

When I was a youth I used to love going to church. My friends and I signed up for as many activities as we possibly could, even some that we were too young for all so we could spend more time at the church. People often praised us, congratulating us on how dedicated we were to the gospel and to Jesus, telling us how impressed they were that we had such hearts for ministry. But the truth was...none of those reasons were why we wanted to go to. I think they had something to do with it, of course, we weren't blind to the gospel or the good we could do at volunteering, but if we're wholly and completely honest, the real reason we loved going to church was so we could see each other.

Back in an age when Instant Messenger and the AOL were just coming into vogue, my friends and I lived quite a fair distance from each other. We all went to separate schools in separate school districts. I lived thirty minutes away from my best friend, Caitlin. The license laws in my dear state of PA meant that we couldn't get permits to learn to drive until 16, and though we had cell phones and screen names at the time, texting cost a fortune and sending an IM only worked if the other person was actually online. But, as youth, our church was centrally located. Caitlin may have lived thirty minutes from me but I was only fifteen minutes from the church and she was only fifteen minutes as well. We wanted to be at the church so much because it served in many ways as our community center. Often, the only time we ever saw each other, was when we were at the church.

I miss those days. Don't get me wrong, I love the fact that I no longer have to wait five minutes to get a connection to the internet, or that texting has become easy, and let's not forget the freedom a car gives me to go just about anywhere! But still...I often find myself thinking about those days when connecting with people meant more than just words. It meant sitting with people, being in the same space, genuinely enjoying company without needing any other kind of stimulation. There are times I feel like it's from an era gone that we shall never get back. And then...

Last week I had the great honor of attending Community Life's Trunk or Treat. It is one of my favorite things we host here at Winter Park Presbyterian Church because of it's atmosphere and fun and the chocolate too, of course. Last Saturday people gathered around trunks, tables with hot dogs, clowns with balloons, and a face painter. As I walked in the midst of it all, smiling at the children, and saying hi to parents, I was reminded of those good ole days. It felt like a block party. I saw real community alive and at work as WPPC members genuinely enjoyed an afternoon together watching children having the time of their lives. And it got me to thinking...why do we do community events? Why do we do fellowship? Or outreach?

I fear that it's because sometimes we think we have to do it, that it's a requirement. I fear even more that we view it in this day and age as us putting on a show, it's a responsibility, or a pain, or nothing but work with no benefit for us, especially if no one joins the church because of it. But then I think of Trunk or Treat, of the time enjoyed by all, of the smiles and the community and I remember...this is why we do it. Not because it's work or we have to, but because we are a community of believers joined together by Christ. We are a community of friends who like spending time with each other and this Church, one of the purposes it serves is as our community center. There is work involved in these opportunities for fellowship, yes, but there is also the opportunity to simply be with one another, not through text or e-mail or Facebook messenger, but really and truly be with one another.

This holiday season, there are a lot of opportunities for us to be together, through services and fellowship after, concerts put on by Worship and Music, Journey to Christmas, Advent Event, and so much more. Let's remember to take a breath in this time. Let's remember that the purpose of these events isn't membership or to put on a show, it's to be with each other. It's to treat those we meet as family and show the love of God within our community. It's to show any are looking for just that, a community, that there is always room for more.






The Library has added novels by John Grisham, James Patterson, Karen Kingsbury, Lauraine Snelling, Stuart Woods, and Garth Stein.

Have you ever noticed the beautiful tabebuia trees around town in the spring with their yellow trumpet blossoms? They are in full bloom for only a short time each year and have always appeared like a burst of sunshine on the landscape. Did you every wonder who planted them or when? A glance at the Sunday bulletin of October 13 stoked a memory and a story during a visit to Westminster Winter Park later that same day.

In 1964 the Edgewater and Jones High School bands were invited to play at the New York World's Fair. Fundraisers were held, but as the publicity featured Edgewater High School, the Jones band wasn't having mfuch success. Remember, this was a time of segregation in the South, so black schools and white schools did not do things together. The band directors of each school, however, saw things differently. They were looking at musical talent rather than race and decided to work together to raise funds so both bands could go to the fair. Del Kieffner of Edgewater and Jim Wilson of Jones combined their efforts and spurred the major businesses in the community to sponsor events that resulted in the trip of a lifetime for the band members of both schools.

One of the fundraisers was held by The Orlando Sentinel. They decided to bring in 150 tabebuia trees, each about 24 inches tall, and sold them in front of their headquarters on Orange Avenue for \$1.50 apiece. A traffic jam ensued and all the trees were sold very quickly. Later, the Sentinel received numerous letters from people who didn't get to the sale in time and so did not get a tree, and they were a little angry about it! The Sentinel decided to import another 150 trees, and those sold very quickly also. One of these trees was planted in the backyard of my former residence and it was a pleasure to see the sunburst of blossoms each spring.

The result of all the fundraisers was that both bands were able to go to the World's Fair. Beyond that, the band directors and band members made friends that lasted a lifetime.

Professors at UCF encouraged students in the honors public history and documentary classes to make a film about this event. "Marching Forward" is now making the rounds of film festivals and will be shown at the Orange County Regional History Center on Sunday, February 16, 2020 at 2:00 PM.



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
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
