In addition, we want to thank our PNC. It's easy in a time like this to take a break, to put certain things on the backburner and say we'll get to it when we're done. It's even easier when you are at the end of a long process and know you need that break! But our PNC never once stopped. They continued to meet week after week until they brought forth a worthy candidate. In the next month, Rev. Darren Bess will begin his work here at WPPC. I feel confident in saying that starting his call here will be unlike any other beginning he's ever had. There is no instruction manual for Ministry during COVID-19. But I have every faith in our PNC that their work is complete. I have faith in our leadership, and I have faith that God has called Rev. Darren Bess to us in this time for a special reason. I have faith that our leadership will continue to rise to the occasion and in the months to come it will grow more obvious than ever!

Pentecost Offering - May 31st An opportunity to give and make a difference.

Each year on Pentecost Sunday we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit, bringing us a new life. With the Spirit's coming, we no longer need to settle for business as usual but can know the transforming, redeeming love of God that makes the impossible "possible". This special offering unites us in a churchwide effort to support young people by inspiring them to share their faith, ideas and unique gifts with the church and the world to build a life of faith--all in the name of Jesus Christ.

The Pentecost offering is one of the four Special Offerings of the PC (USA) during the church year. The first 60 percent of our donations will be sent to the Presbyterian Mission Agency (25% to assist young adult volunteers serving communities; 25% to guide youth ministries; and 10% to advance child advocacy). The remaining forty percent of our offering will be used on behalf of children-at-risk in our own community. For the third consecutive year we are supporting Thornwell's local mission, the Building Families Program, a community-based child abuse and neglect prevention program providing in-home counseling services with tools to thrive and not merely survive. The program is hosted at Maitland Presbyterian Church. Rebekah McConn is the Master's level Family Specialist who began working in our community in July 2016. 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Notes From The Mission Field

The Presbyterian USA Mission Office has recalled all over seas missionaries back to the United States in response to the COVID 19 virus—leaving our missionaries with their hearts and concerns with their people in their respective countries.

Gordon and Dorothy Gartrell were about to leave for Brazil when they received word that they needed to stay in the United States. When an elderly member of their church died they wished that they could be there to support their fellow church members.

Dan and Elizabeth Turk faced major challenges in their return and are still separated. When COVID 19 was declared a global pandemic Elizabeth was hospitalized and was extremely ill. While she did not have the virus, she has several health issues that place her at high risk. Elizabeth planned to leave in late March but the president of Madagascar announced the airport would suspend all international flights the day before she was set of leave. Fortunately, she was able to get a flight a day earlier and travel to the USA. Once here she went into a quarantine to protect her parents.

Dan left for a dedication of a new fruit center in Madagascar that he and others had been working on for some time. Driving back from the dedication he learned that the first case of COVID 19 had been confirmed in Madagascar. As a result, all Sunday services were cancelled, and the capital city was placed in

lockdown. People coming in on some of the last international flights to the capital were testing positive. With help from the US embassy and other embassies, he was able to leave on an Ethiopian Airlines flight organized by the South Korean Embassy on March 31.

While Dan and Liz are grateful to be here, they worry about their partner churches and colleagues because the health system in Madagascar is limited The virus was introduced by tourists from Europe but now is growing from contact and exceeds 100. While people are taking the measures of isolation to heart, they need to work in order to live. The economy of the country is in a nose dive and there is an increasing problem of people not having enough to eat. The basic economy of the country is tourism and this is now nonexistence.

Dan and Liz and both worry about the impact of the virus on the environment and health. People can cause deforestation as they cut down trees to make charcoal to make money. The health system was also problematic and is not able to address a pandemic and protect its health workers and population.




This Child Here (Odessa, Ukraine) has had to cancel their peace camps this summer and their foster care training due to the virus.

Winter Park Presbyterian Preschool has been closed since spring break, and at press time we are still awaiting a date when OCPS and we will safely reopen. WPPP teachers have been working to provide home connections, rich educational experiences and socialization for their students while they are staying at home.

Teachers of our youngest students have been sending emails containing newsletters, lesson plans, links to favorite class songs and books being read aloud, and many ideas for hands-on activities that encourage learning while helping to keep little ones busy. They also stay in touch via their class Dojo and Shutterfly.

Three year olds love their virtual class meetings where their teachers read stories, play games and hold discussions in which the children take turns sharing their ideas. All threes' teachers are using email to provide their lesson plans and related learning activities. Teachers have also been communicating individually with their students via FaceTime chats, personal emails and mailing handwritten notes and cards.

Our VPK teachers have been sharing learning experiences through email, Dojo, Shutterfly, Seesaw and text messages. All of our VPK classes are conducting online group meetings. Teachers have been providing lots of activities and songs to aid in teaching the letter of the week and other important lessons.

WPPP's dedicated art teacher created videos of art projects and a Pablo Picasso Pajama Arty Party that were posted on the preschool Facebook page. Our after school ballet enrichment teacher created a instructional ballet videos for the girls to do at home.

We hope that during these challenging times we can be a small source of happiness in the lives of our preschool children and families. We miss everyone so much and look forward to being back in the classroom! As of today school closures will continue through April 30, and may be extended.
