Society of Saint Andrews (SOSA) provides food for the body, God's word for the spirit, community of love for the heart, and opportunity for those who desire action. They feed the hungry all year long by saving fresh produce that would otherwise go to waste and giving it to the needy.

Ten Thousand Villages works with third world country villages to create authentic handicrafts as a way to pass on their culture to the next generation. By selling their handicrafts, they help artisans provide food, house, education, and healthcare for their families. For Sale: Jewelry, Holiday Items, Toys, and more.

Transitions Orphan Assistance Foundation (TOAF) has had a very hands-on, very personal mission in Odesa, Ukraine since 2008. Orphans in Odesa age-out of the orphanage between the ages of 14 and 16. Many of these orphans have no place to go and no one to care. In response, TOAF offers mentoring, assistance with food, clothing, medicine and education, as well as birthday and holiday celebrations. A large portion of their mission is to provide safe housing and family living opportunities for older teens and young orphans. They have helped to establish and maintain three transitional homes with house parents that serve younger orphans. They have also built six cottages available to young adult orphans working on independent living. Since February 24, 2022, they have also been contributing to the war effort by providing packages of food and necessities several times per week to those in need.

Women's Bean Project is located in Denver, Colorado. They hire women experiencing chronic unemployment. Participants in the program are paid as they develop job readiness skills, discover their talents, and strengthen their confidence. They can then begin to support themselves and their families, break the cycle of poverty, and serve as role models for future generations. Zantoun Olive Oil is a non-profit volunteer organization registered in Canada to import and sell symbolic products from or about Palestine to create awareness for a just peace for Palestine-Israel. SAGA OF THE REUTER'S ORGAN (Reprinted from "WPPC Book of Memories" published in 2013) By Dick Sturm

Thanks to all the efforts of Jim Leach and his tenacity that started about eleven years before, we were able to order our organ. I remember—and can still see him in my mind's eye—standing in the narthex in his choir robe with a big organ pipe in his efforts to promote the face that we needed a new organ!

Joanna Wallace was our organist when I was approached by Dr. Cuthill to head up the fund-raising committee. In the course of events, the selection committee traveled to several different churches, listening to and viewing different instruments in Orlando, but also as far afield as



Fort Lauderdale, and Saint Petersburg. The travels were enjoyable and they even included complimentary lunches on some occasions. We listened and observed and finally decided on a pipe organ (about which, by the way, some of our major donors were very adamant).

We started our fund-raising with a goal of \$460,000, which was the cost of our new instrument. We made personal visits to our members during the next few weeks explaining our need. Joanna underscored the need by demonstrating the lack of certain keys on our current instrument. The keys were there but they didn't work. Our old organ, I believe, was not economically repairable.

After receiving the necessary pledges, the organ was ordered and then delivered to a waiting crowd of members in the west parking lot Monday, September 21, 1998. We unloaded more than 3,000 pipes, some in boxes, others handled with kid gloves so as not to tarnish or damage them between the truck and Fellowship Hall. When we had finished unloading, the Hall looked like a disaster zone.

The fellow that sold us the organ also directed the unloading of the truck and then proceeded to do the installation.

Our organ was dedicated November 21, 1998, with a concert by noted organist John Walker, much to the delight of the entire congregation.

To celebrate the completion of this enormous project, a special arrangement of "Holy, Holy, Holy" was presented to Jim Leach in appreciation of his efforts in this matter over the years.

Twenty-five years later, Jayne Leach will present a brief, but complete, journey of how we became blessed to have one of the most beautiful sounding pipe organs in Central Florida. Please join the Relationships in Action class on October 29 at 9:15 in Room 301.

Relationships in Action (RinA) • Room 301 @ 9:15 AM

Relationships in Action is a Sunday School class that studies "with the Bible in one hand and the newspaper in the other." They are interested in Biblical, historical, and current social issues in terms of how they affect the lives of others and how we, as followers of Christ, can be a factor in positive change. Everyone is welcome.

9/1: The Holy Land Revealed—Monumental Tombs in the Time of Jesus

This session will deal with the burial practices in Jerusalem during the Herodian period up until the year 70, specifically, the Jewish custom of burying their dead in rock-cut tombs. Burial in these tombs was so popular among the Jerusalem elite, that the city is now ringed by nearly 1000 documented rock-cut tombs.

9/8: Spiritual Conversation Series with John Gehrig

This series invites people to share formative ideas and events which have helped shape their beliefs.

9/15: The Holy Land Revealed: The Burials of Jesus and James

The Jewish practice of burial in rock-cut tombs in Jerusalem was reserved for the elite. Historical sources make no mention of it being a Christian tradition. Most people were buried in individual trench graves dug into the ground. This session will address the evidence for the death and burial of Jesus and his brother James.

Dear Friends,

"Summer time and the livin' is easy," goes the song. Except, of course if you happen to live in Ukraine where war has continued through the summer and into fall, now passing the 18-month mark.

Since the beginning of the war, I have been able to share in my letters that Odesa has fared much better than many other cities in Ukraine. Friends in Odesa spoke with conviction when they told me that Odesa would be spared, that the historic center would never be destroyed. For many months that seemed to be true. However, that changed on a July night, when Russian rockets hit the city center of Odesa, one blast after another, severely damaging more than six historic homes and museums in the city, including the Transfiguration Cathedral, probably Odesa's most well-known and most beautiful cathedral. Surely, if I had been at home in Odesa that night, I would have been shaken from my bed at the blasts. If the war had not already been very personal to me, this surely has made it even more personal. I think of the streets that I walked on a daily basis, the neighborhoods I lived in, the buildings I visited and know so well. Understanding that some of these are now rubble is simply heart-breaking to me, and I understand on a deeper level how so many Ukrainians are feeling with so much surrounding destruction. The attacks continued almost every night through July and into August, and they continue often even now, causing more and greater damage.

Not long ago, Izmail, another city in the greater Odesa Region, a city on the Danube Delta in southwestern Ukraine, was also attacked. Izmail was also known as one of the "safe cities," a place that "would never be hit." And yet, it has. Truly, I never had complete confidence that any place in Ukraine would be forever safe, but I certainly hoped it to be true. Now I totally understand that no place in Ukraine is a safe place as long as this war continues.

And what does all of this mean for our people in Odesa and our mission? It means that, first and foremost, by the grace of God, all our folks are safe from the attacks. Secondly, we continue to do all the things that we've been doing in Odesa for years: orphans are being cared for, graduates are being connected to caring adults in safe, loving environments, and our two new homes are built and are being furnished. Additionally, many needy people in the Odesa region are being cared for in practical ways.

Despite the sadness of an ongoing war in Ukraine, I recently had the uplifting opportunity to take a road trip from my home in Central Florida to Portland, Maine, with many stops along the way to connect and reconnect with family and friends and to experience new places. Two of those stops were at churches dear to my heart where I was invited to share my experiences in Odesa and my work with orphans. It was a first visit to Central Presbyterian Church in Anderson, South Carolina, and I sincerely hope it was not my last. What a welcoming, giving group they are! My visit to Middle Octorara Presbyterian Church in Quarryville, Pennsylvania, my church during my young adult years, was nothing short of a joyful homecoming. It was a pleasure and a blessing to be in both places, and I welcome the opportunity to visit them again and to visit other churches in the future. If your church or organization has an interest in the mission of Transitions Orphan Assistance Foundation and what is happening in Ukraine right now, please respond to this email. I would be happy to arrange a presentation for you.

Nothing could have prepared any of us for the changes that this war has made for all of us. As fall approaches, and along with that, thoughts of another long, cold, dark winter ahead, I simply ask that you remember our folks in Odesa and what we do for them. Your support, in whatever form you are able to give it, is invaluable, life-saving, and so much appreciated. Thank you for all you do!
