












September 8—"When God Left the Building" - Part 1 of 2

This documentary is the story of two declining American institutions — Kodak and the church. One church implodes after infighting and a faith crisis. Another struggles with a member's plan to open an outreach in a pub. The individual churches' stories and the story of Kodak's demise become a wake-up call to Christians everywhere. Nancy and Mike Galyean will lead the discussion.

September 15—"When God Left the Building—Part 2 of 2

This is the 2nd half of a powerful and compelling film that delves into the causes of declining church attendance across the nation. The film compares the decline of the church with the Kodak Company, which faded away due to not keeping up with the digital revolution. The documentary also examines mega-churches and the lack of the personal touch that accompanies many of them. Discussion will be led by Mike and Nancy Galyean

September 22—Dan & Elizabeth Turk, Madagascar Missionaries

Dan and Elizabeth Turk have been missionaries in Madagascar for Winter Park Presbyterian Church for many years. Madagascar is a beautiful country in Africa that continues to struggle with significant poverty. Dan's focus has been on helping improve the lives of people through developing and helping plant trees and other crops that help feed people. Elizabeth has been helping people improve their health by creating resources for people to have safe water, and addressing HIV/AIDS and other health issues. WPPC supports their work through Compassion Committee funds and 2 Cents a Meal. Elizabeth grew up in this church and was instrumental in the church beginning its ministry to the Coalition for the Homeless. This will be an opportunity to learn more about the situation in Madagascar and their efforts to make a difference. Many of you have also purchased items at the Global Market that were made by the women in Madagascar and have helped them support their families.

September 29—KIVA

Since 2008 W.P.P.C. has been making micro loans (small loans for business purposes) to people throughout the developing world. The Relationships in Action class sponsors this activity through partnership with KIVA, an international non-profit devoted to micro loan creation and administration. John Gehrig will be helping us understand how this works and giving us the chance to set goals for next year's lending.



A Congregational Meeting will be held on Sunday, September 15, immediately following the 10:30 AM service. The purpose of this meeting is to elect new officers.



WPPC Ringers will meet for the first time this "season" on Sunday, September 15, directly after the congregational meeting following the 10:30 service, in the Music Room on the first floor of the CE Building. What does it mean to be a Deacon at Winter Park Presbyterian Church? This is the group that cares for the congregation. We call, send cards, and visit the sick, injured, and homebound members. We serve communion in the church, retirement centers, and homes. We prepare and usher for memorial services held in the sanctuary and chapel. We bake, buy, prepare, and serve food at receptions for memorial services. Flowers from church services and sometimes from memorial services and receptions are delivered to homebound members. We also prepare baskets for new babies born to the families of members and deliver donated food to the local food pantry.

These are the tasks of the Deacons, but what does it mean? It means giving of yourself to another. When a Deacon visits a member of the church family they show that we as a congregation care, that the church has not forgotten about them, and if they have a concern, they can share it with the Deacon. It means showing compassion and God's love to those who cannot come to church and fellowship with other believers. It means acting on our faith.

Deacons share laughter and tears, love and sorrow, faith and hope in many ways with many people.



If you are looking for greater personal and spiritual fulfillment in the coming year, please look no further than serving as a Deacon for this. The Diaconate is now looking to fill six positions being opened up in 2020 due to normal turnover. Just ask any Deacon how gratifying and spiritually fulfilling it can be to serve the Lord and this church in a meaningful manner and you will be convinced of the personal enjoyment that is derived from serving as a Deacon. World Communion Sunday is October 6th. It's exciting to think we'll be sharing the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper with Christians worldwide!

On that day we will collect your offering for Peacemaking, one of the four Special Offerings of the PC (USA). Our partners in the Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly will use 75% of this offering for various peacemaking projects throughout the world. The Compassion Committee has selected *IDignity* (https://idignity.org/) to be the local recipient of 25% of our collection. This program was founded by members of five downtown Orlando churches in 2008 to assist the disadvantaged in Central Florida to navigate the complexities of obtaining their personal identification. The documents *IDignity* obtains on behalf of their clients enable them to apply for employment or school, obtain access to shelters, vote, seek help from social service programs, open a bank account or cash a check, secure housing, or overcome many obstacles to becoming self-sufficient. The cost to obtain these documents is high and demand for these services has yet to ebb. More than 120 volunteers serve 200-250 people in need every month. This connects to the global witness of Christ's peace.


