"I thank my God every time I remember you." Philippians 1:3

Paul wrote these words to a group of people in a Roman city called Philippi. It was a proud city with a great history. By the time Paul wrote these words, Philippi was a primary location where Roman soldiers could reside following their service to the Empire. Officers were often granted tracts of land in Philippi as reward for faithful service. It was so popular and filled with former soldiers, guards, officers, and even officials, Philippi received the title, "Little Rome."

Other than a few names of both women and men, we really do not have any record of who was part of the church at Philippi. However, Paul gives thanks for all of them. The very next verse says, "In all my prayers for all of you, I always pray with joy." This letter is also referred to as Paul's letter of joy. Indeed, it has a very uplifting and encouraging tone throughout. Paul talks about his love for each of them. He addresses the love God has for all of us, perhaps even singing the Christ hymn recorded in chapter two. He expresses love and well wishes to his friends and encourages them to remain faithful.

In fact, there is so much joy expressed in this letter, it can be easy to overlook the concern Paul is having to address. The trouble in the church at Philippi was centered upon the opposition they faced, and the importance of remaining united amid internal and external challenges. For example, we know from letters like Jude, by this time people were saying all sorts of things about Jesus. Of course, by definition, this also led to divisions within the church. To be honest, many of these divisions still persist to this day.


Nonetheless, Paul is trying to encourage unity of the body during times of opposition and even oppression. It makes one wonder, did Paul really pray for everyone with joy? I think he did. It's not easy. In fact, the opposite is true. Praying, seeing others as Christ does, attempting to live as Christ teaches us is extremely difficult. It's much more natural to point out the faults of others. It's much more expedient to write others off who we judge as different from us. Most of the time, and unfortunately, this is our default position. It's just easier.

However, the longer I live, the more I encounter others, people just like me—some days at their absolute worst and other days at their absolute best—I'm becoming increasingly convinced—God's not into easy! No, it's hard to give thanks and rejoice for every person, but although hard or difficult it doesn't mean it's impossible. Jesus said with people things can be impossible, "but with God all things are possible." (Matthew 19:26) On our own, left to our own devices, we're never going to learn what it means to give thanks for people who oppose and oppress us. However, with God this is possible.

I think this is a life long process of learning and I'm grateful for that, because over time the impossible does become possible, It means we have far more in common than what divides us. And it means that we can give thanks, remain united, and even learn what it means to love one another, expressing joy in our prayers—even amide the conflicts that still threaten our unity and persist within our world and within the church today.

I remember all of you in my prayers, giving God thanks for each of you,



Society of Saint Andrews (SOSA) provides food for the body, God's word for the spirit, community of love for the heart, and opportunity for those who desire action. They feed the hungry all year long by saving fresh produce that would otherwise go to waste and giving it to the needy.

Ten Thousand Villages works with third world country villages to create authentic handicrafts as a way to pass on their culture to the next generation. By selling their handicrafts, they help artisans provide food, house, education, and healthcare for their families. For Sale: Jewelry, Holiday Items, Toys, and more.

Transitions Orphan Assistance Foundation (TOAF) has had a very hands-on, very personal mission in Odesa, Ukraine since 2008. Orphans in Odesa age-out of the orphanage between the ages of 14 and 16. Many of these orphans have no place to go and no one to care. In response, TOAF offers mentoring, assistance with food, clothing, medicine and education, as well as birthday and holiday celebrations. A large portion of their mission is to provide safe housing and family living opportunities for older teens and young orphans. They have helped to establish and maintain three transitional homes with house parents that serve younger orphans. They have also built six cottages available to young adult orphans working on independent living. Since February 24, 2022, they have also been contributing to the war effort by providing packages of food and necessities several times per week to those in need.

Women's Bean Project is located in Denver, Colorado. They hire women experiencing chronic unemployment. Participants in the program are paid as they develop job readiness skills, discover their talents, and strengthen their confidence. They can then begin to support themselves and their families, break the cycle of poverty, and serve as role models for future generations. Zantoun Olive Oil is a non-profit volunteer organization registered in Canada to import and sell symbolic products from or about Palestine to create awareness for a just peace for Palestine-Israel. They wish to promote peace and understanding through public awareness and education of Palestinian society, history, culture and art. The also wish to provide assistance to initiatives which promote humanitarian, education, culture and peace links with Palestine, especially as they may relate to Palestinian youth.





The donations were delivered on Monday, August 7, to Killarney Elementary by Bonnie Gaughan and to Aloma Elementary by Nancy Galyean.

PEACEMAKING OFFERING WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY—OCTOBER 1ST

World Communion Sunday is October 1st. It's exciting to think we'll be sharing the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper with Christians worldwide!

On that day we will collect your offering for Peacemaking, one of the four Special Offerings of the PC (USA). Our partners in the Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly will use 75% of this offering for various peacemaking projects throughout the world. The Compassion Committee has selected *IDignity* (https://idignity.org/) to be the local recipient of 25% of our collection. This program was founded by members of five downtown Orlando churches in 2008 to assist the disadvantaged in Central Florida to navigate the complexities of obtaining their personal identification. The documents *IDignity* obtains on behalf of their clients enable them to apply for employment or school, secure access to shelters, vote, seek help from social service programs, open a bank account or cash a check, secure housing, or overcome many obstacles to becoming self-sufficient. The cost to obtain these documents is high and demand for these services has yet to ebb. Volunteers serve 200-250 people in need every month. This connects to the global witness of Christ's peace.

The hardest files to go through had to do with my son who passed away so long ago when he was only 22. One of his files was labeled Funeral. I had not opened that file once since the day I had put everything in there. It was in that file where I found some of those bittersweet memories...and some surprises that warmed my heart.

I held in my hand the Guest Book and read all the names of those who attended and were so kind to take the time to write their names inside. As I read, I was surprised to recognize names of people that are today dear friends from this church, people I didn't really know that well then. Wade Edwards' name was the first one signed. Sandy and Ed Matrick, now such dear friends, came to a funeral for grieving parents they did not know very well. As I read so many names so precious to me in my life today, I felt a sense of peace, a gift from God.

I also saw names written that included the title, Deacon. Today, as a Deacon myself, I now more deeply understand just what they did for my family that day. It has been 19 years. The love and kindness, the support and hard work are all gifts that have lived on through the years because, the very moment when I felt, once again, overwhelmed with grief...they were still there, comforting and supporting me.

My dear church family, all of you, each day, bring joy to others by your loving hearts. Many of you have served as Deacons and Elders, sometimes more than once. But whether you are an official Deacon or Elder, you all serve generously and are much appreciated!

We are heading into the fall toward the end of the year which means it's time once again to seek those with kind, beautiful, loving hearts to serve as Deacons and Elders. I know it is hard to make a commitment, yet our church family needs you. Each one of you is special with unique gifts from God and when we join together, we become more powerful servants.


And the best part of all...is that the more love you give, the more you receive!

It's the best job in the world!


So, one day, many years from now, someone whose life you've touched by serving will be thinking back on your kindness, and your love will still be helping them... just when they need it the most!




