

Sabbath is not really a term we use very often anymore. In the midst of commandments like *don't murder, don't steal,* and *always make sure God is number one,* the fourth commandment to take a day of rest is often the one that is easily ignored. "So I forgot to take a day off this week, it's not like I killed anyone, I'm sure it's fine, right?"

I was a Junior in Seminary when my thoughts on Sabbath changed. Heavy work loads, busy schedules, and complex classes like Hebrew had me quite literally pulling my hair out! One night, I called my best friend in tears, feeling like I simply couldn't breathe; like I was being crushed beneath the weight of everything I had to do. Her advice was simple. "You need a day off." A day off?! Do you know how complicated Seminary is? There was an entire day set aside in the schedule just to do work! How could I take an entire day off with so much to do?! Calmly, she told me not to take the entire day, just the part dedicated to time I would spend in classes. Her dare? From sunrise to 3:30, time I would usually be in classes every other day of the week, I was forbidden to talk about school, to look at my books, to check my school e-mail, to even set foot on campus or even go to the store to buy a notebook. "Just get some clarity," she told me. Find another way to occupy your mind.

I took her up on her dare, mostly to prove it would never work. But you know...at 3:30, when I finally opened my Hebrew book again that afternoon, I finished my lesson in record time, without any tears. And after that, my private tradition of School Day Sabbath was born. One day of the week, from sunrise to 3:30, I did nothing school related...and I think I was one of the most sane and well adjusted in my class for it.

Welcome to the beginning of the *busy season*, as so many in the Church world often call it. This is that special time of the year when work seems never-ending. Think, first of what is on your "to-do list" for today, now for the week, and for the month, and in the months to come. Chances are there are some things popping up that you ordinarily wouldn't consider *ordinary* chores. There are things to do! There are trips to plan, plane tickets to be bought, hotel reservations to be made. There are holidays we have to make accommodations for, extra trips to the supermarket, gifts to be purchased, cards to write, envelopes to address, seal, and send. And in the church world, there are spectaculars to organize and volunteer for. Trunk-or-Treat, Journey to Christmas, the Apopka Toy Drive, Living Nativity, Christmas Eve services and we haven't even gotten to the *ordinary*, every day things that make up church life that must continue while all this going on! The busy season is very aptly named.

The busyness can't be helped. No matter what we do, no matter how we try to forget it or navigate it, it will always be there in some capacity. As we make our final approach into this holiday season, I encourage you to find time to make Sabbath space for it. One minute an hour, an hour a day, one day a week, from sunrise to the time the kids get home, from nine to nine, or just over the lunch break...at a time that is suitable take a breath. Be in the quiet. Don't think about what awaits you outside of that time. Protect that space, don't be drawn away, let God envelope you, speak to you. Allow yourself to be thankful for everything that you have. Rest. If only for a moment. Rest.

And when the time comes, and the moment passes, you might just find that you are all the better for those times, than you were without.
