When one enters our sanctuary, the eye is immediately drawn to the exquisite stained glass windows which filter the sun's rays as they bathe the nave in color while reflecting a study of Christ's life. Most seasoned residents of Winter Park, and the surrounding communities, can attest to the experience of setting foot onto the hallowed ground upon which Winter Park Presbyterian Church rests as the WPPC congregation welcomes visitors and guests to participate in varieties of events several times each year. In fact, those same residents are quick to elaborate upon their personal memories. Woven into their

reflections will be commentary centering on the richness of the woodwork, the impressive organ, and the stunning pipes which fill the sanctuary with glorious sound.

Pew Cushions have yet to make the list of striking features which endear church family members as well as members of the greater community who fondly regard WPPC as their "second church home." Aside from turning in errant buttons to the ushers or the office staff, most folks take the cushions for granted. However, the padding is central to comfort and the necessity increases as bodies age. Buttons on both sides of the cushions are tied together with a special twine which keeps the upholstery in place. It takes about one hundred buttons to anchor the slip cover to the cushion properly. Given the fact that are fortynine pews, button maintenance represents an ongoing effort.

Betty Gale Case and husband Bob maintained the cushions for years ensuring that enough crimson material would be on hand to cover buttons using a hand pumping machine designed expressly for the purpose of constructing those buttons that become lost or simply wear out. Betty Gale turned in the equipment when Bob became ill and family became the focus of her life. In the meantime, the collection of displaced buttons grew. Once in person worship commenced in late 2020, Betty Gale recognized the urgency for repairs. However, she was well acquainted with the taxing physical labor as well as handwork involved in the process and was unsure as to whether she would be up to the task.

After months of prayerful discernment, she made the commitment setting aside Wednesdays from 9:30 – 4:00 for pursuing the project. As she launched the project during Lent, the sanctuary was so chilly, she found it necessary to work in her coat. Springtime brought various members joining Betty Gale during lunch breaks round the WPPC kitchen table which lifted the spirits of all. By summer, one half of the pew cushions had been repaired but the button supply was completely depleted and the cost of purchase per button, even decades ago, was prohibitive. Undaunted, Betty Gale developed a plan and asked for assistance from willing volunteers to set up the button making machine and she set to work on the complicated task of fashioning new buttons that would fit the exacting pattern.

In early autumn, Betty Gale returned to the pews with her stock of newly minted buttons. She completed the last repair during Advent. The boxes of supplies and equipment were stored away and Betty Gale quietly departed the WPPC campus with the grace of a life-long servant of God.

A House for Worship

This window states its theme: My Father's house shall be a house of prayer. There are three parts to this panel. At the top is a picture of the WPPC. Jesus is in the foreground blessing the worshipers. At the bottom is the emblem symbolically summarizing the theme of the whole windows—worship.

The worshipers, young and old, are kneeling with their hands folded in prayer and yes closed or looking down. A few are stealing glances at our Lord while a little boy is the only on looking straight at Jesus. His father looks at the boy with a smile of love as does our Lord Himself.

The emblem below the worshipers is an incense burner from which smoke symbolizing the prayers of the worshipers is rising. A psalmist writes: Let my prayer be set before thee as incense; and the lifting up of my hands as the evening sacrifice. A combination of two Greek letters at he top of the censor stands for the first two letters of Christ's name and that our prayers are in His name.

The most interesting note about this window is the inscription, My Father's house shall be a house of prayer. These words are often quoted but they are not in the Gospels. Jesus is quoting from a beautiful passage of the prophet Isaiah using it against those who were making the Temple a marketplace. Within the context of an ancient strictness and legalism, it breathes the length, width, height, and depth of God who calls us to worship Him.

Having a campus surrounded by nature really sets our school apart from the rest. Classes are often seen playing games on the fenced front lawn. Art and science experiences are frequently moved outdoors into the Nature Center where the children are surrounded by flowering plants that attract butterflies. The large garden boxes behind the school are the site of much learning about plants and how they grow. Many classes are using the newly renovated small garden area for music and movement, reading a story or simply running off some extra energy.

The playground is also treated as an active learning center in which teachers interact with the children pulling language, science, math and social studies skills out of running, skipping, climbing, swinging and sliding.

The photos show some of our classes engaged in bear hunts, obstacle courses, organized games, making a bird's nest, launching rockets, having picnics and just having fun outdoors.
