

In this, the season of Easter (which lasts until Pentecost on May 20, 2018), the scripture readings invite us to consider what resurrection life entails. What does it mean for us that the crucified Christ was risen from the dead? How does that transform what we do and how we think?



Perhaps above all, the resurrection gives us hope.

Yet, in all honesty, we never completely shed our fear.

Descartes observes: "Hope is a disposition of the soul to persuade itself that what it desires will come to pass, which is caused by a particular movement of the spirits, namely, by that of mingled joy and desire. And fear is another disposition of the soul, which persuades it that the thing will not come to pass. And it is to be noted that, although these two passions are contrary, one may nonetheless have them both together, that is, when one considers different reasons at the same time, some of which cause one to judge that the fulfillment of one's desires is a straightforward matter, while others make it seem difficult. And neither of these passions ever accompanies desire without leaving some room for the other."

Despite the fact that honest hope always leaves room for fear, the resurrection assures us that life does win over death; that love does conquer hate; that good does vanquish evil.

The challenge for us is to not be locked in our routines; to not let fear guide us; to open our arms to others around us; to risk loving; to allow the Spirit of God to enliven us.

May we have the eyes to see this new life appearing around and in and through us.

The Seekers is a discussion based adult Sunday school class that studies a wide variety of topics ranging from Books of the Bible to Theology to Current Events. They are a support group that spends time on fellowship as well as discussion and they are able to disagree, yet move in a positive direction during their discussions.



NEWS FROM THE LIBRARY


Do you know what *Worship* is? Webster's Dictionary tells us it is respect and honor to a person of importance. It is reverence to a divine being or supernatural power. There are a number of descriptions of what worship is.

There are five elements of worship with a theological grounding for each element.

- Prayer is the heart of Worship.
- Scriptures is the reading, hearing, preaching, and confessing of the word, which can also be expressed in music.
- Baptism is needed only once It is a response of repentance, faithfulness, and discipleship.
- Lord's Supper is a foretaste of the kingdom meal; thanksgiving, communion of the faithful.
- Self-Offering is recognizing the gifts of the spirit, self dedication, commitment by giving and sharing.

Worship is of primary importance to our life as people of God. It is the means by which faith is formed within us. Worship is a dialogue between God and His people.

Each year on Pentecost Sunday we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit, bringing us a new life. With the Spirit's coming, we no longer need to settle for business as usual but can know the transforming, redeeming love of God that makes the impossible 'possible.'

The Pentecost offering is one of the four Special Offerings of the PC (USA). Gifts to the Pentecost Offering help bring God's transforming, redeeming love to children at-risk, guide and nurture young people's growing faith and provide opportunities for young adults to become spiritual leaders—all in the name of Jesus Christ.

The benefits are all around us. Presbyterian congregations are finding new ways to minister to children at -risk in their own communities. General Assembly programs are advocating for children and developing youth and young adult leaders. A Family Specialist works alongside families experiencing crises—any situation that disrupts the peace and harmony of the family. Rebekah McConn is the Family Specialist, hosted at Maitland Presbyterian Church. She is a Master's level family therapist and began working in our community in July 2016. DEACON'S DEN

Life is full of uncertainty — illness, disability, aging, and death — to name a few. If we focus on the negative, we will always be depressed. But if we focus on faith, hope, and love in God, we can face anything with a positive attitude. Thomas Aquinas said, "Faith has to do with things that are not seen and hope with things that are not at hand." The theologian and philosopher has influenced the Catholic church and Western thought since the thirteenth century.



R. C. Sproul said the following based on Hebrews 6:19. "Hope is called the anchor of the soul, because it gives stability to the Christian life. But hope is not simply a 'wish' (I wish that such-and-such would take place); rather, it is that which latches on to the certainty of the promises of the future that God has made." Sproul (1939 – 2017) has been described as "the greatest and most influential proponent of the recovery of Reformed theology in the last century." He had to give up high school athletics in order to work to support his family. He went on to earn several college degrees, taught at numerous colleges and seminaries, and authored several books on Christian apologetics. He survived the Big Bayou Canot train wreck of 1993, a stroke in 2015, and suffered from diabetes and long-term chronic obstructive pulmonary disease. Throughout his career, he kept a positive attitude and lived by the above quote.

A prime example of hope in the face of disability is Joni Eareckson Tada. After suffering a diving accident that left her paralyzed from the shoulders down at age 17, she spent two years in rehabilitation, where she felt anger, depression, suicidal thoughts, and religious doubts. After she learned to paint and write with the brush or pen between her teeth, she was able to be productive, and hope for a better future speared her forward. She has written over forty books, starred in an autobiographical film, and is an advocate for people with disabilities. She also sang the title song in a feature film, "Alone Yet Not Alone", which was nominated for an Oscar. Her television program, Joni and Friends, began in 1979 and has become an international organization to "accelerate Christian ministry in the disability community".

Joni has also been successfully treated for breast cancer, but still suffers frequent pain from her earlier accident. Despite all of this, she can say something that humbles all able-bodied people: "The best we can hope for in this life is a knothole peek at the shining realities ahead. Yet a glimpse is enough. It's enough to convince our heart that whatever sufferings and sorrow currently assail us aren't worthy of comparison to that which waits over the horizon." No words can explain "Hope" like these, especially since they come from the person who wrote the book "Heaven: Your Real Home".

How can we do anything else but hope?
