trained, commissioned and empowered to further His cause.

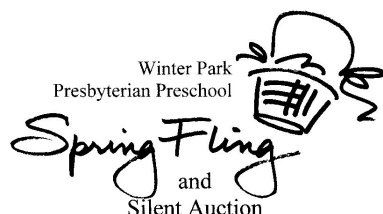
