





Come see the impact many of you have had on the work of the Clarks & Scripture Union, and the homes in both Yungay and Ica, and most importantly the role you have played in giving hope to little boys who once had no hope of a normal life.

#### October 27—League of Women Voters of Orange County

Defending democracy and empowering voters is the mission of the League of Women Voters Orange County. Joan Erwin brings inspiring tales of fierce Florida battles over voter suppression, gun violence and the like to show the power of grassroots citizens as told in the local League's new book, *Warriors for Democracy*. Nancy Galyean, League member, will guide the discussion.

The first Sunday in October is World Communion Sunday. This is the day when Christians know that the sacrament they serve in their local church is happening in all houses of worship around the globe. Large cathedrals, small rural churches, home churches, or storefront churches will serve the Lord's Supper, figuratively at the same time. Do they have a Guinness Book of World Records for that?

We tend to focus on what is happening in our own lives everyday and peripherally acknowledge the events outside our circle, unless there is a cataclysmic event. Then, that is all we talk about for several days until something else takes our attention, such as our own lives. So too, we should talk about the history of Christianity and the commandment that Jesus gave to his disciples: Go into all the world and preach to all nations, baptizing them, and teach the Good News. Apostles, disciples, and missionaries have been following this commandment for two thousand years and have done an extraordinary job taking the Bible around the world and translating it into more languages than any other book. They have met much resistance and suffered beatings, imprisonment, and death to fulfill their mission, but the work continues.

So, on October 6th, think about this while the Deacons and Elders are assisting the Pastors, passing the bread and the cup down each pew, and you pass these elements to your neighbor: we are not alone in following this tradition. Christians in North and South America, Europe, Asia, Africa, and Australia are doing the same thing we are doing, maybe the exact same way, maybe a little differently, but celebrating the sacrifice that Jesus made for all who believe in Him. We are to keep this covenant until He comes again. That is definitely worth a celebration.

World Communion Sunday is October 6th. It's exciting to think we'll be sharing the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper with Christians worldwide!

On that day we will collect your offering for Peacemaking, one of the four Special Offerings of the PC (USA). Our partners in the Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly will use 75% of this offering for various peacemaking projects throughout the world. The Compassion Committee has selected <code>iDignity</code> (<a href="https://idignity.org/">https://idignity.org/</a>) to be the local recipient of 25% of our collection. This program was founded by members of five downtown Orlando churches in 2008 to assist the disadvantaged in Central Florida to navigate the complexities of obtaining their personal identification. The documents <code>IDignity</code> obtains on behalf of their clients enable them to apply for employment or school, obtain access to shelters, vote, seek help from social service programs, open a bank account or cash a check, secure housing, or overcome many obstacles to becoming self-sufficient. The cost to obtain these documents is high and demand for these services has yet to ebb. More than 120 volunteers serve 200-250 people in need every month. This connects to the global witness of Christ's peace.



The library is open every Sunday, Monday and Thursday mornings. To gain access at other times, a key can be obtained from the front office. The library is used mostly by Sunday School teachers, Bible study group leaders, church officers, and preschool. 
