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I've been avoiding the news lately and shunning political commentary. I've realized that a good portion of this agitated chatter is about sales. Perhaps God gives us the amount of light, peace and comfort we can profitably absorb. Too much too often wouldn't be useful or good. Instead, moments of insight are reminders that there is more to life than the daily worries plaguing us.

The news may be tinted, and our experiences further color our perceptions. We see darkly. But grace gives us the reassurance that we will eventually know not in part but in whole.

That promise gives me hope.

- 1. Prayer is the heart of Worship.
- 2. Scriptures is the reading hearing, preaching, and confession of the word even expressed in music.

A number of people in our congregation have donated books to our library. There is a whole section of Nicholas Sparks books. Each one is a good read. I just finished *The Last Song* which is a story of two children whose parents divorce. The father is a former concert pianist who moves from New York City to North Carolina. The children, after three years absence, come for a visit. That's when the story gets so interesting that one can hardly put down the book!

Steve Martin's book, *Born Standing Up* is about his life as a comedian. He had a complicated childhood with a father that criticized him all through school and beat him with a belt one time until welts covered his body. Steve started on stage at a young age but was not an overnight success. He worked for free frequently at first until becoming an exceptional entertainer.

Added to the library recently are books by John Grisham, Karen Kingsbury, and a number of books by James Patterson. Patterson's Juror #3 is about a young attorney trying her first major case which is a murder case. *The First Lady* is about a woman who has not drowned but is being held for ransom of \$100 million. *London Bridges* relates how, in broad desert daylight, a mysterious platoon of soldiers evacuates the entire population of Sunrise Valley, Nevada. Minutes later a huge bomb detonates laying waste to a town in an instant.

Below is an update from Dr. Robert Gamble D.Min, PC(USA), Executive Director of <u>thischildhere.org</u>. This Child Here is a validated ministry in the Presbyterian Church and a U.S. 501c3 at work in Ukraine, Believing children deserve a life grounded in peace and dignity.

Ukraine has a program for providing an assistant to any special needs child. (Many kids from orphanages can have special needs). Most parents don't know about this. School administrators don't want to be bothered, teachers don't want these kids in the classroom. The easy solution always was to send them to the Orphanage. We are trying to change that system by meeting and working with the Mayor's office in Mikolaevka and local social services.

About COVID: People wear masks in some stores. You can't buy products at the grocery store without a mask. One training was canceled because a participant tested positive. Otherwise, I don't hear a lot of talk in taxis and from friends about people getting sick or testing positive. I stay out of buses and away from crowds.

We are training social workers, educators and administrators in the justice system, local staff for family support and family control, as well as the families. Our hope is that success in Mikolaevka can lead to success in other regions. Below we sign the contract.


