

"There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens." Ecclesiastes 3: 1

Even if one is not familiar with the Scriptures, the above verse may sound familiar. In 1965 the *Byrds* popularized these words in their song *Turn! Turn! Turn!* David Crosby often gets credit for the song or other members of the band like Graham Nash or Graham Parsons, but Pete Seeger came up with the idea to use these words from 3000 years ago and put pen to paper. He only added six new words to the original text, "Turn" being one of them and it's repeated several times. Up until his death in 2014 Pete received 55% of the royalties off of these lyrics. I wonder how Solomon would feel about that?

Regardless, these words remind us of the cyclical or seasonal nature of life. The month of May is for us a time of year we celebrate many things, Mother's Day being one of them. If you are in town on Sunday, May 9 we hope you will come and celebrate this day with us.

Thursday, May the 6th is the National Day of Prayer. The theme chosen for this year is: "Lord, pour out Your Love, Life and Liberty." We invite you to drop by the church on May 6th and spend a few minutes in prayer. The Sanctuary will be open during the day until 4pm. Of course, you may pray from your home, office, car, or anywhere, but if you would prefer, the Sanctuary will be available.

The month of May marks the closing of one chapter and the beginning of another for so many as they graduate high school or college. This is an exciting time for them and their families. They have worked hard, alongside parents, teachers, and counselors, and by the end of May will begin a new season of life. We celebrate these and other milestones such as birthdays, anniversaries, maybe even the start of new employment or selling or buying a home.

Of course, maybe this is a difficult season in life, as it often was for Charlie Brown. Lucy asked him one day, "Charlie Brown, do you set up your deck chair at the front of the cruise ship to see where you're going or do you set yours up on the back of the ship to see where you've been?" Charlie Brown looked puzzled, confused maybe even irritated by the question and replied, "Lucy, most days, I can't even figure out how to unfold my deck chair to begin with."

I think the point for us, in all of this and in all seasons, is that God is the same. Our whole existence on the earth is transient, brief or *seasonal* at best. What can be done? What do we do? Our finitude looks at us in the mirror every day. So, should we simply live for self, maximizing pleasure and minimizing pain? That's one response. However, as part of another response, I simply invite you to join with us along the journey. Why? Because, at the center, I believe, we discover seasonal living is better in community than alone.

Please plan to join with us this month as we gather for prayer, as we honor our Mothers, as we celebrate those graduating, and as we worship the One who is not seasonal, but is the same yesterday, today, and tomorrow.

Psalm 34:8 NIV

"Taste and see that the Lord is good; blessed is the one who takes refuge in him."

This verse strikes me as an invitation and an assurance. It does not ask for blind devotion, however. It tells us to experience the goodness of God directly, to test whether communion with Him offers blessings.

I always wondered how to "taste and see". I eventually discovered that prayer, waiting in silence, and immersion in nature gave me opportunities to draw closer. Once the noise of every day concerns died down, a feeling of peace and ease sometimes stole across my mind. An effort of will never summoned this deep calm. Openness did.

Even though I have had these experiences, I do not always "take refuge in him". A stubborn need to control situations gets in the way. As captain of my ship, I do not want to surrender the helm. I eventually change course when I discover, once again, that I am steering toward dangerous straits.

Perhaps the assurance in the second phrase of the verse is a means of encouraging the faithful to become more consistently true, to live moment by moment in the refuge of God's goodness. The cycle of straying and returning no longer applies once this practice becomes firmly established. No matter what misfortunes and difficulties trouble a truly faithful servant, he or she feels the comfort and guidance of God's sweet presence.

I am nowhere near that. But this verse does not offer criticism for those who suffer from faltering trust. It merely points out a path toward peace and happiness. The trail is always open to those willing to take first steps.

For more than 50 years Florida Presbyterian Homes and Westminster Communities of Florida have been connected to the church through a covenant agreement, first with the Synod of Florida and then with the Synod of South Atlantic. Higher costs of healthcare, prescriptions, and the economy have presented a whole new set of concerns which could be overwhelming without assistance from those who are more fortunate.

Each year on Pentecost Sunday we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit, descending as tongues of fire over the heads of the Apostles, giving them the gift to speak to all nations in their own tongues and spread the Good News. The Spirit also brings us a new life on this day. With the Spirit's coming, we no longer need to settle for business as usual but can know the transforming, redeeming love of God that makes the impossible "possible". This special offering unites us in a church-wide effort to support young people by inspiring them to share their faith, ideas and unique gifts with the church and the world to build a life of faith--all in the name of Jesus Christ.

The Pentecost offering is one of the four Special Offerings of the PC (USA) during the church year. The first 60% of our donations will be sent to the Presbyterian Mission Agency (25% to assist young adult volunteers serving communities; 25% to guide youth ministries; and 10% to advance child advocacy). The remaining forty percent of our offering will be used on behalf of children-at-risk in our own community. This year we are supporting Covenant House Florida - Orlando. Covenant House Florida began in Fort Lauderdale Beach in 1983 and has been supporting needy youth since that time. For over 20 years Covenant House Florida in Orlando has been providing emergency shelter, crisis counseling and supportive services to Central Florida's most vulnerable homeless. These youth typically come from rough circumstances, with little support, and often headed toward disaster. Last year CHF provided assistance to over 450 youth and children in Central Florida. Support from grants and the general community have allowed them to serve these youth, no matter what their past may be. Covenant House Florida makes every effort to reunite kids with their families. They will collaborate with community agencies and organizations and actively participate in community efforts to improve the conditions of families and children. They will advocate with and on behalf of youth to raise awareness in the community about their suffering. Their mission is based on faith and the belief that all children and youth have a right to love, respect and genuine concern. Their commitment calls them to serve suffering children of the street and to protect and safeguard all children.

With your support, these agencies can help meet the needs of these vulnerable neighbors. Thank you for your prayerful consideration to support this most worthy cause on Sunday, May 23, 2021. Have you noticed the stained glass windows in our Church sanctuary? They are truly beautiful and each one tells a story from the Bible's Old Testament, beginning with Abraham, "father of the faithful."



Over the door on the east side of the sanctuary is the first stained glass transom window. This shows the Old Testament story of Abraham and his son, Isaac, as told in the book of Genesis 22nd chapter. He is to sacrifice his son, his only son, as a burnt offering on one of the mountains that God will lead him to. Abraham obeys taking Isaac to the mountain country of Moriah to sacrifice his son.

This window shows Abraham, knife in hand, plunging it downward to slay Isaac, whose body is on the wood on the altar. Isaac's feet and hands are bound, just like the sacrificial animals of the day. The brazier is aflame to consume the killed sacrifice. But here there is an angel stopping the thrust of the knife and in a thicket are entangled the twisted horns of a ram that Abraham called Johovah-Kireh — "the Lord will provide." Here in the thicket is a substitute for Isaac. The ram has been used a symbol for Christ since it is the leader of flock. Christ who was to come to be the Son whom God gave to the world as His sacrifice.



Finally, we are able to provide food and serve our friends at the Homeless Coalition of Central Florida after 13 months of "Covid" closure. We were unable to serve from March 2020 through March 2021, although we continued to donate the cost of the food we would have prepared to the Coalition. On Wednesday, April 7, Bonnie Gaughan's team mixed and baked 4 huge trays of brownies. The next day, Thursday, April 8, Mary VanHook and her team of helpers chopped and prepared the 7-layer salad; and on Friday morning, April 9, Joanne Robertson led a team of volunteers in cutting and bagging 280 brownies. Finally, that afternoon, the salads were mixed and a reduced crew of 5 hearty souls (Sevilla Morse, Pat Morgan, Gary Henderson, and Nancy & Mike Galyean) traveled in 2 cars with all the supplies (instead of using the bus) to serve at the Coalition alongside 5 members of our partner church, St. Richard's Episcopal. It was wonderful to be back.

The Coalition has had to make many changes to keep their guests and staff safe during Covid and will be in transition as they gradually adjust until they are back to "normal."

For many years, WPPC and a partner church served dinner once a month to "residents" (up to 250 men living at the Men's Service Center) in addition to "community" guests (30-75 men, women, children living outside the Coalition). When the Covid virus struck, Coalition staff scrambled to safely meet the needs of all their guests. They closed the dining hall in the Women & Children's building, and dedicated the area to any guests testing positive to the Covid test or experiencing Covid symptoms. The dining room in the Men's Service Center began to feed all guests from the Women & Children's building and the "residents" of the Men's Service Center. To-go boxes for "community" guests began being prepared in the MSC kitchen and delivered to those folks at the gate each evening. These changes are still in place at the Coalition. Since we do not come in contact with the "community" at this time, we do not currently provide peanut butter and jelly sandwiches or toiletries to those guests as we have in the past.

In addition to these physical changes, the Coalition also had to make schedule changes in order to help guests with social distancing. Women & Children are served from 5-6 PM and are encouraged to stagger their attendance throughout the hour. Men are served from 6-7 PM. In order to serve at 5 p.m., we must leave WPPC by 4 p.m. in order to arrive at the Coalition by 4:30. (Before Covid, we started serving at 6:30 PM and left WPPC at 5:30.) This new schedule is challenging for our volunteer servers and bus drivers as most folks with jobs cannot be at the church by 4 PM.

Traveling to the Coalition and serving the food is just one piece of the work WPPC does to serve the homeless. In addition to preparing the food, many individual tasks are completed by WPPC members.
