DEACON'S DEN

Challenges. Obstacles. Pitfalls. Trials. Stepping stones?

"An obstacle is often a stepping stone." - Prescott

It is hard to think positively, if at all, when you face a challenge in your life. Yet face it we must, else how do we ever succeed or survive? For example, suppose you have a job that does not use all your talents, or a boss who is a micro-manager and stands in the way of doing what you believe to be the best possible job? Do you stay with that company and come home exhausted and frustrated every day, living from Monday to Friday? Or do you look for another job or career that will motivate you to expand your capabilities?

A more difficult challenge arises when you or someone you love faces a medical crisis. The best answer is not always the easiest or clearest. Is the surgery necessary? Will the treatment be successful? How long will he or she survive if they decide to do it? Tough questions, but necessary.

Then there are the trials that test your faith. Someone mocks you for what you believe. Will you run away and hide or will you stand up for what you believe? The Bible is full of truths about God and human nature, but we all know that we must answer to Him for all that we have thought, said, or done in our life. Proverbs 17:3 sums up the topic very well:

The crucible is for silver, and the furnace is for gold, but the Lord tests the heart.

The answers to life's challenges are not simple or easy. The purpose of this essay is not to give you the answers, for the answer to my challenge may not be the same for yours. The way to find the answer is more straightforward. Will you allow the obstacle to stop you or will you face the challenge and turn the obstacle into a stepping stone on your path of life? Set Christ as the example of how to face the trials and tribulations of life; He lived a short time on this earth, but He made the most of it. He stood up for what he believed and did not back down in the face of mockery or adversity. He suffered, yes, but He rose above it all, literally. Thanks be to God.

LIBRARY NEWS

Nancy Appich is again busy reading every Thursday morning to classes from the preschool. She has 20 four year olds at a time who she reads to and then they check out books (40-50 books go out each week). Nancy also reads to three year olds.

Jyme Smith enters all new books into the computer system so that you can locate books on the computer, in the Dewey decimal system, or the card file. Doris Anguish then prepares all books for circulation.

A table in the Narthex displays a group of adult books. These are changed every month. Instructions to assist you in checking these books out is also on the table. The Library is open every Sunday, Monday, and Thursday mornings. Many books, adult and children's, are added to the library each month. Some are purchased and many are donated. Thanks to all who have donated recently.

We have added a popular new series by Lauraine Snelling. She writes about men and women who left Norway to forge a new life in America. They were pioneers of deep courage and fortitude, leaving behind everything they treasured to face innumerable hardships as they settled across territories of the West. Historical fiction like this makes a great read.

Mary Higgins Clark, a lover of history, wrote a biographical novel titled *Aspire to the Heavens*, which was the family motto of George Washington's mother. All events, dates, scenes, and characters were based on historical research. It was published in 1969. Recently a Washington family descendent led to its reissue as *Mount Vernon Love Story*. The author tells the story of a rare marriage and brings to life the human side of the man who became the "father of our country."

Another interesting series in the Library is the large group of *Love Finds You* books by various authors. They cover stories in many states—Nebraska, California, Indiana, Pennsylvania, Texas, Florida, etc. One tells about Amanda Burns who owns a bicycle shop in Treasure Island, Florida. This is a keen sense of detail that brings the coast of Florida alive and weaves an interesting story.

STICK WITH IT!



"If I've learned anything about friendship, it's to hang in, stay connected," says journalist Jon Katz. "Don't walk away, don't be distracted, don't be too busy or tired, don't take them for granted. Friends are part of the glue that holds life and faith together."

This applies to church life too. When we're annoyed by some aspect of congregational life or caught in conflict with other members, it's tempting to drift away to another church—or no church. Even when all is fine, we sometimes let church take a back seat. But our bonds with the family of God are "part of the glue that holds life and faith together." For the sake of the benefits we gain and give, may we "hang in [and] stay away [or] be distracted, ... Be too busy or tired." May we not take one another for granted but thank God for this "glue" - even when things get a bit sticky!

Update from Robert Gamble This Child Here and the Peace Camp

The Gray Zone is that strip of land in the eastern region of Ukraine that serves as a buffer between Ukraine and Russia. People still live and work there, kids go to school and families try to make a life. Most of our families at summer PEACE CAMP come from places in or near Gray Zone.


Two weeks after the camp, Yulia and I rented a VW and drove there. The last 134 miles took six hours of driving over and around potholes, across dirt with deep wheel tracks and roads made of rocks, past rivers, hedgehogs and cows, and one unattended forest fire. We arrived at the city of Zaparosia at 2am.

On that visit, we caught a ride with soldiers to Kurakhove in the Donetsk Oblast not far from where the fighting is located. We visited a few projects of Caritas, the big catholic relief agency, to see what they were doing, which was mostly helping small businesses.

It was important to go, to see how some families who fled the war are living, and to hear their stories.

From what I am told, most of these people just want their lives back. Zaparosia is filled with people on both sides of the politics, (many who were pro-Russia learned they could not afford to live in Russia, so stayed in Ukraine). They have all lost homes and businesses and lives, friends and often, family. But when they go to the store for bread and milk, they get it and go home. No one talks politics.

The visit made me all the more glad that we offer this camp to these families. It's a great thing we are doing. These families have thanked me over and over. Thank you for your support of <u>This Child Here</u>.



In Loving Memory



Cora Evans, April 23, 1914 - August 9, 2018

Cora Evans was a member of WPPC for over 60 years. She died at the age of 104 and Phyllis Woods wrote a nice remembrance letter about Cora:

Our Church was blessed to have Cora Evans among us for many years. Many of our members remember her as a warm encouraging presence. She was also a person who could add thought-provoking ideas to any discussion. As Ginny Seel wrote of her:

"Cora Evans was a bright spot in my life. She always met me with a smile and an embrace. She was a gracious, warm lady who added something to conversations with such knowledge and understanding of the subject. I went to her 100th birthday party, and there were people there that she taught many years ago. A former minister of our Church came to honor her. Many members of her large extended family were there to be with her. Cora's greatest love besides her husband Ross was her beloved son Howard. He showed his love and devotion to her always, but even more in later years as she grew older. I miss her."

Dana Irwin also shared this memory of her:

"I first met Cora back in the 90's when she brought her grandson Tim to Children's Choir each week. She was so charming, sweet and happy. And faithful in her duties as a choir grandparent. Tim never missed a rehearsal. I really enjoyed getting to know Cora and visiting with her then, and in the many other times that I would see her in the congregation."

Cora Evans led a remarkable life, living to the age of 104, and passing away on August 8, 2018. She is survived by her son, Howard R. Evans and grandson Timothy Evans of Winter Park. She is also survived by a younger sister, Aileen Maugans of St. Petersburg, FL and by several nieces and nephews. She was predeceased by her husband, A. Ross Evans, her brothers John and C.A. Boyett, and her sister Gwendolyn Button.

Cora was born on April 23,1919 in Terra Ceia, Florida to Grace Custer Boyett and Charles Arthur Boyett. She was raised in a rural farming community just off Tampa Bay. She graduated from the Florida State College for Women (now FSU) with a Bachelor's degree in Home Economics in 1935. She had a well-earned reputation as a wonderful cook, seamstress, homemaker, gardener and an active community member in Winter Park. As a teacher of Home Economics at the original Winter Park High School (now the Ninth Grade Center), she passed on her considerable skill and knowledge to many Winter Park teenagers.

Cora married Ross Evans in 1936, a marriage that was to last 68 years. They moved to Winter Park in 1949. They were both active in the community and had many ties to Rollins College. As a member of Winter Park Presbyterian Church for all the years since moving to the city of WP, Cora served in many ways in the life of the Church. She was a familiar presence in the Church at meetings and at Church activities. Both she and Ross valued education and sought opportunities to help others. They also enjoyed traveling in Europe and spending time in the mountains of North Carolina, at New Smyrna Beach, and at their place on the Suwannee River in Florida.

A Memorial Service was given for Cora on August 17, 2018 at Winter Park Presbyterian Church with Dr. Larry Cuthill officiating. As was brought out in one article written about her at the time of her Memorial Service,

"To know Cora was to love her. She could keep her family and friends enthralled for hours with her stories of her life and family in Florida. Her memory of details was fantastic, often providing younger generations with vivid images of life in rural Florida and remembrances of every family happening. She loved nature, adored people, and lived as a witness to her faith in God."

Will Boardman, January 6, 1922 - August 30, 2018

Will Boardman was a member of WPPC for 59 years. He died at the age of 96 and his service was held on September 15th.

Will was born in Dundee, New York, on January 6, 1922. His early years were spent in Dundee where he graduated from the Dundee Central School in 1939. He attended the University of Buffalo on a New York State University Scholarship and graduated with his M.D. in 1944. He then pursued residency training in internal medicine at the E.J. Meyer

Hospital in Buffalo. From 1945-1946, he served in Japan and Okinawa, attaining the rank of captain in the medical corps. After the war, he returned to Buffalo and completed a fellowship in cardiovascular disease at the University of Buffalo. He briefly began a practice in Lancaster, NY, but was called to service for the Korean War, where he served as Chief of Medical Service at the Indian Town Gap Reservation Hospital in Pennsylvania. In 1956, Will moved to Winter Park, Florida, and joined Dr. Elwyn Evans in a practice that would become the Central Florida Cardiology Group. He served as President of the Medical Staff at Florida Hospital and was the first Chief of the Department of Cardiology at Florida Hospital. He was a fellow of the American College of Cardiology as well as the American College of Chest Physicians and was a lifelong member of the American Medical Association, the American Heart Association, and the American College of Physicians. He retired from practice in 1988.

As a father, grandfather, husband, and physician, Will lived his life with an intentionality, generosity, and kindness that touched the lives of many; however, he will be remembered most for his unwavering dedication to those he loved and cared for.







Susie Stone, December 8, 1936 - September 15, 2018

Susie Stone was a member of WPPC for nine years. Her service was held on September 21st.

Susie was born to Ernest and Helen Tyler in Jacksonville, Florida, December 8, 1936. She attended Jacksonville schools and graduated from Lee High School in 1954. She was a gymnast and a dancer, as well as Head Cheerleader at Lee High School. She enjoyed many of the reunion events planned by the Class of '54.

At FSU, she joined Kappa Delta fraternity and graduated from FSU with a BA in Elementary Education. From graduation on, through wins and losses, she followed those FSU Seminoles. Stone taught school in Jacksonville (Lake Lucina); Savannah; Lake Mary, Seminole County; and for many years in Orlando at Fern Creek Elementary School. Like many dedicated teachers, a room in her home was dedicated to teaching materials and supplies with space to work on those necessary lesson plans.


