



PEACEMAKING OFFERING WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY OCTOBER 5TH

World Communion Sunday is October 5th. It's exciting to think we'll be sharing the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper with Christians worldwide!

On that day we will collect your offering for Peacemaking, one of the four Special Offerings of the PC(USA). Our partners in the Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly will use 75% of this offering for various peacemaking projects throughout the world. The Compassion Committee has selected IDignity (https://idignity.org/) to be the local recipient of 25% of our collection. This program was founded by members of five downtown Orlando churches in 2008 to assist the disadvantaged in Central Florida to navigate the complexities of obtaining their personal identification. The documents IDignity obtains on behalf of their clients enable them to apply for employment or school, secure access to shelters, vote, seek help from social service program, open a bank account or cash a check, secure housing, or overcome many obstacles to becoming self-sufficient. The cost to obtain these documents is high and demand for these services has yet to ebb. More than 120 volunteers serve 200-250 people in need every month. This connects to the global witness of Christ's peace.

PRAY-ORITIZE

During a recent radio show a simple question was posed to the listening audience.

"Is prayer your steering wheel or your spare tire?"

What a powerful, yet simple, metaphor for how we should be in prayer and such a thought provoking one as to how we might be in prayer. Is your relationship with God your guidance or your back stop when things go wrong?

God wants a relationship with us. Not just a call on Easter and a card on Christmas, but an actual relationship with us. Daily, hourly, by the minute until it becomes a part of us. But let's be honest it is a very tough thing to do. It takes effort, time and being proactive rather than reactive.

Prayer is a multi-faceted, complex subject. Prayer is not just talking to God, it is a dialogue. God wants to speak to us, but He will only do so when we make room for Him. After you pray, set aside time to listen to Him.



Jeremiah 33:3 Call to me and I will answer you, and will tell you great and hidden things that you have not known.

Instead of thinking of this as something we have to do, think of it as something we get to do. Find a joy and peace in a growing relationship with God

Philippians 4: 6-7 do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.



Just like any part of a routine, prayer must be scheduled as an important part of our day. Budgeting is essential for financial health, exercise and diet are good for physical health, and prayer is necessary for our spiritual health. Perhaps you want to pray but find it difficult to sit still long enough to give God your time. Use your phone and set the timer on it. Start off with five minutes and go from there. Be sure to make time for it every day.

Romans 12:12 "Rejoice in hope, be patient in tribulation, be constant in prayer."

It can be difficult to make time for prayer, it may be harder to find space. Creating a quiet space for prayer might make you more intentional about prayer. It doesn't have to be a large space to be suitable. In the Gospels, we see Jesus frequently withdrawing to solitary places to pray.

Luke 5:16 "But Jesus Himself would often slip away to the wilderness and pray."

Making prayer a priority can be hard. However, God challenges us to do so and make the modifications to our lifestyle an integral part of our daily lives. I have not heard too many songs about Jesus being a spare tire but I sure do love the Carrie Underwood Song "Jesus Take the Wheel".

The research found that people who boosted their potassium levels were less likely to be hospitalized with heart rhythm issues or heart failure or to die from related complications. Some evidence from observational studies suggests that low plasma potassium levels are associated with an increased risk of dangerous alterations in heart rhythms and that potassium levels in the upper normal level have protective effects.

Some potassium-rich foods include bananas, avocado, oranges and other fruits, vegetables, dairy and proteins. The benefits occurred across cardiovascular disease types and regardless of the method used to increase potassium levels. Researchers say that they believe the time is right to consider increasing potassium levels to the mid-to-high normal range as an inexpensive and widely available treatment strategy in patients with a broad spectrum of cardiovascular diseases associated with a high risk of ventricular arrhythmia.

Ilana Muhlstein, a registered dietitian nutritionist in Los Angeles, noted that potassium and sodium work as a "counterbalance," as a higher potassium intake can "help flush out more sodium from the cell" and help control blood pressure. "This is why, as a dietitian, I recommend a high potassium, lower-sodium diet for my cardiac clients, especially those who need help lowering their blood pressure and supporting long-term heart health."

Patients with underlying heart failure or high risk for abnormal heart rhythms should have potassium levels monitored. There are other factors affecting potassium levels in the blood, including kidney disease and use of various medications that either lower or raise potassium levels. It is recommended that people work with their healthcare providers for guidance on diet and medications.

- Social programs for youth, women, and the elderly ("3rd Agers")
- Church transportation
- Basic medical support




